Auburn Town Hall News

Since the last edition of the Crier was published, property owners have received notice of their new assessed tax value. This was prompted by the required 5-year revaluation of all property in town. With the total *value* of all property in town increasing by more than half, the *tax rate* for December tax bills will be lower.

About 60 owners made appointments with the town's contracted assessor Avitar Associates, to review the new assessments and suggest corrections. After a handful of inspections following those appointments, the process will wrap up in time for the rate to be set in the fall.

With dramatic changes in the real estate market in the past five years, a large increase in values (57%) was expected. Generally, residential and commercial properties increased a similar amount. Smaller and less expensive homes increased slightly more than other residences. There were not significant differences in different areas of town, with some properties on heavily traveled roads increasing less than average. Additional information about the revaluation process, and the details on every parcel's assessment, are still available on the town website.

In other news, we are happy to welcome Sandra Guide to Town Hall as our new Finance and Communications Assistant. This is her first issue as editor of the Crier. See the notice elsewhere in these pages about the Deputy Town Clerk position that we hope to fill with someone from town.

The Board of Selectmen have also been busy with planning for the retirement of our Road Agent, capital equipment plans, and monitoring improvements in town facilities. Visitors to Wayne Eddows Fields will notice expanded parking, and at the public safety complex, new bunk rooms have been completed to prepare for around-the-clock staffing later this year.

Save these September dates and look for details in next month's Crier: Duck Race 9/9, Household Hazardous Waste Day 9/23, and E-Waste and Free Shredding Day 9/30.


AUBURN K-9 BONE-EFIT UPDATE

On February 18, 1952, an astonishing maritime event began when a ferocious nor'easter split in half a 500-foot long oil tanker, the Pendleton, approximately one mile off the coast of Cape Cod, Mass. Incredibly, just twenty miles away, a second oil tanker, the Fort Mercer, also split in half. On both tankers, men were trapped on the severed bows and sterns, and all four sections were sinking in 60-foot seas. Thus began a life and death drama of survival, heroism, and a series of tragic mistakes. Of the 84 seamen aboard the tankers, 70 would be rescued and 14 would lose their lives. Michael Tougias, co-author of the book and soon-to-be Disney movie "The Finest Hours," uses slides to illustrate the harrowing tale of the rescue efforts amidst towering waves and blinding snow in one of the most dangerous shoals in the world. 




Liam Welch received an Award of Merit! National PTA received over 900 entries, and he was 1 of 200 selected for recognition!



- Composition books





Olde Home Days Inspires the Auburn Day and Duck Race -Bringing the Community Together - by Dan Carpenter

It seems that nature has conspired to keep the Town of Auburn divided into separate communities. The geographical center of the community is a couple hundred feet off the foot of Bunker Hill Rd literally in the largest lake in the county, Massabesic. In the late 1800's, the railroad and commercial interests like Prescott's Store, Emery's Meat Market, and the Griffin Mills drew people to Auburn Village. By removing cottages along Lake Massabesic, the Manchester Water Works encouraged growth in the Village. All of the one room school houses had closed in the 1940's. Bringing all of the school age children to the Auburn Village School helped foster community spirit for at least the grammar school years.

In the 1980's, with all of the things that kept Auburn separate, the Town looked for ways to increase our sense of community. The Selectmen started the monthly Auburn "Village Crier". Mike Zorawowicz edited the paper on a volunteer basis for at least 15 years.

The Auburn Village Store drew people to the center of town. Alan Young, owner, was a butcher and ran weekly meat specials. People still did their weekly shopping at the store. Peggy Galvin would need two shopping carts to get her supplies to the car. Road Agent Joe Stacy met his crew for coffee at the store before leaving for their day's activities. Pat Reynolds (Clement) worked at the store where she saw everyone coming and going. Her neighbor, Lil Bartholomew, talked about the old Firemen's Bazaar and the impact it had had on the community.

Pat was inspired by Lil's stories of the Bazaar and began to envision a modern 'Olde Home Days' to bring the community together. Beginning in 1981, Pat and her friend, Ann Robinson would spend months planning this event that so many people looked forward to and participated in. Looking back at the old photos and programs, there were many activities: Hot air balloon flights by Ron and Sue Cassidy, an Elvis impersonator (Roger Pratt), Steve Woods' Magic Show, Dunking Booth, AVFD Rescue Squad Demo, Bike Parade, Horseshoe Contest, Contra Dancing, Dan Grady's marionettes, Woodman's Contest, Quilting Bee, and a Ham and Bean Supper put on by the Longmeadow Church. Don Stritch, Town Moderator and local political fixer, was also a licensed pyrotechnic. The Town of Auburn paid for the fireworks and it was a great way to end the festivities. The Old Home Days events were winding down by the mid '90's. (Cont'd)

News from the Auburn Historical Association

In 1993, the Auburn Historical Association was looking for a fundraiser. Bruce Mason suggested a Duck Race but it was late in the year and people were concerned about the weather. Once it was decided to proceed, Ed Locke and Al Sanborn provided the engineering to funnel the winning ducks over the line. The ducks were thrown into Stan Wood's dump truck for their race down Griffin Brook. From the beginning to the present, the Auburn Fire Department in their contained wet suits retrieved the ducks below Griffin Bridge. The first Duck Race took place in the middle of December on a beautiful 60-degree day. The very next day, remembered Don Dollard, the weather delivered cold rain and sleet.

Over the years, the AHA combined forces with individuals and groups to sell duck tickets. Jeff Davis, a Myles Travel Plaza employee, sold many tickets to people passing through town. Adam Villeneuve had a blow-up duck and sold tickets on the side of the road for charity. Both the Friends of Griffin Free Library and student groups at AVS sell tickets to benefit their organizations.

A decade ago, the AHA realized that they needed to grow the Duck Race and involve Auburn nonprofit groups. Pat Clement invoked the spirit of the 'Olde Home Day' and brought back a Street Fair. Susie T. worked very hard bringing in outside vendors and craftspeople. Local nonprofits participate: Dollars for Scholars, Longmeadow Church, Girl Scouts, Auburn Village School, Massabesic Audubon, Tower Hill Church, Longmeadow Church, The Massabesic Garden Club, Friends of Griffin Free, and the Friends of Auburn. Three years ago, the Auburn Parks and Rec Dept joined with the AHA. They provide fireworks on Friday night and activities for kids on Saturday.

Today, the Auburn Day and Duck Race continues to bring people from all over town together for a fun-filled family event. Many local businesses generously sponsor the event. This year's hard-working committee includes AHA volunteers Deb Mancini (chair), Dan Carpenter, Pat Clement, Brenda Beer, Joe Mancini, Dave Rogers, Linda Matta, Cindy Berling, Jim Thompson, Nancy Mayland and Brett Rickenbach. Amy Lachance (Parks and Rec) and Dan Szczesny (Griffin Free Public Library) are also very involved in making this event successful. There are many wonderful members of the community that volunteer to help at the event (we are always looking for new volunteers!).

This 2023 Auburn Day and 30th Annual Duck Race, Olde Home Day Street Fair is once again put on by the people of Auburn for the people of Auburn. There are fun things to do in Auburn and this is one of them. Plan now to be in Auburn on September 8th for the Hot Air Balloon Ride and September 9th for the Auburn Day and Duck Race street fair!
