We have two new members: Alice Hodgdon and Mary Page. Welcome ladies! I hope you enjoy the comradery as much as the rest of us do!



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

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Basketball Camp July 11-July 15



There is still space available in the Summer Basketball Camp. Coaches and Howell are returning for another year to run this program. It is a weeklong co-ed basketball camp where players will have the ability to work on ball handling and defensive skills as well as learn about how to move and handle themselves on the court. The basketball style that is the foundation of this camp is to teach players how to make choices on the court that maximizes their own set of skills. This style teaches players the basics "rules" for an offence and lets the player use their own creativity on the court to make decisions at game speed.

Summer Basketball Camp runs Monday, July 11 through July 15, 8:30 am until 2:00 pm. It is open to students entering grades 5-8 for the 2022-2023 school year.

Flag Football Wednesdays, May 4- June 1

Registration is still open for the spring Flag Football program. Flag Football will be held at the Safety Complex field at 2:45-3:45 pm for grades 5-8 and 4:00 - 5:00 pm for grades 1-4. The 5-week programs begin on May 4 and run through June 1. The fee for the program is \$65.

The spring session will run from May 4 through June 8. Classes will be held on Wednesdays from 9:30 am until 10:30 am outside at the Safety Complex Field. In the event of rain, the class will be rescheduled. The fee for the 6-week session is \$42. Tai Chi (Spring Session)

Thursdays, April 28-June 16

The next session of Tai Chi started April 28, but new registrations are welcome at any point. Tai Chi is a mind-body exercise from China. It has its roots in martial arts, philosophy, and Traditional Chinese Medicine. The Tai Chi forms are slow, gentle choreographed movements that gracefully flow from one to the next like a dance. More and more seniors are doing Tai Chi to improve their health and reduce their risk of falling.

This 8-week session will start on Thursday, April 28 at 11:00 am at the Town Hall. (We'll head outside to Bicentennial Park when the weather is nice.) This session will run through June 16. The cost for the session is \$58.

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
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AUBURN POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS

The nice weather is here!!!! Which means we all want to get out into the fresh air and sunshine. Please be aware of more people walking and riding bikes on the roadways.



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AUBURN FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS



SAFETY TIPS

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.
- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

CHARCOAL GRILLS

- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Weep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

PROPANE Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light scap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.

If the flame **goes out**, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least **5 minutes** before re-lighting it.

The test results will give you a clear picture of the specific soil amendments for your garden.

May is Membership Month, and all members renew at this time. You will find the form on our website for new and renewing members. Fill it out and submit the form, then mail your check to PO Box 91, Auburn, or bring it to the May 11th meeting. Membership is \$25, waived if under 18 years old or 70 or more years young.

The June meeting, location to be determined, will focus on composting.

Tip of the month—it's not too early to plant peas! In fact, some folks prepare their beds in the fall, leave a shallow trench, and then add the seeds for shelling peas or pea pods as soon as the soil can be moved to fill that trench. Plant your seeds, then provide some kind of structure for the vines to climb, such as 3' branches trimmed from trees (pea brush, my grandmother called it) or use strings on a trellis or wire fencing. As the weather warms, keep the roots covered by hoeing up a bit of soil around them. Enjoy your harvest in early summer.

Garden Club News and Earth Day Celebration

Members of the Massabesic Garden Club came to conduct a winter seed sowing demonstration with the 8th graders. Some students were not too excited about "getting their hands dirty," but felt a sense of pride to have helped establish seedlings for the K-5th grade garden beds. The 8th graders celebrated Earth Day a bit early by learning about microplastics and engaging in an AVS litter clean up. A whopping 2,406 pieces of litter were collected! Because of the hard work of Mrs. Patience Joy, our Garden Club was a recipient of a grant to produce rain barrels through the River Network. River Network supports the construction of more than 1,400 rain barrels every year at 50+ workshops. Generous support from the Coca-Cola Company helps River Network connect approved workshop hosts with local Coca-Cola bottlers or



ingredient drums. The drums are capable of capturing and storing rainwater which can be used for a variety of household purposes including watering gardens and lawns. Rain barrels help people save money on water bills, reduce demand for treated tap water, control erosion around foundations, save water for use during droughts, and reduce the amount of polluted stormwater that flows into our rivers and lakes. Rain barrels also stimulate people to begin thinking about their water system and how they can reduce their water footprint. A local Coca-Cola bottler delivered the barrels to the school. The Garden Clubbers decorated them and were provided the hardware needed to construct a fully functioning rain barrell except a base. Each kit includes a set of hole saws for drilling into the barrel and downspout, a spigot, a downspout diverter, flexible connection tube, rubber seals, and a "non-potable water" sticker. Emma Eaton Bartholomew

Frances (Illsley) Wood graduated from Pinkerton Academy in 1929 and then completed a 2 year course at Plymouth Normal to become a teacher. The Wood brothers (Paul, Don, and Mike) from Beverly, Mass purchased land near the top of Bunker Hill right next to the Bunker Hill Schoolhouse where Frances was teaching. Iggy Cochran and Cliff Stacy were two of her students. Students noticed that Paul was coming around and if he showed up early it might mean an early dismissal. Paul and Frances married in 1932.

Frances was Tax Collector for the Town of Auburn from 1947-1957. She worked out of her house and a lot of business was done after supper and many bills were paid in cash. Gus Davis, Auburn Chief Of Police, would take Frances to the bank and make a night deposit. Once, after a particularly busy day, the bank called to ask where was her deposit? Her son, Bill, who was probably under 10 years old, still remembers the 'HORROR', the panic that ensued. Turns out the large amount of cash caused the bag to get stuck in the chute.

The Longmeadow Church was important to Frances. Church suppers were major fund raisers and many were held in the 1940's and 50's. Paul and Frances contributed to the suppers and always attended. A Saturday night church supper was often the social event of the week in many small towns. From her monthly \$19, pension, Frances still pledged a portion to the Longmeadow.

Emma (Eaton) Bartholomew (1876-1965, Aunt to Harland Eaton) married George O Bartholomew (1874-1911) and had 3 children: Ella, 1896-1973; Elsie, 1901-1954; George, 1905-1985. In 1898, Emma by herself purchased a home from Simon Prescott who also wrote the mortgage. The Manchester Water Works had purchased the land and the house was moved from approx. 25 Manchester Rd to its present position at 66 Manchester Rd. The house was jacked up, rollers put underneath it, and horses pulled it to its new location and a new foundation.

Elsie, their second child was born in 1901 with severe mental and physical handicaps. She spent most of her time watching out the window for traffic going by. Emma would pick her up and move her around in a wheelbarrow. In 1911, Emma became a 35 year old widow with 3 children and no visible means of support. For whatever reason, Prescott called in the mortgage. Emma Bartholomew hitched up the horse and went to see her Uncle, Frank Eaton in Weare. Dr Eaton agreed to take over the Bartholomew mortgage.

Now that the paperwork was settled, Emma had to figure how to make the monthly payments. Veneta Preston Cleary said that Emma was a physically strong hard worker determined to succeed. She cut her own firewood. She carried 5 gallon pails of slop to the pigs. In the 1920 Census, Emma identified herself as a poultry farmer. She sold eggs and chicken. In the summer, she sold raspberries and rented rowboats to tourists.

When her older daughter, Ella, married Jim Hall and moved across the road, Ella's son Harry stayed with his grandmother. Harry grew up and married. When the US Army sent Harry to Europe in 1943, he left his pregnant wife with Emma. A few months later, the wife disappeared leaving an infant girl with her 67 year old great grandmother. And Emma was still taking care of Elsie.

Marcia Trombly is the great-granddaughter of Emma Eaton. She has lived her entire life in the farmhouse on Manchester Rd. Soon, seven generations of the Bartholomew-Trombly family will have called this place home. Marcia remembers Emma as a loving, caring, giving individual who wanted the best for her family and was willing to sacrifice to make that happen.

Important Milestones for Auburn Women

1st School Board Member - Frances Griffin moved into town, taught at Village Schoolhouse and married Willard Griffin. 1882, elected to School Board by all male electroate. 1888, NH women allowed to vote in local elections.

1st Minister - Pastor Ruth Gallot of Longmeadow Church.

1st Highway Employee - Chris McLaughlin drove a truck in the 1970's.

1st Taxi Driver - Ida Newcomb. Her father-in-law was Station Master at the Auburn Depot. Ida would meet the train and take summer tourists to various hotels.

Longevity Award - Eva Komaridis drove school bus for over 30 years.

Shirley Nye Norris - Competitive candlepin bowling participant into her 90's.

Annie May Coult - Started as a teacher at Mosquito Brook School. Eventually went to Washington D.C. where she translated US Government Agricultural Bulletins into Spanish and Portuguese.

Addie Davis - Addie graduated from Pinkerton Academy, lived in her father's house on the top of Eaton Hill, and had a professional career at NH Insurance.



Thursday, May 19th, 2022, 6:30 pm Jennie Powers: The Woman Who Dares Presented by Jennifer Carrol

Jennie Powers took a stand against social vices in New Hampshire and Vermont in the early twentieth century. She was a humane society agent in Keene from 1903-1936 and one of the first humane society agents to become a deputy sheriff in New Hampshire. Jennie was known across the country as "The Woman Who Dares" cited by the Boston Post newspaper in 1906 as having arrested more men than any other woman in America. As a photographic activist, she used her camera to document animal cruelty, family violence, and wide-spread poverty in New Hampshire's Monadnock region and beyond. This one-hour illustrated presentation from Jenna Carroll introduces us to Jennie's life story, the work of humane societies at the turn of the twentieth century, and the politics of the Progressive Era (1890s-1920s) from a local perspective.

This program will be held at the Auburn Historical Association's meeting room (downstairs, back of building). Admission is free.
