

Tax Rate Increase Expected in December - Be Prepared!

For 2019, the property tax rate for Auburn is expected to increase by a minimum of \$2 per thousand dollars.

Why are my taxes going up so much? There are several reasons which include increased budgets for the school district and town that were approved by voters in March, in addition to increased expenses for the county. The largest single increase for the school budget is the first full year principle and interest payment due on the bond for the addition/renovation of the Auburn Village School.

The July 2019 bill will be 1/2 of the total taxes paid in 2018. We are expecting the 2019 tax rate to be approximately \$19.25 per thousand dollar assessed value of your home, compared to the 2018 tax rate of \$17.06 per thousand dollar value of your home. (This rate is for planning purposes only - the actual tax rate will be set by the State of NH in October)

Example: Assessed Value: \$350,000 2018 Annual Tax: \$5971 July 2019 Bill: \$2986 (\$5971 divided by 2 - rounded up) Annual Tax Bill for 2019: \$6737 (350 X \$19.25) December Bill: \$3751 (annual tax (\$6737) minus July payment (\$2986) Increase of \$765

Plan ahead - You can make payments towards the December bill at any time to lessen the impact of the expected tax increase. If your taxes are escrowed you should make sure that you will not have a short fall in your escrow account - one way to do this is to make additional tax payments with the tax collector.

Friday July 26 someone will be at the Complex from 2-4 and again 6-8. We hope to get a head start on organizing books and will welcome all the help we can get.


Saturday the sale is 8 to 3. Sunday is bargain day from 11-3. We can use help boxing up books and cleaning the area.

Auburn Village School Receives State Recognition

The award presentation was part of the annual New Hampshire Emergency Preparedness Conference held in Manchester on June 4th.

Presented jointly by the NH Department of Safety and the NH Department of Education, the Auburn Village School was recognized for actively working to promote emergency preparedness through its school programming, training and drills. The school has an active emergency management committee that includes three parents, three Auburn police officers, the Auburn Fire Chief, nine AVS staff members and two AVS administrators.

With the active encouragement and participation of AVS Principal Lori Collins, the committee meets regularly and is continually working to improve emergency processes and procedures for the school. The school is actively working to emphasize mitigation through programs like 'Choose Love Movement', and also has a robust training and drilling program.

First established in 2015, the School Emergency Preparedness Award is intended to recognize an individual and/ or a school that has exhibited the highest standard of excellence, dedication and accomplishment in the field of school emergency preparedness.

"The awardees efforts in school emergency preparedness have resulted in or will result in the saving of lives, lessening of injury or property in time of or prior to a disaster or emergency," according to Judith Emmert of the NH Department of Safety's Community Outreach Office.

The award was presented during the annual luncheon held as part of the Emergency Preparedness conference attended by hundreds of emergency services personnel and officials from throughout the state.

Auburn Fire Department News



There's nothing like outdoor grilling. It's one of the most popular ways to cook food. But, a grill placed too close to anything that can burn is a fire hazard. They can be very hot, causing burn injuries. Follow these simple tips and you will be on the way to safe grilling.

SAFETY TIPS

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Weep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Weep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
-))) Never leave your grill unattended.
- Malways make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

CHARCOAL GRILLS

- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Weep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

PROPANE Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light scap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the scapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.

If the flame **goes out**, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least **5 minutes** before re-lighting it.

July is the peak month for grill fires.

Roughly half of the injuries involving grills are thermal burns.

Combined all vegetables together.


In a separate bowl mix together ingredients for the dressing.
