Looking Forward to 2018

As we look forward to the coming year and beyond, the Board of Selectmen will be taking time in early January to participate in a facilitated workshop meeting focused on identifying goals the Board has for the Town during the coming year.

The Board held its first goal setting meeting a year ago, and will be reviewing goals that were set then to determine what was accomplished in 2017 before casting an eye forward to establish goals for the coming year.

In the February edition of The Crier, we will be able to publish what main goals were identified by the Board for 2018.

Ambulance Service Contract Renewed

Last month, the Board agreed to renew the Town's current ambulance services contract with the Town of Derry. The new contract will take affect July 1, 2018 and will run through June 30, 2025.

The terms of the agreement were worked out administratively by the Fire Chiefs and Town Administrators of Auburn and Derry. Generally following the terms of past contracts, the renewed contract provides a more defined training program offered to Auburn Fire Department members which Fire

Chief Gannon requested, while the first year of the contract was level funded with no increase to Auburn that Town Administrator Herman requested. For their part, the Town of Derry sought clarification of a couple operating points, and requested a seven year contract period instead of five-years.

Members of the Derry Town Council will consider the agreement at their meeting to be held on December 19th.

FY 2018 Budget Near to Completion

The Board of Selectmen has completed its work on the FY 2018 Town operating budget with a total of \$5,450,558. The Board's budget proposal represents a total increase of \$161,917 (3.06%) over the approved 2017 budget of \$5,288,641.

The single biggest increase in the 2018 budget, nearly \$60,000, is funding for a State required property revaluation

The Board's budget effort is only a part of the Town budgeting process. The Budget Committee is still working on the Town and School budgets, and will complete their work by the January 11, 2018 public hearing on the budgets they will propose to the voters.

In late November, the Board accepted Anderson Way off Pingree Hill Road as a Class V Town road. The approximately 1,600-foot road features eight lots on the new road, six of which have new homes on them.

Upon the Board's vote, the Town accepted the ownership and responsibility for the road and its maintenance.

Auburn's Town Administrator, Bill Herman, Receives Prestigious Russ Marcoux Municipal Advocate of the Year Award from the New Hampshire Municipal Association

Each year, the New Hampshire Municipal Association (NHMA) awards the Russ Marcoux Municipal Advocate of the Year award to a member based on our interactions with municipal officials during the legislative session. NHMA established this award in 2011 to recognize an elected or appointed local official(s) for his or her non-partisan contributions toward the advancement of NHMA's legislative policy goals and for the advocacy of municipal interests generally.

In 2011, NHMA staff selected Russ Marcoux, town manager in Bedford, as the first-ever recipient of the Municipal Advocate of the Year award because Russ did all the things we want members to do in support of our legislative policy and to enhance the success of our legislative agenda. Russ passed away just days before the 2011 Annual Conference and he never knew we had created such an award or that he had been selected the first recipient.

So in his honor, the NHMA board of directors renamed this recognition as the Russ Marcoux Municipal Advocate of the Year award.

At its recent annual conference in November, NHMA recognized Bill Herman, town administrator in Auburn, with its 2017 Russ Marcoux Municipal Advocate of the Year award.

In his presentation remarks, NHMA Government Affairs Counsel Cordell Johnston recognized Bill Herman for his consistent work in advancing NHMA's legislative agenda. He noted that Bill has been an effective advocate for many years who frequently comes to Concord for legislative hearings, often bringing one of his selectmen with him. On important bills, Bill can always be counted on to contact his senator and representatives. Johnston mentioned one instance in which a single e-mail from Bill to his senator tipped the balance in getting the Senate to kill a bill that NHMA opposed.

When the NHMA staff was overwhelmed with legislative work this year, Bill happily agreed to take full responsibility for shepherding one of NHMA's policy bills through the legislature. He testified at the House and Senate hearings, spoke to legislators, and did everything necessary to get the bill to a committee of conference; the bill ultimately passed. Bill also wrote op-ed pieces on several other important pieces of legislation that were published in major newspapers around the state.

In presenting the award, Johnston noted that it was particularly fitting because when Russ Marcoux died in 2011, Bill Herman was elected to take his place on the NHMA board. He has been an outstanding contributor to the board and to NHMA's legislative advocacy efforts ever since.

Room to Grow

For 124 years, the Griffin Free Public Library has served the interests and needs of Auburn. Sitting on a half-acre lot, the last major improvement was an expansion of the parking lot to accommodate 10 vehicles. The lot is now maxed-out.

Town officials recognized years ago that the future of the library was limited. In order to maximize their space, the library staff and Trustees installed movable shelving to open up meeting space and used a patio area for outdoor events. Still, the current space limits their options.

Despite the limitations, foot traffic in the library is up 34% over the last two years. The number of programs, clubs and activities at the Griffin Free Public Library continues to grow. The number of people participating in these activities is up 100%.

Approximately five years ago, land immediately adjacent to the library property went on the market. Recognizing a potential opportunity for the Town, the Library Trustees and Board of Selectmen met with the property owners. Unfortunately, the parties could not agree.

Late in 2016, other potential uses of this property were under consideration. Knowing that the Town was not in a position to act quickly and that the property owners did not want to wait until a March Town Meeting vote, a group of 15 Auburn residents and officials formed the "Friends of Auburn". They met with the Library Trustees and the Board of Selectmen to determine the Town's interest in potentially owning this property. Receiving positive encouragement, the Friends of Auburn negotiated with the property owners and secured a 1.9-acre parcel of land adjacent to the library property.

The Friends of Auburn raised \$200,000 to purchase the property with the sole intent of holding it for the Town. In doing so, they are providing an interest-free loan to the Town with the full support of the Board of Selectmen.

There is nothing specifically planned now and nothing would happen immediately. Without the addition of the land, nothing is possible and future library growth can only happen somewhere else. If the Town acquires this property, it opens up a host of potential opportunities. That could mean an expansion of the library. It could mean a "community center" type facility. It could mean different things for young and senior alike. With the land, Griffin Free Public Library and the Town of Auburn can plan for the future.





Tracking and Snowshoe Workshop Saturday, January 13th, 10am-noon

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Police News



Hello Auburn Residents,

I could not be more proud to say I work for the town of Auburn. Just like previous years the Giving Tree was a wonderful success, and 13 families had a magical Christmas! I cannot express my gratitude to each and every one of you!!! It truly is amazing.

We had our "Wrap Party" on December 14th, and had over 30 kids and adults join us to wrap over 300 gifts! It was a great time, and always great chance for me to meet people!!! Thank you again, from myself, the Safety Complex and the families who were so grateful for all you have done!!!





Last Spring during town voting, the police department had a warrant article to raise approximate \$7,500.00 towards the purchase of a new speed trailer. This money would be combined with a 50/50 matching grant awarded to the department by the New Hampshire Department of Safety. The article was voted down, and the money awarded by the state was returned. Speeding continues to be our biggest complaint in town, and we still need a radar trailer. We are going to attempt to raise the funds with private donations and fundraising till we reach the \$7,500.00. It could take a year, it could take five. Once we have reached that level of funding, we will reapply for the matching grant, and if awarded will purchase the radar trailer for the town.

When we went to the Selectmen with this idea, Karen Norris and the Skate Park Committee reached out with a generous offer to kick off our fundraising. The Skate Park Committee was unable to reach the goal they needed to build the skate park, and in turn, graciously offered to donate that money to our fundraising efforts. Because the funds donated to the Skate Park, were for that purpose, Town Administrator Bill Herman must first reach out to the donors and offer to refund their donation, or ask permission to transfer it to the Speed Trailer Fundraising. Once the donors have gotten back to Mr. Herman with their answer, we will have a better idea of how much we already have towards our goal! Going forward any donations made to the department will go towards the funds needed. Each time we hold an event and people make donations, we will put that into our speed trailer bucket!

To kick of this plan, and to add a little fun to the winter months, we have challenged the Auburn Village School and the Auburn Fire Department to a penny war!!!! Just a fun competition between Team Police, Team Fire, Team Auburn Village school, all money raised will go towards the radar trailer though!!!
