News from the Auburn Town Hall

Town Hall Project Completed

Last month we reported on the process to award a bid for the replacement and upgrading of the Town Hall septic system.

Following a span of nearly three weeks, the project has been satisfactorily completed, and the Town Hall property has returned to a more normal look and flow, as opposed to a construction work zone.

The crew of Viking Excavation of Candia performed well and delivered the project and work as designed by the Town's engineering firm, Stantec Consulting of Auburn. With few hiccups in the process, the newly installed system should add considerable life to the use of the Town Hall building.

Past, Present & Future

No where does the past often times mix with the present and the future more than it does at a local Town Hall.

Whether it is transferring plates to a new car; investigating the history of a piece of property or a home, or doing genealogy research on family member's births, marriages and deaths -- the Town Hall is where people come.

Such was clearly the case the last week of August when work began in earnest on the replacement and upgrading of the septic system for the Auburn Town Hall. As workmen were ready to begin in the present to improve the future service at the Town Hall, the past came up to them quickly in two very different areas.

In 1995, the Auburn Historical Association, in cooperation with Town officials, buried a time capsule to be opened by a future generation of Auburn residents. As luck would have it, the time capsule was right in the area where the new septic system would be going. With the assistance of a sketch drawn with pinpoint accuracy by Don Dollard in 1995, the crew located the time capsule with their third shovel full of earth. The capsule has since been relocated elsewhere on the Town Hall property, its location re-plotted so a future Auburn generation will be able to find it with little effort.

Also in the area of the new septic system was a memorial tree that was planted in 1996 in memory of Donald Benyo, who passed away during his time as a member of the Board of Selectmen. What had most likely been a relatively small Norway maple in 1996 had grown into a handsome near 30-foot tall tree in the ensuing 18 years.

No small undertaking was the re-location of this tree from the front to the side of the Town Hall property. A special spade truck was contracted to literally dig and scoop up the tree and a nearly seven-foot wide ball of earth and roots, and then carefully drive the tree nearly 100-feet to its new location.

The entire process was a fascinating process for young and old alike; as it is not every day you see a full-grown tree on the back of a truck.

So while the Auburn Town Hall is getting a new septic system, care is being taken to preserve parts of Auburn's past in the process.



THE MOVING OF THE TREE AT TOWN HALL


Fall 2014 Senior Trip Cancelled





This program is designed to help people who cannot get to or use the library due to long-term injury, physical disability, or transportation issues (including inability to drive in winter weather). The library is currently seeking participants who would like library materials delivered to their door once or twice per month.

We are excited to begin offering this service in time for winter, when many people may not want to risk being out in bad weather and the sun sets early. This is a completely free service offered by Griffin Free Public Library in order to provide library service to as many residents of Auburn as possible. Police Department

Autumn! It's a beautiful time of the year, but I'm not ready. This summer has been great, but very short. The only good thing about autumn to me is the beginning of the NFL season. Autumn also is the start of a variety of law enforcement concerns.

First, school is back in session, and the children are everywhere. They are walking on the sides of the streets, riding their bicycles on the roadway, and hovering around the numerous bus stops in town during the morning and in the afternoon. Some children are safety minded, and others aren't, so drivers have to be extremely alert at all times. For the most part there are no sidewalks in Auburn, and no designated bicycle lanes. We all have to share the road, and do it safely.

To add to the dangers of the added children on the roads during the school season, is the shortened amount of daylight. To point out the obvious, I ask the parents to dress your children in some sort of clothing that will show up clearly during the hours of darkness. Although reflective vests are not a fashion statement, they are great safety items to wear when on the side of the roadway in the dark.

Another hazard of Autumn is the falling leaves. I'm not talking about an angry spouse that has to rake the nuisance in your yard. I mean the colorful little pests that are on the roadway that become very slippery, especially when they get rained on. The leaves also cover the fog lines and the centerlines making it difficult to determine where the road is. Add children to that mix, and it's an accident waiting to happen.

In connection with the school topic and safety I must mention the direction of the traffic flow during the drop off and pick up periods at Auburn Village School. In the morning I believe it's between 7:45 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. that the school zone speed limit is 25 MPH, and again in the afternoon from 2:15 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. I'm sure some of you have seen our Officers on Hooksett Road doing radar during those times, so please drive the speed limit as if it were your own child on the side of the road walking or waiting for a ride. Also, during those specific hours the traffic is not allowed to travel from Hooksett Road onto Eaton Hill Road. The road becomes a one way road in the direction from the safety complex to Hooksett Road. Again, this is for the safety of the children, so please obey that rule.

Also, the traffic laws are for everyone, and they're designed for the very safety I have been writing about. In the past during some of the Town events some of the practices on the roadways have not always been prudent, and were very unsafe. One accident while trying to have fun can have a tragic life long effect. Use your collective heads, and don't perform a Darwinism.

Continuing with the Autumn theme and the safety of the children; let's talk about Halloween. Auburn will observe Halloween on October 26th, a Sunday, from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. There should be enough daylight, so that is one issue we don't need to worry about. However, the number of children on the roadways, the slippery leaf covered pavement, and the goal of getting as much candy as possible, must be monitored by everyone to insure the day is a fun day and not a disaster. The drivers must remain alert and drive at a slower speed to help them react to any hazards. Parents must watch their children to insure they don't have a harmful meeting with a vehicle. Also, check your child's costume so their eyesight isn't hindered in any way. Make sure the costume doesn't create any tripping concerns, and that the costume is clearly seen by any driver. These are a few tips to have a safe and fun day. What really matters is the common sense each person displays, and following mature adult leadership.

These women joined the army usually seeking adventure, or out of patriotism or a desire to be with a brother or a husband, often staying with their units after a husband was killed in action.


Civil War expert David Decker will provide biographical sketches of heroic women who served for both the north and the south.








Cub Scouts Pack 127



Health Officer Announcement

WHAT'S IN YOUR WATER ?????

The State of New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services recommends that private well water be tested on a regular basis, every 3 - 5 years.

Common analysis would include bacteria, nitrate/nitrite, iron, lead, chloride, arsenic, manganese, copper, fluoride, pH, hardness and sodium. Additional testing could include radon and volatile organic compounds (VOCs)

Throughout the month of September water sample test kits will be available at the Auburn Town Hall. Residents will be offered discounted fees for analytic testing of private well water samples as well as an opportunity for a convenient, local drop off option.

Residents will collect their own sample (directions and containers provided) and will have the ability to drop the sample at a centralized drop off at Auburn Town Hall on Monday, October 6th from 8 a.m. - 7 p.m.

Results will be emailed directly to the homeowners.
