At the same time, we congratulate Mickey Rofle for his election to the Board of Selectmen. Also, a life-long resident of Auburn, Mickey has been serving as a member of the Police Commission and the Planning Board. We look forward to forging a new working relationship on the Board moving forward.

Looking for a Volunteer for Police Commission

With his election to the Board of Selectmen, Mickey Rolfe has indicated his intention to resign his position as a member of the Auburn Police Commission. State statute gives the authority to fill the vacancy to the Board of Selectmen.

Before considering filling the position, the Selectmen invite any Auburn resident interested in serving on the Police Commission to drop a

short letter or e-mail to the Board townadmin@townofauburnnh.com to let us know of your interest in serving and why you would want to be a member of the Police Commission.

To be in compliance with state law, the two requirements for appointment to this position individuals need to be a resident of Auburn and be a registered voter in Auburn.

The appointment that is made by the Board of Selectmen would be until March 2021, at which time the position will appear on the Town ballot for election to a full three-year term of office.

Interested individuals should contact the Town by April 17th. The Board would like to try to fill the position before the end of April.

Town Lawn and Property Maintenance

Following an open bid process and search, the Board has awarded the contract for mowing and maintenance of 11 Town properties and parks and two cemeteries to Plaza Landscaping of Auburn.

Five firms submitted proposals for this work, three of which had previously held this contract. Following a detailed process and review of the proposals, and recommendations from the Cemetery Trustees and Parks & Recreation, the Board selected Matt Plaza for this work. The bid award is for the 2020 season, with the potential of extending the contract to 2021 and 2022.

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State Launches 2-1-1 COVID-19 Hotline

CONCORD, **NH** – On March 12th, Governor Chris Sununu, the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services, and NH Homeland Security and Emergency Management, announced that 211NH has been mobilized to handle all COVID-19 related calls from New Hampshire residents. All residents with questions or concerns surrounding the COVID-19 outbreak can call 2-1-1.

"211NH will serve as a coordinated and streamlined process for any Granite Stater concerned about the coronavirus," said Governor Chris Sununu. "Now that it is up and running, any New Hampshire residents can call with questions or concerns. I would like to thank the folks at Granite United Way and Public Health for working around the clock to stay on top of this evolving public health situation by making this critical resource available 24/7."

"It is important during an outbreak that residents get the information they need to protect their health and the health of their community," said HHS Commissioner Lori Shibinette. "2-1-1 provides that resource for our residents to get the most up to date and accurate information about the presence of coronavirus in New Hampshire."

211NH is New Hampshire's statewide, comprehensive, information and referral service operated by Granite United Way and will replace the current Department of Public Health Hotline (603-271-4496) for COVID-19 related questions.

Fast Track Summer Running Program

The Fast Track Summer Running Program, led by AVS Cross Country Head Coach and 8th grade teacher, Tim Hamilton, is designed to give student athletes a leg up in all areas of fitness and health for fall sports. This program is designed to boost endurance and provide an opportunity to enter fall season in prime condition so all athletes can excel on the course or on the field. The workouts will be comprised of stretching and flexibility work, conditioning drills, strength training, nutrition information, running workouts, and active games.



This program is for students entering grades 5-8 and will be held at 8:00 to 10:30 am on August 4, 6*, 11, 13*, 18*, 19 and 20. Fast Track will meet at the Auburn Safety Complex Field except August 6 & 18 at the track at Livingston Park in Manchester and August 13 at Derryfield Park in Manchester. Early bird price of \$99 before June 1st. \$129 after that date. This price includes instruction and Auburn Fast Track tech wick t-shirt



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Archery

This course designed for all levels with focus on archery safety, skills, and drills. Participants will learn about archery form, range rules and etiquette. Students will also learn bow functions, bow and arrow safety and aspects of arrow flight.

This 5-week course will be held at the Safety Complex field starting on Wednesday, May 6th, 5:30-6:30 pm. This class is open to students (ages 10 and up) and adults. Preregistration is required as space is limited. The fee for session is \$75. All equipment is provided. Dana White is a Level II Certified Instructor with the National Archery Association (NAA), and National Field Archer Association, (NFAA) to meet the qualifications of all course demands.

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Iumping Beans

The first session of Jumping Beans was such a success, we are excited to start a second session. Jumping Beans is a fun music and movement class for kids age 2-5 taught by Miss Joelle

This class offers moms (or dads, aunts, uncles, grandmas, etc) and kids an opportunity to make new friends and dance to some of the kiddos favorite songs. They will do simple dance moves to go along with the music. Jumping Beans is a fun upbeat class that offers kids the opportunity to be themselves whether that's dancing with their friends or running around and enjoying the music.



The spring session will run from May 6 through June 24. Classes will be held on Wednesdays from 9:30 am until 10:30 am at the Safety Complex. The fee for the 8-week session is \$49. To register, please use the form on the following page and return to Parks and Recreation.

Basketball Camp



There is still space available in both weeks of the summer Basketball Camp. This camp is lead by AVS Basketball Coach and Teacher, Coach DeGraffe along with Coach Howell. It is a weeklong co-ed basketball camp where players will have the ability to work on ball handling and defensive skills as well as learn about how to move and handle themselves on the court. The basketball style that is the foundation of this camp is to teach players how to make choices on the court that maximizes their own set of skills. This style teaches players the basics "rules" for an offence and lets the player use their own creativity on the

court to make decisions at game speed.



Full Moon Hike - Pink Supermoon

Native Americans used the Moon to track the seasons, and names were often given to each month's moon. Traditionally, the Moon we see in April is called the Pink Moon, from the pink flowers – phlox – that bloom in early spring. It also happens to be a Supermoon! Come celebrate the full moon with a nighttime hike to Battery Point. The hike will be 3.1 miles total and will take about an hour and a half. It is a good family hike recommended for ages 8 and up. The 1913 Model 'T' Ford by Dan Carpenter

Born in 1894, James Matthew (Matty) Forsaith was a Chester farm boy who owned a used Model T Ford auto. As Forsaith prepared to enter the US Army, he needed a place to store his car. William Pingree's barn had been used for storage since his death in 1909. Matty approached his uncle Frank Forsaith about leaving the 'T' in the Pingree barn.

Something happened to Auburn School No 6, (Mosquito Brook School) in 1919. The decision was made to send the children from East Auburn (Colman Rd, Dearborn Rd, and Chester Turnpike) to Auburn Village School No. 3. Frank Forsaith would use the 1913 Model T as a bus. For a dollar a day, he picked the kids up in the morning and returned them home in the afternoon.

Frank continued to bus the kids until 1922. In that year he and his wife, Rosa took the 'T' to Hampton Beach. There was an accident at a traffic jam in Epping. The Model T was sandwiched in a multi-car pileup. Frank took the train back to Auburn, got off at Hook Switch and walked up the Chester Turnpike to his home on the Five Corners. He hitched up the horse and headed back to Epping where he and Rosa towed the car home.

The car was a "goner". It would never again be used as a car. Frank removed a rear wheel, ran a belt to his cordwood saw and used the Model T's power train to saw firewood!

The 1913 Model 'T' Ford



When I was a kid, the big brass lantern (running light) from the Model T hung on the wall in Gramp's (Carl Forsaith's) workshop. Carl and his wife, Grace bought antiques at auction with the idea that they would have their own auction someday. In 1983, Carl decided to go into assisted living and it was time for the auction. My wife Dot and I made a list of the items we wished to purchase.

The Model T running light was on the list. Auction day was hectic. The auctioneer set up a tent, lined up chairs and brought in a food truck. Gramp had a great

day talking to neighbors and reminiscing about items on the auction block. I answered questions from buyers and purchased most of the items on my list. But the Model T running light got away. I was distracted and did not see the big brass lantern sticking out of a box lot until it was walking away. The last chapter in a 70 year old story.

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Auburn Police News

Hello Auburn Residents.

With winter is behind us, and good weather coming, we are all adjusting to the clock change and day-light-saving. Looking ahead to Spring cleaning and yard clean ups, the Department had a couple of house cleaning items we wanted to put out to the residents:

Mark your calendars: NATIONAL DRUG TAKE BACK DAY SATURDAY APRIL 25th 10AM to 2PM This is a great chance to get rid of expired, old, unused medications, both prescription and over the counter.

In addition, please remember to check that your house number remains clearly marked in case of emergencies. It saves time in an emergency when Police and Fire personnel can either see a number on the mailbox if your house if a distance from the road or its clearly marked on the house.

We are also asking for people to update their information with the police department in case of an emergency. Residents are not required to register home alarm systems, but we can enter the information into our computer system in case of an emergency. If you do not have a home alarm but would like us to have contact information in case of an emergency, you can also fill out the Alarm Information Form. The form can be found at www.Auburnnh.us under the police tab.

The Department knows when it's Tax Season because we begin to receive a lot more complaints of phone scams, typically someone posing as a debt collector for the IRS. These callers may demand money or may say you have a refund due and try to trick you into sharing private information. These con artists can sound convincing when they call. They may know a lot about you, and they usually alter the caller ID to make it look like the IRS is calling. They use fake names and bogus IRS identification badge numbers. If you don't answer, they often leave an "urgent" callback request.

Here are five things the scammers often do but the IRS will not do. Any one of these five things are a tell-tale sign of a scam. The IRS will never:

- Call to demand immediate payment, nor will they call about taxes owed without first having mailed you a bill.
- 2. Demand that you pay taxes without giving you the opportunity to question or appeal the amount they say you owe
- 3. Require you to use a specific payment method for your taxes, such as a prepaid debit card.
- 4. Ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone.
- Threaten to bring in local police or other law-enforcement groups to have you arrested for not paying. We want our residents to be safe, unfortunately we cannot stop these calls, but if you have any questions or concerns please feel free to contact us to help you determine if this is a phone scam.

What you need to know about coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19)

What is coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19)?

Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) is a respiratory illness that can spread from person to person. The virus that causes COVID-19 is a novel coronavirus that was first identified during an investigation into an outbreak in Wuhan, China.

Can people in the U.S. get COVID-19?

Yes. COVID-19 is spreading from person to person in parts of the United States. Risk of infection with COVID-19 is higher for people who are close contacts of someone known to have COVID-19, for example healthcare workers, or household members. Other people at higher risk for infection are those who live in or have recently been in an area with ongoing spread of COVID-19. Have there been cases of COVID-19 in the U.S.?

Yes. The first case of COVID-19 in the United States was reported on January 21, 2020. The current count of cases of COVID-19 in the United States is available on CDC's webpage at https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/cases-in-us.html.

How does COVID-19 spread?

The virus that causes COVID-19 probably emerged from an animal source, but is now spreading from person to person. The virus is thought to spread mainly between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet) through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes. It also may be possible that a person can get COVID-19 by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose, or possibly their eyes, but this is not thought to be the main way the virus spreads. What are the symptoms of COVID-19?

Patients with COVID-19 have had mild to severe respiratory illness with symptoms of

- fever
- cough
- · shortness of breath



What are severe complications from this virus?

Some patients have pneumonia in both lungs, multi-organ failure and in some cases death.

How can I help protect myself?

People can help protect themselves from respiratory illness with everyday preventive actions.

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available.

If you are sick, to keep from spreading respiratory illness to others, you should

- · Stay home when you are sick.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.

What should I do if I recently traveled from an area with ongoing spread of COVID-19?

If you have traveled from an affected area, there may be restrictions on your movements for up to 2 weeks. If you develop symptoms during that period (fever, cough, trouble breathing), seek medical advice. Call the office of your health care provider before you go, and tell them about your travel and your symptoms. They will give you instructions on how to get care without exposing other people to your illness. While sick, avoid contact with people, don't go out and delay any travel to reduce the possibility of spreading illness to others.

Is there a vaccine?

There is currently no vaccine to protect against COVID-19. The best way to prevent infection is to take everyday preventive actions, like avoiding close contact with people who are sick and washing your hands often.

Is there a treatment?

There is no specific antiviral treatment for COVID-19. People with COVID-19 can seek medical care to help relieve symptoms.
