Auburn Names Veteran Fire Officer as Fire Chief

Following an open and thorough search for a new Fire Chief, the Board of Selectmen appointed Michael Williams of Hooksett as Fire Chief and Emergency Management Director for the Town of Auburn.

Chief Williams was formally sworn into office by Selectmen Chairman James Headd during the Selectmen's September 10th meeting.

Beginning as a call firefighter in Raymond, Chief Williams has a 27-year career in firefighting and emergency medical service in Hooksett and Manchester including 13 years as Chief of the Hooksett Fire Department.

The Town undertook a formal recruitment process to fill the Fire Chief's position after it became vacant at the end of May. At the recommendation of the remaining officers of the Auburn Fire Department, the Board of Selectmen agreed to undertake a search outside of the ranks of the Auburn department. After publicly advertised, the Town received 15 applications for the part-time position.

A panel of fire and EMS professionals from the region assisted the Town in reviewing the applications and determining who would advance to an Assessment Center process that included an oral board with a professional panel

and an interview with a citizen's panel. The Assessment Center provided recommendations to the Board of Selectmen, as did the Auburn Volunteer Firemen's Association. The Selectmen conducted second interviews with three applicants from whom the Board ultimately chose Chief Williams.

Chief Williams officially assumed the position on September 4th. He has been appointed for a term of office through March 2020.

Road Reconstruction Work Continues through October

Road Agent Michael Dross and his crew is near to completing the reconstruction of the last portion of Lovers Lane. The work is expected to be completed by mid-September.

The final reconstruction work to be done in 2018 will be the reconstruction of Acorn Avenue, Joan Drive and Walnut Drive. The roads will have the pavement removed, with rocks removed from the base, new gravel brought in as needed, road culverts will be replaced as necessary and then the road base re-graded to regain the crown of the road. The current 31-foot paved travel surface will be replaced with a 24-foot paved travel surface. Driveways will be brought to the road, while the shoulders will be stabilized and drainage established.

At the same time, drainage repair work is also taking place on Dartmouth Drive in the Wellington Business Park in an attempt to prevent sink holes that have occurred on the roads for the past several years.

Town Boards, Committees and Officials

It was with regret the Board received the resignation of Robert Beaurivage as a member of the Zoning Board of Adjustment. Bob had served Auburn on the ZBA for the past six years, but has plans to enjoy his overall retirement more in the months ahead.

Margie McAvoy and David Nye have been re-appointed to new three year terms of the Parks and Recreation Commission. Their new terms run through March 2021.

The Board has also re-nominated Paul Raiche and Fire Captain Jim Saulnier to be reappointed as the Town's Health Officer and Deputy Health Officer respectively. The appointments are actually made by the NH Commissioner of Health and Human Services.

E-Waste Day to be Held October 13th

Auburn's annual Electronic "E-Waste" Collection Day is scheduled for Saturday, October 13th from 9 AM to 2 PM. The event will again be held in the front parking lot of the Auburn Village School.

This annual program is set up to accept any appliance, TV, stereo, computer, printer, radio or other electronic device you need to dispose. Anything that can be plugged in is accepted.

Auburn Fire Department

The Auburn Fire Department welcomes our new Chief Mike Williams. Chief Williams brings over 30 years of fire experience to our department. With his knowledge and experience, the membership of the department is excited to move forward and continue to provide the level of service we have consistently given to the town.

The Auburn Fire Department is comprised of a part-time fire chief, a full-time fire captain, a full-time Lieutenant and 28 paid per call Firefighter/EMT's. There are two fire stations, the safety complex in the center of town, and the Pingree Hill station located in the southern end of town. The department apparatus is comprised of an engine, tanker, rescue, boat and an ATV located out of the safety complex. The Pingree Hill station has an engine and tanker. The department has a captain and two lieutenants assigned to each station. Each member of the department goes through training to become a certified firefighter and or EMS provider. Currently, we have members certified as Level 1 to career level firefighters and Emergency Medical Responders to Paramedic. Each level of certification is roughly over 100 hours of training, which consists of classroom training, to training in drill yards, or practicing skills on each other. Almost every Sunday you will see crews out training on the topic of the month, or testing hydrants and cisterns to make sure they are in working order. You may see fire trucks driving around town as well. Every member that wants to drive the apparatus has to learn the roads and how to operate that specific apparatus. We are always looking for new members to join our ranks. If you have an interest or want to know more call or stop by when you see us out.

If becoming a firefighter or EMS provider is not for you, but you want to give back to the community or help the Fire Department you can join the Fire Department Association. Every year the Association hosts the blood drive, helps at the Winter Carnival, Auburn Old Home Days, Auburn Duck Day, and our annual Open House. We are always looking for people to join the Association to give back to the community. If you are interested you can contact the safety complex.

The Annual Fire Department Open House will be Sunday, Oct 14th from 1-4 pm at the safety complex. There will be safety demonstration's, apparatus tours, food and games for all ages. Before the Open House, we will have our parade through town which will start at 10:30 am.

Our annual fundraiser letter will be coming out soon. The Association is raising funds to purchase a new rescue boat. Any donation would greatly be appreciated.


With hoopla, there are no hold lists, no extra apps or accounts needed or special steps to use it.



Mosquito-borne Diseases



Eastern equine encephalitis (EEE) is a rare but serious viral disease that is also caused by a virus transmitted by the bite of an infected mosquito with more severe symptoms than for WNV. EEE is an arbovirus (short for arthropod-borne, meaning spread by insects). Birds are the source of infection for mosquitoes, which can sometimes transmit the infection to horses, other animals, and, in rare cases, people. West Nile Virus (WNV) was first seen in the US in 1999, in the New York City area of Queens. WNV can live in a number of types of birds and is passed bird to bird by certain types of mosquitoes. Occasionally, an infected mosquito will pass the virus to hu-

mans or other animals. Most healthy people do not get sick from the virus, but sometimes it may cause symptoms. When a human gets ill from WNV, they may have symptoms including encephalitis (inflammation of the brain) or meningitis (inflammation of the lining of the brain and spinal cord); encephalitis and meningitis can also be caused by head injury, bacterial infections or, more commonly, other viral infections.

The Spread Of EEE & WNV

EEE and WNV are spread to humans by the bite of an infected mosquito. When a mosquito bites an infected bird, it becomes infected. The infected mosquito could then bite a human and transmit the infection. Infected mosquitoes are the primary known source for WNV and EEE transmission to humans. These viruses are not spread by person-to-person contact such as touching, kissing, or caring for someone who is infected. No known transmission has occurred from birds to people, however, since dead birds may have the virus, one should not handle birds or any dead animals with their bare hands.

Prevention Guidelines

1. Eliminate standing water and other mosquito breeding locations.

In warm weather, mosquitoes can breed in any puddle that lasts more than 4 days! Remove old tires from your property.

Dispose of tin cans, plastic containers, ceramic pots, or other containers. Don't overlook containers that have become overgrown by aquatic vegetation.

Drill holes in the bottom of recycling containers that are left outside.

Make sure roof gutters are clean and draining properly.

Clean and chlorinate swimming pools and hot tubs. If not in use, keep empty and covered and keep covers free of standing water.

Aerate garden ponds or stock them with fish.

Turn over wheelbarrows and change water in birdbaths at least twice weekly.

Turn over plastic wading pools when not in use.

Remind or help neighbors to eliminate breeding sites on their properties.

2. Be aware of where mosquitoes live and breed and keep them from entering your home.

Mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water. Weeds, tall grass, and bushes provide an outdoor home for the adult Culex pipiens mosquito (the common northern house mosquito), which is most commonly associated with West Nile virus.

Mosquitoes can enter homes through unscreened windows or doors, or broken screens. Make sure that doors and windows have tight-fitting screens. Repair or replace all screens in your home that have tears or holes. Resting mosquitoes can often be flushed from indoor resting sites by using sweeping motions under beds, behind bedside tables etc. and once in flight, exterminated prior to sleeping at night.

3. Protect yourself from mosquito bites.

If outside during evening, nighttime, and dawn hours when mosquitoes are most active and likely to bite, children and adults should wear protective clothing such as long pants, long-sleeved shirts, and socks. Consider the use of an effective insect repellent, such as one containing DEET. Repellent containing 30% or less DEET (N,N-diethyl-methyl-meta-toluamide) are recommended for use by children and adults. Use DEET according to the manufacturer's directions. Children should not apply DEET to themselves. Repellents that contain Picaridin or oil of lemon eucalyptus have also been determined to be effective.

Vitamin B, ultrasonic devices, incense, and bug zappers have not been shown to be effective in preventing mosquito bites.



October School Construction Update

Welcome back to school everyone!!

It has been a very exciting summer for us at AVS. As returnees are aware, two of the portables have been entirely relocated and new walkways and coverings have been put in place. A new hard-surface play area has been developed where the new basketball courts will be located, and there's a large section of the back of the school that has been fenced off to allow for construction of the new wing. The main rear entrance to the school has been modified so that everyone enters the building through the cafeteria. Administration and teachers are working hard to make sure everyone is aware of the changes and keeping our students safe.


The front sections of the building have been stripped and re-roofed. The cupola was stripped, cleaned and a new coat of paint applied as well as a new copper top. The locker rooms have been completely transformed to include a new handicap accessible bathroom in each and new team spaces with lockers and shelving. A new electrical room was carved out of the space for a new service to be brought in as well.

Design plans are almost wrapped up for the new wing which also includes the cafeteria. The team has met numerous times with key parties to develop the detailed drawings that are put out to bid. We have received numbers and secured contracts with a site contractor, concrete, structural steel and building envelope subs who work under the direction of Bonnet Page and Stone, our construction manager. The Town's safety and building personnel have weighed in and have helped to keep the project moving in the right direction.

Over the next few months, there will be a lot of action on the new wing to witness. The ground will be roughed out, footings and walls poured, underground utilities placed and possibly the concrete floor poured before Halloween. And our school population gets a front row seat to witness the building take shape from the ground up. Wonder how many trick or treaters are going to be construction workers this year?

The School Improvement Committee will be working to get out information to the public regarding the progress of construction at the school. They plan to meet on Wednesday, October 17th at the school starting at 6:00. Hope you all enjoy the Autumn weather!
