
# Auburn Town Hall News

By the time this month's Crier arrived, the first property tax bill for 2023 will have been delivered. This "first issue" tax is essentially one-half of last year's full tax bill. New tax rates and property values will be used to calculate the remaining 2023 bill in December.

That second bill in December is expected to look much different, as Auburn is conducting its five-year revaluation this summer. Tax assessments will be adjusted to reflect current market values. We expect that dramatic increases in real estate prices since 2018 will increase many property values in town by 50% or more. The tax rate will be reduced accordingly.

In late May and early June, the town's contracted assessor Avitar Associates, Inc., will be driving through neighborhoods for one final review of properties before the new values are calculated. Property owners will receive a notice of their new assessment in late June or early July. Please visit the town website for more information about the revaluation process to access all related data.

In addition to the revaluation, the Board of Selectmen have been monitoring progress on improvements to the Wayne Eddows Field parking area, and renovations at the Public Safety Complex to prepare for 24-hr staffing at the Fire Department. We are also hoping to see replacement of the Griffin Mill Bridge move forward this year. Reconstruction of Dearborn Road will commence in June as well.



# Friends of the Library Plastic Bag Collection

The Friends of the Library are again beginning to collect 500lbs of plastic. When our goal is reached before October31st, the Library will obtain a free composite bench in return. Another place to sit, read, and enjoy the sounds of nature. Please look for a recycle bin on the library porch. Another drop off location might be added in the future. Please save clean bags, such as shopping, produce, cereal box liners, Ziploc bags, case over wraps, newspaper sleeves, dry cleaning bags, bubble wrap and wood pellet bags.

Just give them a good shake before you give it to us to recycle. Please do not include cellophane.

It's a great way to help out the landfills and our community at the same time.

#### **Blast! Babysitter Training Class**

This BLAST! (Babysitter Lessons & Safety Training) class, from the American Academy of Pediatrics, will teach potential babysitters how to handle the basics of infant and childcare. Participants will gain knowledge in many basic childcare skills, as well as the fundaments of emergency care. The training will include pediatric first aid, household safety and fundamentals of childcare.

This class is open to students in grades 5-8. Participants receive a certificate of completion, easy to follow first aid instructions and a sitter checklist to copy for each job. Gardening season is finally here!! We have had a wonderful fall, winter and spring of educational talks and fun. We have been busy with several projects. As always, we will take a break from our monthly meetings during the summer, and our next monthly meeting will be on Wednesday September 13th at 6:30 pm at Severance School. We will have Ron Trexler from UNH cooperative extension speaking to us about putting the garden to rest in the fall. Ron has given several talks for us before and he is very engaging and informative.

We will also see you at our booth at the Duck Race, where we will be (surprise!) selling plants. We will also have educational materials available regarding the benefits of gardening with native plants. We will also have our and our pledge board, where you or the kiddos can put a heart at the location of your on the

map, if you pledge to be more pollinator friendly. This can be as simple as stocking a window box with pollinator friendly plants. Together we can all make a difference.

The Club is currently working on three projects. As of this writing, the plant sale with friends of the Library will have taken place already – we hope it was a great success as our two mighty groups joined forces for this event! The other longer term project is at the Massabesic Audubon Center, which we are calling the Barn garden. This summer will be one of cleaning out, studying existing plants to identify what is there as it has been a few years since it has been tended to. Our goal is to have mostly or all native plantings to support the eco system. The third project is in partnership with Pollinator Pathways, who has allowed us to be a part of their 'Stepping Stone' grant. We had the pleasure of awarding five 6'x9' garden plots of seeds to the 5 folks that applied to the club. The end goal is to support pollinators.

We would love to see you in our club! We are up to around 80 members and have been growing each month! Annual memberships will be renewed in September or you can sign up now to get your card. Benefits include: socializing with an amazing group, learning about all sort of gardening and nature related topics, community volunteerism and discounts at local businesses to include Agway (10%), and Bagley Pond Perennials (10%). We have previously had a few other places, but need to check with them this new season . More info can found on our website as we obtain more discounts. We are also looking for at least 2 board members and will be holding elections later this summer. Please email us through the website if you are interested. #### Summer Worship Opportunities

The summer always gives us a bit of a break from our many routines and we have the opportunity to try different things. We are delighted that in July we are bringing back our Breakfast Church, in which instead of gathering in what is typically our stifling hot sanctuary for worship (ah... the joys and challenges of gathering in a 250-year-old building!) we gather in our Fellowship Hall for worship. At 9:30 on each of the Sundays in July, we will gather around tables to share breakfast together and worship in more interactive ways. It is a casual gathering of friends who love each other and our God and we invite you to join us. In August we are hoping to also gather outside for worship a few Sundays (weather permitting) which we discovered loving so much as we were emerging from the social distancing of the pandemic. Would You Like to Serve Alongside Longmeadow?

Whether you are a member of our worshipping community or not, we would like to invite you serve alongside us as we seek to serve the vulnerable in our community. And we have created ways you can participate:

- In June we hold an annual targeted food drive to benefit the Chester Food Pantry, which serves Auburn residents. The summer months are usually a lean time for food pantries, and we want to help them stock up their shelves with the items they have identified as needing. This year those items are Peanut Butter and Tomato Sauce. Throughout June there will be a lidded plastic tub on the steps of the Tiny Tots Pre-School where you can leave a donation of any size jars of peanut butter or tomato sauce (new, sealed jars, within date only please, and plastic makes it easier for us to transport, but not required).
- Also on June 11, we look forward to welcoming Terry Everett of Anchored in Hope to share with us in our worship service about her work with people who are homeless. We have been blessed to join Terry in this ministry and look forward to her being our next speaker in our Faith in Action worship series.
- In July and August, we will be holding a School Supply Drive to assist both students at AVS and around the world in areas where people are struggling with desperate poverty. We will be filling backpacks for local students and school bags for Church World Service to distribute. In the months of July and August, the same plastic tub on the Tiny Tots porch will be available to accept your donations of school supplies. We ask that you only donate the items included in the list below. Also, all donations must be new, we cannot accept used items.

# News from the Auburn Historical Association



More Old-Timer Stories, Bill Blake

Before 1980, the Auburn Police Department was staffed by part-timers who were on call. In other words, for the most part, police officers were not patrolling. When a call came in, a part-timer would respond. Fortunately for the Town, the Manchester Water Works hired full time patrolmen and many of them were Auburn residents. This worked well for Auburn because they knew the Town, the people, and they spent most of their time patrolling in Auburn. However, MWW patrolmen were not certified police officers and they did not carry weapons. (Today, they are and they do.)

Bill and his friend, George Gross (a Manchester Water Works and Auburn patrolman, who lived at 685 Chester Road) went up to Hooksett to buy a chainsaw. They came back down Hooksett Rd, through Sell's Corner (Exit II), over the wooden B &M Railroad Bridge, and past Aldis Christie's house which was across the road from the old Fairlawn Manor. As they drove past Depot Rd, they saw Ernie Smeltzer,(185 Hooksett Rd) an elderly person, running into the road and waving his arms like a madman. They stopped. "Robbers!" "They were still in the house"..."They fired a shot into the floor...". "They stashed my coin collection in the bushes." As Bill and George got out of the car, a man came out of the house holding a gun. He ran toward the stone wall back of the house. Waving the gun around, he fired a wild shot, attempted to throw the gun away and tried to get over the wall. At that moment, Bill caught up with him and sat on him until he could be properly restrained. At the trial, Ernie the homeowner, Bill Blake, MWW Patrolman, and NH State Police Officer Bill Dodge were prepared to testify when the defendant plead guilty and was sentenced to 5 years in prison. After completing his sentence, he was killed in an armed robbery in Massachusetts.

Being a WW patrolman in your hometown did have disadvantages. Bill caught many kids swimming, many warnings were issued and a few tickets handed out. For the most part, the kids realized he was just doing his job and he still sees some of them today. Three friends from the Auburn Volunteer Fire Department, Ricky Davis, Cedric Preston, and Jim Trombly, for years had an annual sleepover on Ladies Island (Out from Clair's Landing). "We would invite you, Bill. But....". Bill assumed that swimming was a large part of the festivities.

Bus stops are an example of some things never seem to change. Bill walked from his house on Hooksett Rd to the Rockingham Rd intersection (Lewis-McEvoy Elmwood Farm) where he caught the bus to Auburn Village School. Don Dollard, who lived next door to his Uncle Frank (Dunkin Donuts) walked to Severance School. Today, Cole Eaton, (Son of Zach, grandson of Albie, great-grandson of George) gets off the bus by himself at Addie Davis's corner (Eaton Hill Rd and Colman Rd). The bus then passes him as it drives right past his house.

# News from the Auburn Historical Association

Auburn is a small town and in many ways is stuck in its small town ways. People enjoy ranting and raving over stupid stuff that has no bearing on the big picture. Fifty years ago, street lights could always get an argument at Town Meeting. "We don't need them." "We pay too much." "Why am I paying for a light on the other side of town?"

Another favorite Town Meeting argument was the roads chosen for upgrades. By the 1970's, Auburn was a commuter town and needed good roads. By the 1980's, the Road Agent and the Selectmen convinced the community that they had a plan and that all roads would be addressed. Its been decades since roads were a Town Meeting discussion and Auburn now has some of the best roads in NH.

Barbara Kingsbury and her neighbors were concerned that the commercial development of King St. would negatively affect their neighborhood. Herb Chase and Al Bourque feared that Waste Management's Transfer Station on the Londonderry Turnpike would lower property values. Some people were convinced that Myles Travel Plaza at Exit II would bring noise and prostitution to the area. None of the worst fears of people came to pass and increased economic activity is good for the community. Auburn is still a nice place to live. Bill recommends that people emulate the willow tree. The willow bends in times of adversity and has the ability to rebound and stand up straight when the troubles pass.
