Town-Wide Yard Sale

It's time to start planning for the Town-Wide Yard Sale. If you are spending the winter cleaning out your attics, basements and garages and are ready to get rid of your old stuff, join the Auburn Town-Wide Yard Sale. This event will be held on Saturday, May 13 from 8:00 am to 2:00 pm. You price and tag your own items, set the sale up outside at your own house and then you keep the profits. The registration fee is only \$15. When you register with the Parks and Recreation department, your house will be included on the official town wide yard sale map, you will receive location sign to help shoppers find your sale easily and we will take care of all the advertising for you.

Do you want to participate in the Town-Wide Yard Sale but live on a road that is too busy or unsafe for visitors to stop? Sign up to sell at a public location. (The location will be determined by how many need this option.)

Tiny Tot Soccer for 3-year-olds & Tot Soccer for 4-year-olds

Tiny Tot & Tot Soccer is back this season for the youngest soccer players. Both programs will be led by the soccer pros from SNHU. The kids will learn basic soccer skills as well as develop strength, coordination, listening skills, and teamwork. This program will run for 5 weeks on Saturdays starting May 6 through June 10 (no soccer Memorial Day weekend). Both programs will be held at Wayne Eddows. Preregistration is required as space is limited. The Tiny Tots program for 3-yearold runs 9:30 am to 10:00 am for a fee of \$50 (Players must be at least 3 during the session). The Tot Soccer program for 4-year-olds will be held at 10:00-11:00 am for a fee is \$65 (Players must be at least 4 years old during the session.)

You and Me Art Class for Ages 2-4

Share a special experience with your child as they create, experiment and discover art. In You & Me Art, you (or a caregiver) and your child will explore a variety of art materials, experience new textures and enjoy being creative in a group setting.

This first session of You and Me Art will run for 3 weeks, May 16, 23 & 30, on Tuesdays at 10:00-11:00 am. This class is open to children ages 2-4 along with a caregiver. Dress comfortably as it might get messy (but it's all washable). This class will be held at Severance School Community Center. The fee for the 3 week session is \$35 for Auburn residents and \$42 for non-residents for a caregiver/child pair.

Summer Basketball Camp

Coaches DeGraffe and Howell are back for another year of Summer Basketball Camp. This is a weeklong basketball camp where players will have the ability to work on ball handling and defensive skills as well as learn about how to move and handle themselves on the court. Summer Basketball Camp will be held Monday, August 14 through Friday, August 18, 8:30 am until 2:00 pm at the AVS gym. This camp is open to students entering grades 5-8 in the 2023-2024 school year. The fee for the camp is \$199 for the week.

Friday Night "Kids' Club"

Join us for a fun, kids-only night for our first Friday Night Kids' Club where kids in grades 2-5 can have a great Friday night out with their friends. There will be Candy BINGO, crafts with Mrs. Lewis and games with Mr. Howell. Pizza dinner and dessert is also included. This event will be held at the Severance School Community Center on Friday, April 14. Drop off is at 6:00 pm and pick up is 9:00 pm. Advanced registration is required, and spaces are limited.

Fast Feet Running Series

All kids aged 2-14 come join Fast Feet Running Series for 6 weekly races. Start off the series with a jog or slow run and watch yourself get faster and faster as the weeks go by. It's great exercise and a lot of fun to hang with and cheer on your friends. Races include 50 yards for under 4 years old, 100 yards for under kindergarten, ¼ mile for kindergarten and first graders, ½ mile for 2nd and 3rd graders and 1 mile for 4th grade and up.

Fast Feet Running Series will be held at the Safety Complex field on Sundays at 2:00 pm. The 6 week program will run from April 23 through June 4 with no program on May 28. The fee for the 6 week program is \$49 which includes t-shirt and medal. Trophies are awarded to the top finishers.

Field Hockey for Beginners

Field Hockey for Beginners, for children in grades K-4, is a 5-week program where new field hockey players will learn the basics of the sport. There will be fun drills and games to teach skills including how to hold a stick, how to dribble, pass and stop the ball and how to play defense. This program will be run by Jillian Dulac, an Auburn resident and physician at Manchester OB/GYN Associates. Jillian played field hockey at The College of the Holy Cross and has experience coaching players of all ages- youth through USA Olympic Development.

Field Hockey will run for 5-weeks and meet on Saturdays at 11:00 am until noon at the Safety Complex field at 99 Raymond Road. The program starts on May 13 and ends on June 17 with no program on May 27. The fee for the program is only \$25.

<u>Ballet</u>

Calling all princes and princesses... please join us for a mini ballet session this spring. The class will be led by Ericka Swett who is very excited to share her passion of ballet with our K-2 children. At the end of the session, dancers will participate in a final ballet class with tea and cookies!

The 4 week session will be held on Wednesdays from May 10-31 at 4:30-5:15 pm and is open to students in grades K-2. The fee for the class is only \$25 for Auburn residents and \$30 for non-residents and will be held at Severance School. We are excited to bring this opportunity to our community!

Candle Making for grades 5-8

The Parks & Rec is excited to offer this new Candle Making class for students in grades 5 through 8. This hands-on class allows you to design your own candle where you choose from a variety of fragrance oils, dried flowers and fun tins. Participants will leave the workshop with 3 customized candles. Tins can be recycled after burning to hold sundries and more. Your homemade candles can make a great Mother's Day gift.

Candle Making will be held on Monday, May 8, 6:00-7:00 pm at the Severance School for students in grades 5-8. The fee for the class is \$28 for Auburn residents and \$32 for non-residents.

<u>Tai Chi</u>

Tai Chi is a mind-body exercise from China. It has its roots in martial arts, philosophy, and Traditional Chinese Medicine. The Tai Chi forms are slow, gentle choreographed movements that gracefully flow from one to the next like a dance. More seniors are doing Tai Chi to improve their health and reduce their risk of falling. Tai Chi will be held at Severance School on Thursday, May 4 through June 22 (8-week session) at 11:00 am until noon. The fee for the 8-week session is \$58 for Auburn Residents and \$70 for non-residents.

Meditation

Come join us in the practice of meditation. The combination of finding "your breath" and silencing the mind. Whether this is new or you have practiced before, come enjoy a time of mindfulness for yourself. Sharon O'Leary-Graves, a registered nurse, has been practicing the art for 14+ years. She personally has used and shared meditation techniques with her patients and friends. This practice has proven to be helpful in all aspects of her profession and day to day life situations.

The new 6 week session of Meditation for All will be held at the Severance School Community Center on Thursdays, May 4 through June 8 from 6:00-7:00 pm. The fee for the class is \$55 for residents and \$66 for non-residents. Participants will want to bring a yoga mat or blanket to each class.

<u>Tai Chi</u>

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Strength Training for Active Seniors

This strength training class for active seniors will be a mixture of light weights and your own body weight. With Joelle Ray as your trainer, you are sure to be challenged but encouraged to try your best and most importantly to have fun! Our goal in this class is to build muscle and increase flexibility to create a healthy body and mind. There will be fun music to help motivate our iron pumping!

The 6-week session will be held on Wednesdays, May 3 through June 7. You can register for the 8:45-9:30 am class for lighter level and/or beginner or 10:45-11:30 am for more challenging and/or intermediate. The fee for the session is \$62 for Auburn Residents, \$75 for non-residents.

<u>Zumba</u>

Zumba Fitness classes are designed to bring people together to sweat it on. We take the "work" out of workout, by mixing low-intensity and high-intensity moves for an interval-style, calorie-burning dance fitness party. A total workout, combining all elements of fitness – cardio, muscle conditioning, balance, and flexibility, boosted energy and a serious dose of awesome each time you leave class.

The 6-week session will run Tuesday, May 2 through June 6 at Severance School. There are 2 class times, 8:30-9:30 am OR 5:30-6:30 pm. The cost for the class is \$62 for Auburn Residents, \$75 for non-residents.

Cookie Decorating

The always popular Cookie Decorating class with Allision is back for a few new fun themed classes. While the kids usually get to have all the fun, this cookie decorating class is for adults. In this class, each participant will learn the basics of royal icing including how to handle a piping bag, pressure, and piping techniques. Using these skills, participants will then decorate 6 themed cookies with demonstrations throughout and get to take home their delicious masterpieces!

Thurs., April 20: An Evening with Author Brendan DuBois



Massabesic Garden Club

The Massabesic Garden Club met in March and Tracey Noonan and Patti Elwell gave an excellent presentation on Native Plant use as well as Pollinator Gardens, and the UNH and UMaine extension programs that provide education and certification. From the UNH Cooperative Extension website, here's an overview:



The need for Pollinator Gardens:

"New Hampshire is home to a diverse array of pollinators, from charismatic

bumble bees to unheralded wasps, flies and beetles. Declines of insects, native bees, and birds are well documented, and habitat loss is a significant driver of those declines. UNH Extension staff and New Hampshire Master Gardener volunteers, along with community groups and concerned residents, have been taking action to protect pollinators by planting pollinator-friendly gardens and providing education for the gardening public.

The importance of gardening with Native Plants:

Native plants are those that have been in a region for hundreds of years, before commerce introduced new plant species. When native species are outcompeted by aggressive, non-native plants (invasive species) or replaced by non-native plants (such as our lawns), their value and services are lost.

Using native plants in your garden is a wonderful way to beautify your yard and simplify landscape maintenance while benefitting native wildlife and supporting our natural environment. In addition to their inherent, intrinsic value, the presence of native plants is critically important and beneficial...because they:

- Reduce Garden Maintenance & Save Money
- Provide Pest Control
- Provide Food Sources for Insects
- Support Crop Pollinators
- Secure Wildlife Habitat
- Bolster Biodiversity

HOME PERFORMANCE WITH ENERGY STAR® Moderate-Income Program

The Home Performance with ENERGY STAR - Moderate-Income (HPwES-MI) program is open to qualifying customers of Eversource, Liberty Utilities, Until, and NH Electric Cooperative. The HPwES-MI looks to support those NH residents that are over income for Home Energy Assistance (income eligible weatherization program) yet may struggle to cover the customer co-pays in our market rate Home Performance program. HPwES-MI offers higher incentives on weatherization measures and 0% finance options to help cover the customer co-pay.

The program rebate structure is as follows:






The ability to secure permits associated with property improvements has been restored. Not unlike many setbacks in construction – it has taken us more time than we expected, so we are excited to finally "move in" to our new system.

We have a new vendor and are utilizing the PermitEyes software. The on line service is now available through the link on the Town of Auburn website, which requires users to establish a user name and password, from there you can navigate the various types of permits (building, electrical, plumbing, swimming pools, septic) and submit supporting materials as attachments. Payments can be made on line using a credit card for convenience. If you prefer, we can still accept check and cash payments at Town Hall. The new system will issue your permit electronically and you can follow status of inspections by viewing your on line portal account.

High Energy Bill putting a dent in your budget? Maybe this program can help.

There is a grant funded demonstration program under the NHSaves® suite of energy efficiency programs called the Home Performance with Energy Star® - Moderate-Income (HPwES-MI) program. The NH Utilities and NH Department of Energy have recently worked together to make adjustments to the program so that the grant incentives now cover 100% of the costs to weatherize the homes of income eligible homeowners and renters up to \$15,000. There is also 0% financing if additional work is needed.

For qualifying customers an assessment is done to determine what cost-effective retrofits are recommended for the home. The assessment assures that the work done will result in a durable, safe and healthy, and comfortable home that will also be energy efficient. Improvements can include air-sealing and insulation, upgrades to inefficient heating and water heating equipment, inefficient refrigerator and freezer replacement and other measures like new thermostats, LED bulbs and hot water conserving measures. The result will be lower energy bills.

Your income must be verified by one of the agencies administering the Home Energy Assistance program, which for Auburn residents is Southern New Hampshire Services (603- 688-8010). Qualifying income for this program is either 61 – 80% State Median Income or 201 – 300% Federal Poverty Guidelines. Keep in mind that the intake offices will close on April 30, 2023 for the season which may make getting an appointment harder. When making an appointment, make sure you are clear on what documents you will need to bring with you. A checklist can be found at https://www.snhs.org/system/files/2021-11/uploads/file/ENERGY-APPOINTMENT-CHECKLIST-2021.pdf. They have offices in Manchester, Raymond and Derry. The

is below the shown amounts, you would be eligible for the Energy and Weatherization Programs and you should take advantage of those benefits. These benefits are not income so they won't impact other benefits you may be receiving.

You must be a customer of Eversource, Liberty, Unitil, or NH Electric Cooperative to be eligible. The higher your energy use, the more retrofits will be cost-effective.

Short Stories from an Old-Timer, Bill Blake

Ernie and Thelma Blake rented their farm with the right to purchase at 524 Hooksett Rd from a Polish store owner in Manchester. When the debt was reduced to \$500, it had to be paid off in full. During the Great Depression, \$500 was a lot of money but the Blake's succeeded and now owned their farm. At that time, from Rt 101 to the Hooksett line there were only 4 houses on that side of the road: McEcoy, Blake, Webster, and Mozden.

During World War II, the Blake's raised rabbits and processed 300 every Friday night. Ernie killed and cleaned while Thelma butchered and packed the meat in ice. The pelts were stretched on wire frames to dry. Eventually, the pelts were purchased by the military for flight jacket liners. The meat was delivered to the Manchester Depot bound for New York City. As a 6 year old, Bill's first chore was walking up to Ed Fogg's (Corner Of Hooksett Rd. and Maple Farm Rd.) with 2 glass jugs. Ed filled the jugs with milk and charged 5 cents a bottle. It was a long walk home with the heavy bottles but he never broke one.

To this day, Bill enjoys cooking. He specializes in apple pie and brownies. While still a child, his Mother ended up in the hospital. With the aid of the telephone, Bill would have supper ready when his Father got home from work. His Grandmother was only a ring away. Ernie never complained but there were times when it might have been justified.

There is a swimming hole at the intersection of Little Massabesic Brook and Griffin Brook coming down from Clark's Pond. Located just behind the Village school, generations of kids would swim there after school. That's where Bill learned to swim. Unfortunately, after a picture of kids swimming in the Brook made the paper, the Manchester Water Works cracked down and enforced the 'No Swimming ' rules.

In 1940, Bill Blake started his educational career in a brand new 2 room school in Auburn Village. It closed when they opened a new school in Auburn Village. For the first time, the heat was controlled by a thermostat connected to an oil furnace. A new system creates new problems and when the heat went off, the entire school would go over to Mae Bramhall's little house. Mae was a very nice person. She was considerate and just one of those people that you could count on if you were in trouble. Mae also knew a lot of natural history and fed songbirds out of her hand. When there was a heating problem over at the school, she had an impromptu lesson plan ready to go. But, seats were at a premium. Bill was happy to perch on the top bunk with a couple of 'cuties' like Gladys Locke and Barbara Ryan.

Mrs. Bowser sold ice cream, soda, and candy from the Windmill which was located where the 'Field Of Dreams' Park is now. As she finished off a tub of ice cream, she would hand the tub along with a spoon to the next kid in line. All of the kids went down to the 'Windmill' after 8th grade graduation. It was extra special for Billy Blake, he got to clean an empty tub.

Bill was an Auburn Police Officer for 17 years. During that time, the hardest task he completed was informing the Dube family of the loss of their sons. The boys were on their way to a doctors appointment. Near Sell's Corner, (Now Exit 2, Rt 101) a tractor trailer rounded a curve and found a car stopped in the road. To avoid hitting him, the driver yanked the steering wheel, swerved into the other lane and hit the Dube brothers head on. Both were killed instantly.

At the time, Bill was installing a pool in Hooksett. When he got the call, he returned to Town, identified the brothers, and contacted the Priest. Bill and the Priest then went to the Dube home, 4 doors before the Longmeadow Church. As they arrived, Mrs. Dube got off a call from the Doctors office that the boys were late. Seeing the Police followed by the Priest pull up in her yard, Mrs. Dube knew...She opened the door and asked, "One or Both?". Police Officer Bill Blake had to tell her that both boys had been killed through no fault of their own.

Fortunately, not all memories are bad or sad. Bill worked 30 years for the Manchester Water Works. Once when he was in the City, a woman started talking to him. He finally confessed, 'I'm sorry but I can't seem to place you.' She smiled slightly and said, 'I'm dressed.' After a pause, Bill remembered, "ooohhh - The Beach House." The Beach House, located across from the main gate of the Massabesic Rifle Range, hired strippers for their Saturday night shows and the Auburn Police Department provided security.

The Auburn Village 5th Grade Class visited the AHA in March. They went on a historical bus tour then went to the museum to learn more about our town, visit the Dockham store and check out the barn.
