

# Auburn Town Hall News



#### **Auburn to Receive Federal Funds**

With most news media sources reporting on the federal American Recovery Act program approved by the U.S. Congress a month or so ago, we can report the Town of Auburn will be receiving funds from this legislation that will hopefully assist the Town and its taxpayers over the next several years.

A final determination is not anticipated for another week or so, but initial indications are the Town of Auburn will receive a total of approximately \$550,000 for use locally. The funds will be coming in two payments of equal amounts – one this year and one next year.

The U.S. Treasury Department has just issued program guidance for this program that is being reviewed now to ensure Auburn utilizes the funds for purposes allowed under the federal law and regulations. It appears the Town will have upwards of three years (through December 2024) to spend or obligate the money, and there will be reporting requirements for the Town to report directly to the Treasury Department how the funds are utilized.

Auburn did well last year in utilizing funding provided to the Town from the original Covid-19 relief packages commonly known as the CARES Act. In that instance, the State of New Hampshire made a portion of its funds available to local governments and Auburn was provided approximately \$133,000 which was utilized among most Town departments.

#### **Town Storage Facility Project to Get Underway**

Following the March approval of funding for a 20' x 60' storage facility to be built adjacent to the Public Safety Complex on Eaton Hill Road, the Town put the project out to bid to get the effort moving forward.

Two local firms submitted proposals for the project and the Board ultimately chose Pidcor, Inc., of Auburn for the project at a total cost of \$107,640.

As we write this article, site work is anticipated to begin around May 22<sup>nd</sup> with building construction to begin shortly afterwards.

With current economic conditions from the Covid-19 pandemic affecting major markets and business sectors around the country and world, the approximate \$26,000 increased cost from the Town's budgeted amount is anticipated to be made up with some of the federal American Recovery Program Act (ARPA) funding that will be coming to Auburn.

#### **Broadband Service Being Reviewed**

Knowing some Auburn residents have been experiencing difficulties with the level or consistency of broadband service they are currently able to receive, the Board of Selectmen has appointed seven residents to a Citizens Broadband Advisory Committee to analyze the level of service currently available and to consider whether the Town might be able to improve on that system.

The individuals serving on this committee include Rep. Jesse Edwards, Sean Finegan, Jan Gonsalves, David Oliveira, Chris Rolfe and Beth Thomerson. Selectman Keith Leclair will be an exofficio member of the committee and has been designated as chair.

Following a process outlined in state statute, the Committee has issued a Request for Information( RFI) to the three firms — Comcast, Consolidated Communications and Grate State Communications — that currently provide some level of broadband service in Auburn. The firms have been asked to provide detailed information concerning the levels of service provided to the Town to enable the committee to make some initial decisions with respect to what service currently exists.

#### **Town Boards and Committees**

Several Auburn residents have been appointed by the Board of Selectmen to various town positions, boards and committees.

Appointed as a new member of the Parks and Recreation Commission is Jennifer Strabone, while Shannon Daoust was appointed as an alternate member of the Zoning Bord of Adjustment.

In partnership with the Auburn Historic Association, Brenda Beer, Dan Carpenter, Pat Clement, Deborah Mancini, Nancy Mayland and David Rogers were appointed as the 2021 Duck Race Committee.

### **Summer Jumping Beans**

Jumping Beans is a class for children ages 2-5 to get out and get moving with the wonderful Miss Joelle!

This class offers moms (or dads, aunts, uncles, grandmas, etc.) and kids an opportunity to make new friends and dance to some of the kiddos favorite songs. We will do simple dance moves to go along with the music. Jumping Beans is a fun upbeat class that offers kids the opportunity to be themselves whether that is dancing with their friends or running around and enjoying the music. Miss Joelle is a fellow Auburn mom that understands the importance of little ones getting out and finding something to put their energy into.



The summer session will run for 5 weeks from July 14 through August 18 (no class on July 21). Classes will be held on Wednesdays from 9:30 am until 10:30 am **outside at the Safety Complex Field**. In the event of rain, the class will be rescheduled. Participants should bring their own mat, beach towel or blanket to each class. The fee for the 5-week session is \$32.

### **Basketball Camp**

Lead by AVS Basketball Coach and Teacher, Coach DeGraffe along with Coach Howell, this camp is a week-long basketball camp where players will have the ability to work on ball handling and defensive skills as well as learn about how to move and handle themselves on the court.

The basketball style that is the foundation of this camp is to teach players how to make choices on the court that maximizes their own set of skills. This style teaches players the basics "rules" for an offense and lets the player use their own creativity on the court to make decisions at game speed. Players will have the ability to practice these decisions in daily full scrimmages then take time to break down and learn about their choice on the court.



Defensively players will learn the basic and advanced skills for setting up and creating a man-to-man defense on their own and how to make adjustments at game speed. Concepts and position for different situations will be introduced and when they are used will become a part of their decision-making process on the court.

The camp is open to students who will be entering 5th and 6th grade. Camp will be held in the AVS gym and will be held for one week only, July 19-23 8:30 am through 2:00 pm. The fee for the week is \$199.00.



### **NH Rec Esports League- Summer Session**

Season Starts July 12

Our second season of Esports is here. Esports is one of the fastest growing competitions in the world. This league is a safe way for players to compete with friends on your own in the comfort and safety of your own home.

We are offering the following games in our Spring competitions: Rocket League (3 v 3, any device)- Wednesdays Rocket League (1 v 1, any device)- Wednesdays Madden21 (1 v 1, PlayStation or Xbox)- Mondays Super Smash Bros. (1 v 1, Nintendo Switch)- Thursdays Fortnite (1 v 1, any device)- Tuesdays Fortnite (2 v 2, any device)- Fridays



There are three age categories, Youth 8-12, Teen 13-17, and Adult 18+. You also register according to skill level, beginner or advanced.

Leagues will be run through GGLeagues online gaming and will consist of a six-week season where players will play one game a week. At the end of the season, players will participate in a single elimination tournament to crown the champion. All games will be played within the NH Rec Esports League. All players will be registered through their own town recreation department. The season starts July 12<sup>th</sup> and the deadline to register is June 28<sup>th</sup>. The cost is \$30 per person per league (players can play in multiple leagues).

To play, you must have a console/computer to play on, email address, own the game you are registering to play and have the ability to play live. All games are monitored by GGLeagues and players are held to a code of conduct to maintain a fun and safe gaming atmosphere.

## **Camp Adventure**

What is pickleball? Pickleball is a paddleball sport that combines elements of badminton, table tennis, and tennis. Two or four players use solid paddles made of wood or composite materials to hit a perforated polymer ball, much like a wiffle ball, over a net. The sport shares features of other racquet sports: the dimensions and layout of a badminton court, and a net and rules somewhat similar to tennis, with several modifications.

## Hello Auburn Residents,

Summer is here! With the nice weather we will see more people enjoying the "Great Outdoors". Our residents have been very courteous when travelling in and around town and it's appreciated. Please continue to give bicyclists a wide berth and look twice for motorcycles.

We have seen an uptick in vehicle break ins. Please be diligent about removing valuables from your vehicles and locking your cars, even when parking your car at your home for the night.

Auburn officers continue to help the New Hampshire National Guard regularly at the SNHU COVID vaccination site. The state reports that about 60% of residents have received their first vaccination, and about 40% are fully vaccinated. It is refreshing to see that restrictions are being relaxed throughout the state and we are all looking forward to a summer of catching up with friends and family and planning summer vacations and traditions that we have had to cancel or postpone. 

# AUBURN FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS



#### SAFETY TIPS

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.
- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

#### CHARCOAL GRILLS

- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Xeep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

# PROPANE Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light scap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill

If the flame **goes out**, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least **5 minutes** before re-lighting it.

### **FACTS**

- 1 July is the peak month for grill fires.
- Roughly half of the injuries involving grills are thermal burns.


#### **Longmeadow Serves!** Bringing you good news of great joy!

# News from the Auburn Historical Association

The Orin Chase House and Artist Frank French By Dan Carpenter

Charles Spofford (1840-1916) had a cabin overlooking Canfield Cove on Lake Massabesic that he rented out to summer folk. One of those renters was the artist Frank French (1859-1933). French was an illustrator for the Manchester newspaper 'Mirror and Farmer' from 1870 to 1880. During this time period, French also maintained an art studio in Manchester. He left Manchester and headed to New York City where he attracted world-wide attention as an illustrator, engraver, and painter. French's engravings won prizes at the 1893 Columbia Exhibition in Chicago and again at the 1904 St Louis World's Fair. When did French rent the Spofford cabin? Was it during the 1870's when he lived in Manchester or was it later when he summered in NH during his 45 year stint in New York?

A French painting depicting a Hamblet farmhouse is now owned by the Chase family. Heading toward Chester, Charles and George Spofford's farm abutted 2 Hamblett Farms, George and Amos. All 3 farms had frontage on Lake Massabesic and road frontage on what is now Spofford Rd. Amos Hamblett sold to the Manchester Water Works in 1889 and George sold in 1898. When the Hamblet's sold out, Charles Spofford acquired their carriage shed. The Spoffords jacked up the building and moved it with oxen past their own house (328 Spofford Rd) and set it up at what is now 338 Spofford Rd.

In 1925, George Spofford (1869-1969) sold 10 acres which included the Hamblet carriage shed to a young couple, Orrin and Lena Chase. Orrin Chase converted the carriage shed into a house and the couple raised their only child, Orrin 'Herb' Chase, here. After serving in the US Navy during World War II, Herb Married Marjorie Cavanaugh in 1945 and moved to Manchester. They had two children, Christine and Edward. Herb and Marjorie returned to Auburn in 1970 (to the Londonderry Turnpike) and were very involved in local affairs.

After his Grandparents died, Edward Chase moved into the house on Spofford Rd. and lived there until his untimely death in 1980. Then, his sister, Christine and her son Jacob O'Neil, lived there and added a new modern kitchen. Christine sold the house and the new owners expanded into the side yard. A building that was originally designed for horse drawn vehicles became a home for 4 generations of the Chase family.



# **GIRL SCOUT NEWS**




