Basketball Camp

AUBURN POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS

Do you have a United States, NH or POW/MIA flag that needs to be retired? Did you know you could drop it off at the police department for proper disposal?

The Auburn Police Department will be hosting a flag retirement ceremony, on Flag Day Tuesday June 14. We will be retiring any United States flag, State flag or POW/MIA flag that is no longer suitable for display.

The ceremony has a tentative start time of 11:00 am. Feel free to stay for the ceremony and if you are not able to attend drop off your flag and we will ensure that it is retired in a dignified





The U.S. Marshals and the FBI are alerting the public of several nationwide imposter scams involving individuals claiming to be U.S. marshals, court officers, or other law enforcement officials. During the latest series of calls, scammers identifying themselves as "Deputy John Garrison" (the name of the actual U.S. Marshal in the Eastern District of Texas) attempt to collect a fine in lieu of arrest due to a claim of identity theft, failing to report for jury duty or other offenses.

Scammers use many tactics to sound and appear credible such as provide information like badge numbers, names of actual law enforcement officials and federal judges, along with courthouse addresses.

They may also spoof their phone numbers to appear on caller IDs as if they are calling from a government agency or the court when they actually are not.

Things to remember:

- U.S. MARSHALS WILL NEVER ask for credit/debit card/gift card numbers, wire transfers, or bank routing numbers, or to make bitcoin deposits for any purpose.
- NEVER divulge personal or financial information to unknown callers.
- Report scam phone calls to your local FBI office and to the FTC.
- You can remain anonymous when you report. .
- Authenticate the call by calling the clerk of the court's office of the U.S. District Court in your area and verify the court order given by the caller.

AUBURN FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS



Pets give us comfort, friendship, and unconditional love. Our connection to them can be among the strongest relationships in our lives. But pets can cause fires. We need to be careful with pets in the home.

SAFETY TIPS

- Pets are curious. They may bump into, turn on, or knock over cooking equipment. Keep pets away from stoves and countertops.
- Keep pets away from candles, lamps, and space heaters.
- Always use a metal or heat-tempered glass screen on a fireplace and keep it in place.
- Keep pets away from a chimney's outside vents. Have a "pet-free zone" of at least 3 feet (1 meter) away from the fireplace. Glass doors and screens can stay dangerously hot for several hours after the fire goes out.
- Consider battery-operated, flameless candles. They can look and smell like real candles.
- Some pets are chewers. Watch pets to make sure they don't chew through electrical cords. Have any problems checked by a professional.

SMOKE ALARMS

- Have working smoke alarms on every level of the home. Test your smoke alarms at least once a month.
- If the smoke alarm sounds, get out and stay out.
- Never go back inside for pets in a fire. Tell firefighters if your pet is trapped.

Pets and Wildfires

Make sure pets are included in your family's wildfire evacuation plan. Build an evacuation kit for each pet in your household. Ensure each kit is a size and weight that can be quickly and easily loaded into a vehicle when packing to evacuate.



FACT

Pets or wild animals have a part in starting about 750 home fires per year. These involve cooking equipment, fireplaces and chimneys, space heaters, lamps, bulbs, wiring, and candles.

News from the Massabesic Garden Club

The sun is out, the plants are growing and everyone is smiling. This is the best time of the year! Over the past several months, members have learned about soil and how to maintain the proper nutrients for healthy and happy gardens but what about CONTAINER GARDENS!?! Container gardens are wonderful for they save space, time and mobility as they can be located for the best sun option. Maintaining a garden can be work intensive but developing a few containers could bring your garden up close for the most enjoyment.


The bonus to container gardening is ANYTHING can become a small garden! This is an amazing opportunity to up cycle. The traditional terra cotta or whiskey barrels are wonderful but so is a 5-gallon bucket or an old wheelbarrow. Ensuring the container is the right size with proper drainage for the plants you want to grow is most important. The general rule is to use the largest container possible as it allows the roots more space and the soil will hold moisture longer thus requiring less watering.

Here are the basic tips for creating an awe-inspiring container garden:

- 1. Select where you want the container
 - Is there enough sun in this location? Can I get water to this location?
- 2. Select what plants you'll have in your container
 - You can select flowers or vegetables to plant. Think about what plants work well together- broccoli with dill; radishes with cucumbers; beans with carrots.
- 3. Select your container
 - Select the largest container to match the plants you've selected. Ensure drainage holes- this can be done by drilling or poking holes.
- 4. Gather a few more materials and then PLANT!
 - Container saucer to catch water on the bottom, line the bottom of the container with coffee filters as they can hold the soil in while allowing the water to drain, potting soil meant for containers, slow-release fertilizer (organic), plants or seeds, some mulch/dried leaves for the top to hold in moisture
- 5. Maintain your garden
 - Container gardens require a good amount of water, water when the top inch of soil feels dry. Use organic plant food to keep your plants happy and to help with flower or vegetable growth.





so much and it was such a blessing to once again open the doors of our



Margaret Sanborn Griffin Written by Dan Carpenter

In 1894, the electric trolley was extended out to Massabesic Traffic Circle. At the end of the line the trolley looped around. Within this loop, the trolley company built the Pavilion which hosted fairs, dances, recitals and boxing matches. Walter Parker, President of the Amoskeag Banks was purchasing property on the Londonderry Turnpike and improving his farm/ summer home overlooking Massabesic Back Pond. Parker set up poles and brought electricity from the Traffic Circle to his farm. The lines went right by the Sanborn property, giving the family access to electricity 40 years before most of Auburn had it. The first automobiles in Auburn were probably seen on the Turnpike heading out to Parker's new summer home completed in 1903.

In the 1890's, the bicycle was considered serious transportation. Margaret Sanborn rode her bike down Deerneck Hill, over the bridge, and up to Schoolhouse No. 8, Fox School. Her best friend, Persis Richardson lived across from the school and the two of them explored all over on their bikes. Downtown Derry was a straight shot five miles down the Londonderry Turnpike. After graduating from grammar school, Margaret attended and graduated from Manchester's Central High School in 1907. She probably rode her bike to the Pavilion and took the electric trolley downtown.

With the growth of the tourist industry in Auburn, the introduction of new technology like electricity and the auto, Margaret was exposed to many people with new ideas. These interactions helped Margaret become a successful, independent, decision maker. Over her lifetime, Margaret was at ease making decisions for her family, town, and the State of New Hampshire.

Margaret Sanborn married George Plummer Griffin, the only child of Willard and Frances Griffin in 1909. The younger Griffins moved into the 'Green House' with his parents. Frances died five years later making Margaret the matriarch of the Family at age 26. Willard continued to run the business until his death in 1929. By then, George P. had health issues and Margaret was making day-to-day decisions for the Griffin Lumber Company. George's death in 1935, coupled with the extensive damage caused by the Flood Of 1936, led Margaret to sell Clark's Mill to the Manchester Water Works. She also sold the families extensive land holdings that stretched from Little Massabesic Pond, across Clark's Pond, and above Tower Hill Pond into Hooksett.

George and Margaret had two children, David (1918) and Ethel, (1920). They were in high school when their father died. David served in the USAAF and was in Europe during World War II. Ethel graduated from the NH School of Finance, married, and became active in Manchester politics.

Margaret Griffin was always involved in local politics. She served as Treasurer of the Griffin Free Library for over 40 years. She also held the same position for the same number of years for the Longmeadow Congregational Church. Like her husband and father-in-law before her, Margaret was elected to the NH House Of Representatives in 1949. However, unlike them, she was elected as a Republican while they had been Democrats. Margaret served over 20 years and became a force in statewide Republican politics.

When NH was building the present day Rt 101, they did not want to give Auburn a second exit (They considered Exit I to be Auburn). Margaret worked hard to get Exit 2 with an overpass. Publicity about the horrific crashes that had occurred at the Hooksett Rd intersection helped get the overpass built.

Perhaps reviving the Longmeadow Church was Margaret's greatest achievement. The church had been 'yoked' with the Chester Congregational Church in 1919. By the 1930's, the Longmeadow was practically defunct. While the Longmeadow was ebbing away, the Methodist Bishop reassigned the Aubum Methodist minister, Rev Ryan out of town. Ryan had four teenagers (Pauline Ryan Locke) who were happy in Auburn and liked their educational opportunities. But the Bishop insisted the Ryan family move. Margaret Griffin suggested that Rev Ryan move over to the Longmeadow. He agreed and his entire congregation followed him to the LCC. A few years later, the Methodists gave their building to the Longmeadow and from there it was turned over to the Town of Auburn. Margaret's fingerprints were all over the deal.

When the Town took over the old Methodist Church, they looked for ways to finance the renovations. The Town put a second floor in the former sanctuary for offices. The lower level with Margaret Griffin 's help became the Auburn District Court serving Auburn, Candia, Deerfield, and Northwood. Auburn would be responsible for the court's expenses. Because the Court was located in the Town Hall, the only expenses were paying the salaries of the judge and his clerk. The State allowed Auburn to keep any profit. For 20 years, the Auburn District Court was a moneymaker for Auburn.

Dying at age 94 after a long feisty career, Margaret Griffin 's accomplishments created admiration from both local and NH state officials.


