News from the Auburn Town Hall

With Auburn's fifth SB2 Deliberative Town Meeting and annual Town elections now behind us, we want to thank all of the individuals who ran for office for your willingness to step forward and serve our community. While we may not always agree with each other on every issue, at the end of the day it is clear that we all believe Auburn is a special place that we like to call home.

Board of Selectmen

The Board of Selectmen held its organizational meeting of the year on March 17th. Russell Sullivan has been re-elected to serve as Selectmen Chairman for the coming year, while James Headd will serve as Vice Chairman.

In addition to their service as Selectmen, each Board member serves as an ex-officio member of one or more town boards. Russ Sullivan will continue to serve on the Planning Board, while Jim Headd will serve on the Budget Committee and the Parks & Recreation Commission. Rick Eaton will serve on the Conservation Commission and the Highway Safety Committee.

Internal Investigation Results

Following nearly a year of public accusations, the Board of Selectmen in November decided it was necessary to retain a neutral third-party to conduct an internal investigation to try and determine whether any Town official or employee had been responsible for the burying of solid waste at the former landfill property on Chester Turnpike.

In late November 2013, the Board of Selectmen unanimously agreed to retain Attorney Craig L. Staples of Concord to undertake this effort. As has been publicized, Attorney Staples conducted a thorough investigation that included interviewing 19 individuals and reviewing hundreds of pages of documents. On February 17th, Attorney Staples delivered the results of his efforts to the Town, which the Board of Selectmen released to the public on February 24th.

The detailed report is posted at the Town Hall and is available to individuals on the Town's web site. The conclusions reached in this report are:

- 1. More probably than not, the Road Agent was not involved in, did not authorize and did not have contemporaneous knowledge of the burial of the solid waste at the landfill.
- 2. More probably than not, Darren Wetherbee was involved in and had contemporaneous knowledge of the burial of the solid waste at the landfill sometime between 2009-2011.

More probably than not, no other official, employee or agent of the town was involved in, authorized or had contemporaneous knowledge of the burial of the solid waste at the landfill.

With the results of the internal investigation in hand, the Board of Selectmen has referred the report to both the Auburn Police Department and to the Rockingham County Attorney's Office for any action they determine is appropriate. At the same time, the Selectmen have directed Town Counsel to determine whether any civil action for recovery of remediation costs is warranted. As of this writing, the Selectmen are awaiting reports from these three entities.

Town Report Artwork

Hopefully folks have notice the artwork that appeared on the cover and within the 2013 Town of Auburn and Auburn School District Annual Report. The four featured drawings were done by students in the seventh grade at the Auburn Village School.

This was the second time the Town requested artwork from Auburn Village School students for this purpose. The idea to have the students participate in this fashion came from Police Chief Edward Picard during a monthly Town department head meeting last year.

T.J. Farrell drew the artwork of the Griffin Mill Bridge that appeared on the front cover of the report. Other artwork appearing inside the report included a view of a dock at Lake Massabesic by **Taylor Dudek**; the Auburn Town Pound drawn by **Lauren Sylvain**, while **Maggie Vaillancourt** drew the Auburn Town Hall.

Judges who determined the artwork to appear on the front cover were Town Clerk Joanne Linxweiler, Library Director Ricky Sirois and Chief Picard.

Police Department

I've been around law enforcement my entire life. For thirty-five years I've been a full time Police Officer in the State of New Hampshire. Since June, 1991 my career has been here in the Town of Auburn. The years have been pretty good to me while performing my duties in law enforcement. There have been many ups and downs, but mostly it's been great, and the appreciation that's been exhibited to me by many of the Town residents has been welcomed. The most memorable of those experiences was when I taught the D.A.R.E. program in the fifth grade at the Auburn Village School. It's during that time I learned a lot about the citizens of the Town, and the fabric of Auburn. In fact, there have been many occasions that some of those D.A.R.E. students have returned to the Police Department to say hi to me. Gratifying doesn't even come close to the how I feel about my service to the Town.

On a lesser note, the "yin and yang" of it, are the people that dislike me just because of the position I hold, and the uniform I wear. By the mere fact of diving into someone's life when they become a suspect of a crime, a law enforcement Officer becomes the enemy. I understand that frame of mind, and realize it's a fact of life. Because of it I have treated every person I've investigated fairly. I've never humiliated anyone, or dehumanized them for what they were accused of. That wasn't my job! I got the facts of the case, and if it led to an arrest, the person was charged and brought to court. At that point it was up to the Judge or Jury to decide if I did my job properly.



This love / hate scenario plays out every day within the world of law enforcement, and we're all capable of handling both sides of the coin. When we took the oath of Office to serve and protect the community we work in and the State of New Hampshire, we knew all the ramifications. It's real life.

I bring this up because there's a rift in Auburn that has created a "Us and Them" mentality. No one is right or wrong in the way the rift has developed, but there are a large number of people on both sides that are misinformed, and acting out blindly based on their friendships to the parties. I've heard accusations of corruption, and wrong doing on the part of the Auburn Police Department. Unless a person actually knows of specific incidents, nothing should be said. If someone has a specific knowledge of corruption, they have a moral duty to report it to the appropriate agency. I take great exception to someone using the terms "corruption", "Laurie List Candidates", and other negative comments. Right, wrong, or indifferent, the accusations paint every member of the Auburn Police Department with the same broad brush. That's unjust and narrow-minded. I personally have never lied, or acted inappropriately in any aspect of my law enforcement career. I take my oath seriously, and I know my fellow Officers in Auburn feel the same.

There is one way to remedy this immediately. The Auburn Police Department has a ride along policy for the citizens of Auburn. Anyone that wants to do a ride along with an Officer on a shift can do so. They must fill out a request, and sign a waiver form. I will schedule the date and time for the ride along once the request is received. During a ride along the resident can ask questions about the Department, the Officer, the job, and actually see what goes on during a shift. It's the best way to find out for yourself what life as an Auburn Police Officer is really like. I urge everyone to take advantage of this offer, it will open some eyes.

Auburn Fire Department Activates New "Code Red" Emergency Notification System.

The "Code Red" Emergency Notification System provides Auburn public safety officials with the ability to quickly deliver messages to targeted areas or the entire town. The CodeRed system will provide individuals and businesses the ability to add their own phone numbers and email address directly into the system's database. An electronic enrollment page maintained by safety officials will provide links for this purpose.

Once connected to the CodeRED system, citizens and business owners can choose how they want to be notified in the event of an emergency. Additional phone numbers can be entered into the database as well. Other methods of contact during an emergency include cell phone, e-mail, text, twitter and facebook. Those without internet access would be able to call Auburn public safety officials and ask that their contact information be entered into the CodeRED system.

Required information would include first and last name, street address (no P.O. Boxes), city, state, zip code, and primary phone number. All businesses and individuals would be asked to register, including those who have unlisted phone numbers, have changed their phone number or address within the past year, as well as those who use cellular phones or Voice Over Internet Protocol (VOIP) phones as their primary contact numbers.

CodeRED has a geographically based delivery, which means street addresses (rather than P.O. boxes) are required to ensure emergency notification calls are received by the proper individuals in a given situation. The system works for cell phones too, but the system requires the associated street address to provide relevant messages.

CodeRED can give those who choose to participate, an easy and secure method for inputting information. The data collected would only be used for emergency notification purposes.



All concerts are FREE of charge, and include a free raffle. Everyone attending receives a raffle ticket, even the kids!



Water-Powered Sawmills in Auburn

In 1860, on the eve of the Civil War, New Hampshire was the most industrialized state in the nation. Industry at that time meant water power. Most of Auburn is located in the Lake Massabesic watershed. The hills around Massabesic create a terrain ideal for water power. Dams were built to control water flow. Early spring meant melting snow and the sawmills would hum with activity. After a 60 day "season," the freshet would be gone and the brooks would again be left to frogs and kids.

Preston Brook, which flows between Spruce Swamp and Little Massabesic Pond had three mills; Dearborn, Pingree, and a fulling mill below Colman Road. Hook Brook, with its mill just east of the Chester Turnpike (near Ethan Howard's house) also flowed into Little Massabesic.

Up in Hooksett, Maple Falls Brook flows into Tower Hill Pond and then under Route 101 into Clark's Pond. This mill, owned by the Clark's, Griffin's, and finally the Manchester Water Works, was located on the Manchester-Portsmouth railroad line which meant that finished products had access to good transportation. (Today, the FOMBA bike trail begins here on Depot Road.)

This mill and the Griffin Mill at the dam in Auburn Village were the only mills with enough water to run most of the year. There are still many people in town who either worked at the MWW mill or their father or grandfather did.

John O'Neil of the Manchester Water Works and Dee Cleary are working on a presentation of Auburn's saw-mills for the first of Auburn Historical Association's 2014 Program Series. If you have a mill story, Dee would like to talk with you.

The presentation is set for Wednesday, April 9 at 6:30 p.m. We will be showing a film of Al Sanborn and Eddie Locke's sawmill as well as a slide show of many of our former mill buildings and the people who ran them. Please join us for an evening full of stories. We hope you will bring a few stories of your own to share.

On Friday, April 11, our regular Auburn Historical Association meeting will start with a 6 p.m. potluck supper. The meeting at 7:00 p.m. will discuss this year's Duck Race. See you there.

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
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


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
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Longmeadow's April Breakfasts!


April 5 and 19 Saturdays 7-10 AM
