

Renovation of Police Department Space Underway

Determining the Auburn Police Department cannot address identified issues with the space available at the Safety Complex, the Board of Selectmen has approved a small addition and renovation to the police department that will take care of some existing space within the of these concerns.

This project will result in addressing the three main deficiencies for the department that involve space for separate locker rooms for male and female officers, a records storage area roof of the police area, siding and and storage space for larger items currently stored in storage trailers.

With architectural and design plans professionally developed, the project The remaining work to finish the includes a small addition to the back interior of the building will be the side of the current building area, which would provide additional room and allow for a re-arrangement current department area.

Work is underway to establish a foundation and concrete slab for the addition, framing, roof trusses, siding, re-shingling the entire back doors to have the addition enclosed before the winter months. All of this work is expected to cost \$47,200. focus of work in 2020.

The Board of Selectmen have designed Richard Eaton to be the construction manager for the Town, after he volunteered to assist with this project.

Town Moderator Resignation and Appointment

The Board of Selectmen regretfully received the resignation of Town Moderator Kathleen Porter last month. As she was moving from Auburn, she resigned her position effective August 15th.

Kathi has served the Town Auburn in many capacities during the past 20 years, most recently as our Town and School District Moderator. Her record of service has been a benefit to Auburn, and we want to publicly thank Kathi for her service to Auburn

The Supervisors of the Checklist have appointed former Town Moderator Jim Tillery to fill the remainder of Kathi's term of office, which expires in March 2020.

School Construction News



The school year in Auburn has officially begun! And things are looking a little different in the school for teachers and students this year. The architecture and construction teams maximized the summer months and did an extreme make-over while most everyone was away. While there were no shouts of 'Move that truck!' or 'Are you ready to see your fixer-upper!', the 700+ students and teachers who returned to the school in late August certainly experienced the excitement of seeing new, fresh classrooms and work spaces.

As planned, work continues on the school and will through the early part of 2020. So a quick update on what's done, what's continuing, and how different parts of the school will shift this year as the remaining work is tied off.

- New classroom wing is complete: This is the most visible part of the project and the classrooms are open for the business of learning. First, second, fifth and sixth grade and special education classrooms are located in the wing.
- Main entrance and front office work is ongoing: Work will continue through the fall so the temporary main entrance to the building is the set of doors in the front of the building closest to Eaton Road. This is otherwise known as the parent-pick-up and drop-off location. The main office is located right when you walk in these doors.
- The nurse's office is across from the Media Center for the month of September: And it will be back in its old but much expanded location in October. Having recently done a walkthrough of the new nurse's space, it's nice to see the provisions in place to help students of all ages and with additional privacy.
- The cafeteria is up and running: This is probably the second most visible part of the project and has undergone a major transformation the past few months. Between expanded seating space for students and a more functional kitchen for our food services team, it is a much better space for everyone.
- The 5-classroom elementary wing will open after the Christmas/New Year's holidays: These are the classrooms to the left when you're looking at the front of the building. Demolition is complete in these rooms and the construction team is working on, among other things, navigating years of wiring that are behind the old walls and ceilings.
- Rear entrance to the cafeteria and gym is open: Students who take the bus are entering and leaving the school this way. Buses will follow the same loading and unloading process and the students will have a new and expanded entrance to use.

It's an understatement to say it's been a full-team, full-court press this summer to ready the school for opening day. Everyone – AVS administration and staff, Superintendent team, architecture and construction teams, Town departments, School Board, and others – came together even more last month to put a shoulder into whatever needed to get done. While the project will continue these next several months as planned, reaching this milestone is significant for the teams as well as AVS staff and students and Auburn residents. In more ways than one, it's a nice place to be.

Have a great September and look for continued updates over the next few months.


