

First Issue Property Tax Bills

By the time you are receiving this June edition of the Auburn Village Crier, you should have also received the first issue property tax bill for 2020.

There are two property tax bills issued by the Town each year; the first bill in late May to early June which is due in early July. And the second tax bill is issued in late October to

early November and is due in early December.

The first issue tax bill tax is based on one half of the previous years' tax rate multiplied by the current assessed valuation for each property. For the most recent tax bills mailed the tax rate used is \$9.41 per thousand, which is one-half of 2019's rate of \$18.81 per thousand.

Based on the Town's current net assessed valuation of \$875,912,077, the property tax warrant for the first issue tax bill raises a total of approximately \$8.2 million to cover costs of the Town, School District and County for the first half of the year.

The current tax bill is due by July 6th bill.

Auburn and Covid-19 Pandemic

The Town of Auburn continues to fair well through the Coivd-19 pandemic. Since the declaration of a State of Emergency by the Governor on March 13th, there have been a total of 21 Auburn residents who have been reported to have tested positive for the Covid virus. At this point in time, all have recovered with no Auburn residents currently on the watch list in mid-May.

As a result of the pandemic, the federal government has approved several relief and recovery measures which has resulted in \$1.2 billion coming to the State of New Hampshire to provide a wide range of assistance. As part of these funds, the Town of Auburn has been allocated

\$132,293 in general funds for the reimbursement of expenses expressly associated with the pandemic. In addition, approximately \$56,000 has also been allocated for the provision of a First Responder Stipend to active fire, emergency medical and law enforcement personnel.

Beyond these funds that are being administered through the Governor's Office, the President declared a federal emergency declaration for all 50 states, which activated the Federal Emergency Management Agency and a disaster relief funding mechanism intended to cover a portion of the costs for emergency protective measures implemented by the Town.

Town officials are working through the various sources of funding to ensure the Town receives what it should through the many different sources available.

We do want to recognize the ongoing efforts of Fire Chief and Emergency Management Director Mike Williams, who has done an extraordinary job in the overall management and coordination of the Town's efforts during the State of Emergency. And Police Chief Ray Pelton's leadership of the Auburn Police Department to ensure the safety and protection of the community is maintained, as well as that of the members of the department.



Additional Town Appointments

Since last month, the Board of Selectmen has made a few more appointments to Town positions.

At the recommendation of the Board | And at the recommendation of the of Library Trustees, the Selectmen re -appointed Brenda Beer to another term as an Alternate member of the Board of Library Trustees.

Fire Chief, the Board has nominated Michael Sullivan to serve as a Deputy Forest Fire Warden.

No Change in Police Commission

After having time to consider his term of office on the Police Commission, Michael Rolfe has made the decision not to resign this position before his term ends in March 2021. As a result, the Board of Selectmen

do not have a vacancy to fill by appointment.

The Board thanks the 10 Auburn residents who reached out and indicated they were interested and willing to accept appointment to the posi-

tion. Mr. Rolfe has indicated he will not run for re-election to the Police Commission in March 2021 when his terms ends, so the position will be up for election for a full three-year term at that point.


Remote Learning Update

AVS continues to make strides in our remote learning. The majority of students are very engaged, but it is no secret that the model is a strain on parents, students and staff. That being said, the school board voted to end school on June 5th rather than the planned day of June 15th. This will allow teachers to plan for the number of possible scenarios that the beginning of the 20-21 school year may bring. We are exploring a full range of possibilities, including continued "remote learning" and a hybrid approach that might have groups of students alternating between classroom instruction and online studies. An Auburn School Reentry committee, composed of school staff and the SAU, has been formed and expects to have more information from Governor Sununu and the NH Department of Education next month. But, things could remain uncertain into July. We will be keeping everyone informed and there will be additional surveys or opportunities for parent input and involvement.

AVS has also begun Independent Learning Days on Wednesdays. This is a day for students to learn and explore subjects that spark their interest. Students have been encouraged to take the day to explore a passion for anything that they might not have time to do when engaged in a traditional learning environment. Some of

the students designed their own clothing line, planned a treehouse or built a bike trail. Jack Moutlton and his brother Charlie spent the morning observing birds from different spots in the yard as he made his observations. The brothers and their parents worked together to make a Google Doc to collect their observations. They will then work to turn these sheets into different parts of a presentation.

They did computer research to find the woodpeckers sounds and how to write them. Sydney Montgomery ran into some supply delays when she began her initial scrapbooking project, so she used her second Independent Learning Day to plan and make lunch for her family. Sydney made chicken noodle soup for her family and set the table with a very pretty set up. She also dressed up as the hostess to greet all of them

and everything in between. Please check out our website for details on how to register for this virtual presentation.









News from the Auburn Historical Association

Auburn's Rip-Roaring Era Recalled By Dan Carpenter



Back in the late 1800's through early 1900's there was a bar inside of this property. As many as 14 such establishments were situated in this same area, with easy access to the trolley going to and from Manchester. This one is still standing, situated on Manchester Road across from the old Severance School House and is now used as an apartment building.



This photo is from a local newspaper article circa the late 1950's of the old Auburn Police Station that also housed the jail. The building sat across from what is now the highway overpass on Manchester Road until it was torn down. There is now a retention pond where it once stood.

In 1896, 126 "citizens of Auburn" petitioned the Selectmen "to close for good all places...that are used for the sale or given all spirits or malt liquors, wine, or ciders and gambling and disorderly houses." The total population of Auburn in 1900 was 682 people. In other words, 19% of Auburn's residents asked the Selectmen to do something about drinking, gambling, and "disorderly houses". One would assume that a petition of this importance, signed by so many residents, would force the Selectmen to act.

In 1902, Rockingham County, made up of 36 towns, reported that 230 prisoners served time at the county farm. Forty seven of those prisoners (or 20%) came from the little town of Auburn. Most of the Auburn prisoners served 30 days and some served 60 days.

So, what was going on? Manchester was a "dry" town. NO ALCOHOL. If you needed a drink, you took the trolley to Lake Massabesic. Auburn, a "wet" town, had 14 legal liquor establishments, most right there at the end of the trolley line. If you enjoyed yourself too much, you risked spending the night in the Auburn jail and then being sentenced for public drunkenness. Most of those sentenced came from someplace else!

The police station (above right) was a one-story building when it was first built and only had 2 or 3 cells. But within just a few years, as the barrooms grew in number, a second story was added along with more jail cells that were bigger and stronger.

A different day A different time.





