A Sustained Focus for 2019

As we look forward to the coming • year and beyond, the Board of Selectmen was able to take some time in mid-January to participate in a facilitated workshop meeting intent on identifying goals for the Town during the coming year.

This was the fourth consecutive year the Board has participated in a goal setting process to help focus attention on major items of attention and interest.

Part of this process involved first looking at the four goals identified for activity in 2019 and gauging what level of success was achieved. A quick recap of 2019 includes:

Focus on potential development of the south end of Auburn including potential for water line installation, Planning Board meeting with reputable developers concerning regulations, and development of 55+ zoning regulations.

The Board of Selectmen had the Town's engineers review the potential of bringing water service to this area and it was agreed it was too costly for consideration at this time. The Planning Board met with several reputable developers and ultimately developed a 55 and Older Housing Regulation that is being presented to voters in March 2020 for approval.

Research renovation for the Police Department and storage plan for Parks and Recreation.

The Town was able to design and build a renovation and addition to the Police Department in 2019 that addresses the need for separated locker rooms, records storage capacity and additional storage for larger items. A warrant article before the voter in March 2020 seeks to fund a 20' x 40' storage building for Parks and Recreation which, if approved, would be built in 2020 on the grounds of the Safety Complex.

Exploration of Digitizing of Town Records.

> This process was reviewed in 2019 including securing a rough cost estimate from a recognized vendor on the potential cost for outsourcing the scanning to digitize documents. This project will be ready to go out to bid in the Summer of 2020 for initial funding to be included in the FY 20201 budget.

The Board has just received and published a formal document detailing their thoughts and discussions for the goal setting for 2020, which has been shared with department heads, boards and committees, and the public

as a whole. We are pleased to indicate in general the five main goals our Board identified for our collective efforts in 2020:

- Completion of the storage garage project for Parks and Recreation if approved by the voters in March 2020.
- Develop a partnership with the Trustees of the Library to formulate a plan for the expansion of the library and provision of a community center space. Overall, this is anticipated to be a long-term process that in 2020 will involve community surveying, professional evaluation of the land and current library building to determine development and expansion potential, possible focus group discussions and the holding of a facilitated community forum for input.
- Focus on the Town's building maintenance efforts needs for five public buildings and determine how best to address protecting and maintaining those Town assets. Depending on potential funding from voters in March 2020, the Town is looking to begin renovations and improvements to the Pingree Hill Fire Station and insulate the Safety Complex in 2020.

Lead by AVS Basketball Coach and Teacher, Coach DeGraffe along with Coach Howell, this is a weeklong co-ed basketball camp where players will have the ability to work on ball handling and defensive skills as well as learn about how to move and handle themselves on the court. The basketball style that is the foundation of this camp is to teach players how to make choices on the court that maximizes their own set of skills. This style teaches players the basics "rules" for an offence and lets the player use their own creativity on the court to make decisions at game speed.

Defensively players will learn the basic and advanced skills for setting up and creating a man to man defense on their own and how to make adjustments at game speed. Concepts and position for different situations will be introduced and when they are used will become a part of their decision-making process on the court.







What to do if your car is on fire


- Pull over as quickly as it is safe to do so, be sure to use your signal as you make your way to a safe location off the road such as the breakdown lane or rest stop.
- Once you have stopped, TURN OFF the engine.
- GET everyone out of the car. Never return to a burning car for anything.
- MOVE everyone at least 100 feet from the burning car and well away from traffic.
- CALL 9-1-1.

How to prevent a car fire

- Have your car serviced regularly by a professionally trained mechanic. If you spot leaks, your car is not running properly, get it checked. A well-maintained car is less likely to have a fire.
- If you must transport gasoline, transport only a small amount in a certified gas can that is sealed.
 Keep a window open for ventilation.
- Gas cans and propane cylinders should never be transported in the passenger compartment.
- Never park a car where flammables, such as grass, are touching the catalytic converter.
- Drive safely to avoid an accident.

Know the danger signs

- Cracked or loose wiring or electrical problems, including a fuse that blows more than once
- Oil or fluid leaks
- Oil cap not on securely
- Rapid changes in fuel or fluid level, or engine temperature



FACT

Most crashes do NOT result in fire. In the event of any crash, call 9-1-1. If there is no sign of fire, wait for emergency assistance to help any injured individuals out of the car.

The "Devil's Den Cottage"



This little house that sits on Hooksett Road just north of the Auburn Village School has quite a history. The cottage floors at one time belonged to a dance hall...

In 1894, the Manchester Union Leader reported that a 'cyclone' had swept across the northern end of Lake Massabesic. Boats were tossed onto dry land, the pilot house of a steamboat blew off and Noah Reed's dance hall fell flat! Everything of value was salvaged and the nails were driven out of the wood, to be used again.

Every N.H. "Gazetteer" told stories about the Devil's Den in Auburn. With the arrival of the automobile, Devil's Den became a destination. The Hazelton family owned the Devil's Den property and decided to put up a cottage where ice cream and hot dogs were sold to the "tourists". The salvaged oak floor boards from Noah Reed's old dance hall became the cottage floor. After the depression, the refreshment stand was no longer used.

When John Sargent came home from WWII he needed a place for his family. His in-laws owned a lot on Hooksett Road. The cottage was jacked up, put on Cliff Stacy's truck and moved 2 miles into the Village where it is still there to-day!
