



Auburn Town Hall News

The annual budget process is nearing completion, as the Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee have been reviewing and modifying the town department and school district requests over the past two months. The current budget year will end this month with a small surplus, and the town's unassigned fund balance has increased. The Selectmen have been working to limit any increase in the town portion of 2024 taxes by reducing budget requests, making some equipment purchases early, and planning to use the fund balance for many expenses. A public hearing on the budgets will be held January 11, before the Budget Committee finalizes its recommendations for Town Meeting.

The Town Clerk has posted elected offices to appear on the ballot at Town Meeting in this month's crier. The filing period is Jan 24-Feb 2. Interested residents are encouraged to speak with the appropriate chairperson or Town Administrator Chris Sterndale for information about serving in these roles.

The vendor for Household Hazardous Waste Day disappointed us by mixing up the schedule for this year's collection day in Raymond. We are working to reschedule in the Spring, and are sorry that some residents were inconvenienced that day.

We do our best to keep you up to date with where the Parade is, but please listen for the sirens coming closer to your area, if your road is not one Santa will be going down please go to the closest intersection that it does pass, you are also welcome to come to the station after the parade to see Santa if he misses you as well.

We will once again be using the real time tracking app Life360 to better show where Santa is on his route

Once downloaded and an account has been created from the main screen


Tap the dropdown menu in the top middle of the screen

Intermediate Cookie Decorating

This season we're adding a new challenge for those who have tried our popular cooking decorating class with Allison. In this intermediate class, you will create 7 house shaped cookies that will connect together to create a small village. It will



create a more "centerpiece" type cookie creation. This is considered an intermediate class because there are more intricate details on each cookie. You will be creating 7 cookies instead of the usual 6 in the same 2 hour class timeframe so a little previous experience will be needed.

This class will be held on Monday, December 18 at 6:00 pm. The fee for this class is \$65 for Auburn residents and \$69 for non-residents which includes all supplies and instruction. (If the class is full, please add your name to the waiting list. If there are enough additional people, we will add a second night.

McIntrye Ski Program- Elementary

Auburn will be participating in McIntyre Ski Area's 5 week after school ski and snowboard lesson program. This program is offered to students ages 6-12. Whether you are a beginner, intermediate or advanced skier or rider this program has something to offer for all students.

Auburn will be attending on Tuesdays from 4:00pm-6:00pm beginning in January. Students are grouped according to age and ability. Level 4 students may qualify for 1 hour of "free ski" during their lesson time where they can practice fine tuning their skills on their own under the close supervision of our instructors and apprentices. We strongly encourage parent chairlift riders to assist with the students who are approaching the chair lift stage in their learning. Please inquire at guest services during your child's lessons to obtain a chair rider ticket. Students must be 6 years old by the first day of lessons.

Pats Peak Ski Program- Middle School

The Pats Peak Learn to Ski & Ride Program for Auburn middle school students will be held on Wednesdays beginning on January 3 and run for five consecutive weeks. Registration for the program ends on January 1, 2024.

This is an Auburn Parks and Recreation program. There is no transportation this year so participants must establish their own means of transportation to/from the mountain. Students should strive to arrive at Pats Peak about 3:30. Children not enrolled for lessons may free ski for the entire visit. Children enrolled for lessons break from free skiing to meet with their instructors for the 1-hour lesson starting at 4:30. The program ends at 7:00; however, families may remain at the mountain longer if desired.

It's never too early to be prepared. Mark your calendars for the Scouts annual Christmas Tree collection fundraiser. Once the holiday has passed, the Scouts will cheerfully help collect your Christmas Tree for a suggested donation of \$10 per tree. Scouts will collect Christmas Trees on January 6th and January 13th 2024.

Auburn Troop 127 conducted our annual "Scouting for Food" service project November 4, 2023. Thanks to the generosity of the Auburn community, we collected over 2500 items to assist our neighbors facing food insecurity. We transported a significant amount of these donations to the Chester Food Pantry as this pantry provides service to the Auburn Community.

Our older scouts are now planning a hiking trip to Philmont Scout Ranch in the summer of 2024. The Philmont Scout Ranch consists of over 140,000 acres of wilderness in the Sangre de Cristo Mountains in NM. The scouts will begin training hikes and exercises to build the needed endurance for the planned week long trek in the wilderness.

The Scouts BSA program in Auburn is open to boys in grades 5 through High School (ages 11 - 17). The program is youth lead and the elected youth leaders are mentored by well trained adults. The Scouting program focuses on character development, leadership skills, being active in your community and maintaining physical fitness.

Troop 127 typically meets on the 1st, 2nd and 4th Mondays of the month. We alternate between meeting spaces in Auburn at the Longmeadow Church and the old school in Chester located at 84 Chester St. (next to the Police Station)

As the town and library move into budget season and we prepare for Town Meeting, I thought I'd recap everyone on where we stand regarding the library expansion. Architect – Our architects are SMP Architecture out of Concord, a firm with much library experience.

Construction Manager – We have Bonnette, Page and Stone Corp. out of Laconia on the job, the firm that helped with the AVS expansion.

Fundraising Consultant – Andrews Consulting out of Manchester has been directing our Expansion Committee as we develop and pursue our Capital Campaign. Expansion Committee – For the past two months, our Expansion Committee has been hard at work developing a fundraising campaign and reaching out to donors. We're also applying for grants and have created a tiered Naming Opportunities program for the new library.

We have a current set of plans on display at the library along with a digital walk through. We'll also be holding more information sessions and house party events to get the word out. Deer Hunting, Part 2 by Dan Carpenter

More short stories about hunting in Auburn, NH

(Continued from the November Crier)

Auburn kids born in the 1950's spent a lot of time outdoors. As they got older, family and work responsibilities forced them indoors. Michael Dollard (1956-2012) was an exception. Before sunrise, he was up and about running a trap line. Then he went to work. He married the girl down the road, Bette Hutchins, and they started married life in a Manchester apartment. Michael brought paperwork home for a wonderful deer rifle and explained to Bette how it would improve their economic situation. She, the practical one, observed that it represented a month's rent. Michael persevered. He got the gun but it was 8 years before he killed his first deer. (In his defense, Michael kept meticulous records that show the trap line paid for the rifle every year.). During that time, he learned where all the old apple trees were hidden in the woods. He followed the paths that generations of deer had trod down over centuries. Michael set up deer stands that increased site lines and made it harder to be seen. After his first deer, he pretty much got one every year.

In 2012, Michael watched a deer approach his deer stand. He took aim, shot, and reloaded his rifle. When he hadn't returned home well after dark, Bette grew concerned and went looking. Michael Dollard had died in his tree stand with his last buck dead on the ground. He was outside, living his life right up until the end.

Albie Eaton (1953-2023) kept the racks from 35 deer that he killed during his hunting career. Every year was different, every hunt was different and each rack told at least one story. As a teenager, Albie hunted with his father George and family friends Frank Stark and George Bartholomew. Hunting season involved the whole family. His mother, Edie, would be up at 4:30 in the morning to get the fire going and prepare a big breakfast for everyone going on the hunt.

After breakfast, the whole crew would pile into a pickup truck or two and head out. They hunted together and eventually a system evolved where younger hunters with more stamina would 'push' deer toward older, more experienced hunters who were expected to make the shot.

Joe Stacy became part of the group but couldn't go on the first 'push' because he would still be milking the family herd. Milking interfered with Stacy's hunting and influenced his decision to get out of farming. After Joe left the farm, his father, Cliff, sold the cows. Stacy went into the residential construction business, digging cellar holes. Come November, Joe literally shut down his company to pursue his full-time avocation - deer hunting. His oldest son, Jim, said he would have worked with his father but he could not afford to take a month off with winter fast approaching.

George 'Bucky Bart' Bartholomew (1905-1985, 12 Hooksett Rd) was an avid deer hunter until a bullet grazed his hat. (And there wasn't much padding between his hat and skull.). Time to retire.

Jack McFarland dumped a truckload of apples in his side yard on Raymond Rd. Joe Stacy knew that a big buck was 'visiting' that pile on a regular basis. He asked Jack why that buck wasn't in his freezer? "He would be," replied Jack, "If the Game Warden wasn't sleeping with me."

Frank Forsaith (1860-1938) had a 10-acre field behind his house on the 5 Corners (Colman, Dearborn, and the Chester Turnpike). When Carl and Grace Forsaith retired to the farm in 1948, they kept the field open for fire prevention reasons. From his back yard, Carl set his camera up and took pictures of 7 or 8 deer at a time feeding along Preston Brook. Today, 4 houses and the woods have reclaimed the old field. The deer are still out there but not in groups and most won't notice them.

Native American people lived all around Lake Massabesic. Individual families set up homes on the small creeks heading into the lake. A larger group lived at the falls in Auburn Village. Brown's Island in the Back Pond was home to a dozen wigwams. Near there, the Fox family found a stone ax that may be 9,000 years old.


The Front and Back Ponds of Massabesic Lake are separated by Deerneck Bridge. Before the bridge, the land to the North was a peninsula which pinches together just below the Manchester Yacht Club. The Abenaki drove deer into this peninsula and built a brush fence behind them. The deer could escape by swimming but as long as food was available, they stayed.

I always questioned this story. What would a brush, reed fence look like? How much labor would be entailed? Then I saw the formidable barriers Dee Cleary built on Lover's Lane and realized that a brush fence was a doable and workable solution.
