Auburn Town Hall News

Auburn Accepts Full Amount of Federal ARPA Funds

Acting on behalf of the Town of Auburn, the Board of Selectmen has voted to accept the full amount of \$584,362 in federal funding from the American Recovery Program Assistance (RPA) funds approved by the United States Congress.

The community has through December 2024 to commit the funds and through December 2026 to spend these funds, and the Board of Selectmen is generally looking at one-time capital type of purchases that will assist the community without impacting the Town's tax rate.

Half of the funds were received by the Town in June of this year, while the remaining half are expected to be sent to the Town in June of 2022.

Among the projects already approved by the Board of Selectmen include the acquisition and installation of an extractor system for the Fire Department, the replacement and upgrade of the combined toilets & lavatories for the holding cells at the Police Department, landscaping and grounds improvements at the Longmeadow Cemetery, replacement of telephone systems at the Fire Department, Police Department and Town Hall, half of the required digital portable radios for the Fire Department, ceiling insulation in the office area of the Police Department, repairs to the Wayne Eddows Field clubhouse, and completion of the storage building adjacent to the Safety Complex.

FY 2022 Budget Work Has Been Completed

Work has been completed by the Board of Selectmen and the members of the Budget Committee on the review and discussion of the budget requests developed by Town boards and departments for the FY 2022 Town budget.

The Selectmen initially received the total Town budget package at its September 27th meeting, and then began meeting with the individual Town officials on October 4th. The budget that has developed totals slightly more than \$6 million, which represents a 4.3% increase over the approved FY 2021 operating budget, which is under the rate of inflation.

On October 14th, the Budget Committee also began its work on the FY 2022 budget by also receiving the total budget package for consideration before beginning individual meetings with Town boards and department heads. The Budget Committee completed its efforts on December 2nd, agreeing with the budget proposals of the Board of Selectmen.

Moving forward, the Budget Committee will finalize the process with the holding of the annual public hearing on the operating budget and proposed warrant articles on Thursday, January 13th. The 2022 Deliberative Session of Town Meeting is expected to be held on Saturday, February 5th when voters will have the opportunity to initially consider the budget and warrant article proposals.

New Deputy Town Clerk and Deputy Tax Collector Named

Following months of an absence of a Deputy Town Clerk, Joann Crete of Auburn has been appointed to fill the position of Deputy Town Clerk and is working along with Town Clerk Kathleen sylvia to learn the many different functions of this position.

And, within recent weeks, former Town Treasurer Walter Milne resigned his position as the Deputy Tax Collector.

As a result, with the recommendation of Tax Collector Susan Jenkins, the Board has appointed BJ Hurly to serve as Deputy Tax Collector.

We take this opportunity to welcome both to the Town Hall and encourage you to say "Hello" when you might see them there.

Happy New Year Auburn Residents!

We hope everyone had happy and healthy holidays last month and are looking forward to what 2022 will bring.

Once again, we are so proud of this community with the response of the Auburn Safety Complex Giving Tree. We had 19 families this year, (the most we have ever had.) Which included 27 adults and 40 children ranging from age 1 to age 17. These families had wish lists consisting of the most basic essentials, dental care products, hats and gloves, sheets and towel. With your help, the Giving Tree was able to provide nearly EVERYTHING on these wish lists, as well as provide toys and fun gifts for the children.

We keep this as anonymous as possible but wanted you to know that these families were moved to tears at the generosity and assistance each of you have provided.

While most of us love the snow during the holidays, it's AFTER the new year that New England seems to be hit with the majority of the storms and snow. A few things to remind each of you as we count down to spring...

Parking During Snowstorms

- A. From November 2nd to April 1st each year no person shall park any motor vehicle on any public way between the hours of 11PM and 8AM or at any time in such manner as to impede snow removal operations.
- B. Any vehicle parking in violation of this may be towed by the road agent, the Chief of Police or their agents, or by independent contractors engaged by the road agent or Chief of Police; any vehicles so towed shall be stored and released to the owner only upon payment of the cost of towing and storage by the owner.
- C. Any person violating Section A hereof shall be subject to a penalty not to exceed twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars for each offense.



-Please be sure to check on elderly residents and neighbors during storms and times of power outages.

-Prepare your vehicle in case of emergencies. Be sure your cellphone is charged, check your tires, add items to your vehicle such as extra hats and gloves, warm blankets, a flashlight and first aid kit.

-Prepare your homes for winter emergencies. Be sure to have flashlights with working batteries, check and clean fireplaces and chimneys, check the batteries in your CO and fire alarm detectors.

-Take precautions when outdoors, even if you think you are only going to be outside for a moment. Wear appropriate clothing, hats, and gloves. Be sure you have proper footwear and add shoe spikes to your boots for ice.

-Don't forget your fur babies! There are many ways their paws can be injured besides freezing ice and snow. Salt, antifreeze, and other de-icers can irritate and injure their paws, as well as cause infections.

We know even in the most cautious of moments, accidents and emergencies can happen. Should you need assistance officers are on patrol 24 hours a day 7 days a week. Please call our 24-hour dispatch should you need help. 603-483-2922

We hope everyone had a wonderful holiday season! How many of you are looking at your seed catalogs and making garden plans for next year? We are! We are so sad that we didn't get to see our members for all of our fun planned festivities in December. We had cancelled due to the COVID 19 surge. Our apologies for any confusion – the Crier came out after the decision had been made. Which will happen again this month as well. Please take the emails as the final word on in person vs zoom. We are going to develop a plan for those that are not online so that they can check in on the status of meetings. We welcome ideas. Things change so fast now and we want everyone to be able to access the up to date info.



We are very pleased to announce that Baker Creek Heirloom Seed Co has sent the club a grab bag of 40-50 seed packets for our projects next season! We will be looking for volunteers to sow indoors or winter sow so that we can plant seedlings next spring. Please let us know if you are interested. Some of the seed packs or seedlings will go to the school for their beds. If you are a teacher or school staff reading this, please give us your wishes, we would like to help you with your beds again next year! We do have the historical society in mind per their request for a project and also Bicentennial park as requested by the town.

We have several wonderful speakers coming in the months ahead. In January, we will have a talk on vegetable gardening by Chris from Lavalley Farms. We will leave plenty of time for questions! We hope to have this meeting in person, at Longmeadow Church in January 12th at 6:30. Please look out for email/Facebook notices in case we have to go to zoom. We will make a decision by 1/7/22. There is a lot of room to social distance at the church and we are really hoping to hold the meeting in person.

Start saving your plastic milk jugs or other plastic (at least 3-4 inches deep) containers for our winter sowing workshop in February. We are hoping for a hands on workshop. Details to come. If we are in person, we will have the soil and seeds (or bring your own) and you can bring your own containers. The containers need to have small holes all over. You can do some research beforehand. Winter sowing is a particular method credited to Trudi Davidoff (wintersown.org). Some of us have found the winter sowers group on Facebook very helpful. You can also email the club and we will send you info on how to prepare your jugs or containers beforehand.

We have other speakers lined up as well. We have Auburn's own Amy Binda, who is a physical therapist. She will be talking to us about Kinesthetics/body mechanics and how to safely move to all the garden tending, bending, stooping, digging. We also have the UNH Master Gardener Program who will be talking about a topic that is voted on by our members.

If you would like to join, please contact us so we can send you a member form, or just show up at a meeting. The cost is \$25/yr. (Under 18 and over 70 join for free!).

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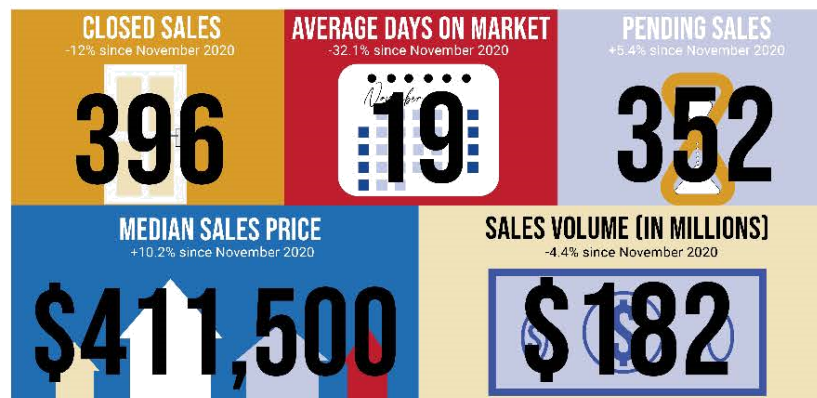
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Rockingham County Market Data Snapshot for November 2021

Refrigeration

Have you wandered around the NH countryside and seen cellar holes surrounded by a low ring of foundation stones? Why dig a cellar hole in stony NH? What purpose did it serve? Dig down 4 feet and the earth is a steady 40 degrees, summer and winter. The cellar hole of 1800 was the equivalent of today's refrigerator. In the summer, the cellar hole cooled milk and produce and kept apples and potatoes from freezing in the winter. Most NH farmers stacked away barrels of apple cider that slowly mellowed into something much stronger.

By the 1840's, people were moving into cities like Manchester. Rail lines were built and steam locomotives would move milk, ice, wood, and coal into the more urban areas. City folk purchased 'ice boxes' and the iceman came right into the kitchen, drained off the water, and left a fresh block of ice that would last a week. After World War II, electrical refrigerators replaced the ice box and the iceman was gone by 1960.

Cutting ice was wet, cold, dangerous work. On the lake with wide open spaces, the winds blow unabated. The ice cakes are wet making the surface slippery and soaking the workers. Scott McDuffie, working for Parker Farms, fell on the ice, cracked his head, and died a couple of days later. In his 1887 Journal, Willard Griffin took his wife Fran and son George on a Sunday afternoon over to the Severance Hotel (360 Manchester Rd) to watch them cutting ice. The following Tuesday, he wrote, "Severance have a horse drowned in Massabesic Pond." A horse in harness that falls through the ice will panic and be almost impossible to save. Men who fell in could be saved if provided with dry clothes before becoming hyperthermic.

The Manchester Coal and Ice Co. had 2 big ice warehouses on Manchester Road. At its height, MCI hired 60 men and harvested 70,000 TONS of ice a year from Lake Massabesic. A conveyor chain with ice tongs moved the ice from the lake, over Rt 121, and into the storage building. For safety reasons, traffic was stopped while the ice was moving overhead. (There was little traffic.). There was a pile of ice that never completed the trip. John Allen carried a chain on his front bumper. He would drive into the pile of scrap ice, chain up a piece, and take it home.

In the warehouse, each layer of ice was packed in a thick blanket of sawdust. While in high school, Harland Eaton and a couple of friends got jobs moving the ice around. The B&M Railroad had a siding behind the warehouse and railroad cars would be loaded and ice shipped as needed.

Dairy farmers needed a lot of ice. Most farmers had their own ice houses. Dean Sanborn, a dairy farmer on Chester Rd in Candia cut ice on ponds in Candia and also cut ice on Massabesic Lake. Frank Prescott lived the big house on the 4 corners in Auburn Village. He built an ice house (7 Chester Road) behind his house for Prescott's Store next door. The store needed ice for produce, meat, and ice cream.

The men who worked on the ice rented the summer cottages along Massabesic. Hand tools used by the ice workers and left behind were still in Lucille Lavoie's garage (5 Cottage Ave) in the 1970's. Stop in to the AHA Museum to see the tools used by the ice workers and pictures of an industry that disappeared 75 years ago.
