





Citizens Service Auburn

Since the March elections, there have been a number of Auburn residents who have been appointed to serve on various town boards and committees, or in specific positions.

The Board of Selectmen has re-appointed Edward Fehrenbach, Jeffrey Porter and Stephanie Hanson to terms on the Conservation Commission, while Mike DiPietro, Eva Komaridis and Dan Carpenter have been re-appointed to terms on the Highway Safety Committee.

Sharon Bluhm and Lorraine Senechal have been re-appointed as Alternate Library Trustees, while Lisa Canavan and Patrick Kelly have been given new terms on the Parks and Recreation Commission.

Elizabeth Robidoux and Mike DiPietro have been re-appointed as members of the Zoning Board of Adjustment, while Robert Beaurivage and Kevin Stuart have been given new terms as Alternate Members of the Zoning Board of Adjustment

Elected Tax Collector Kathleen Sylvia has been re-appointed as Deputy Town Clerk, while Susan Jenkins has been reappointed as the Deputy Tax Collector.

Griffin Mill Bridge

Efforts are moving forward to design and permit the rehabilitation of the Griffin Mill Bridge. Stantec Consulting has been working with Town officials, affected local residents and the Manchester Water Works to design the bridge work, in addition to the temporary access that will be needed during the construction efforts.

At this point, there is not specific start date for this work effort, which is dependent upon the issuance of the Wetlands and Shoreline Protection permits that will be required through the NH Department of Environmental Services.

Within the past few weeks, it has become clear the NH Legislature is going to approve an increase in the "road tolls" (i.e. gas tax). This action is going to result in significantly increased funding to the Municipal Bridge Program. Instead of the potential of a 10+ year wait for needed funding for the Griffin Mill Bridge project, this increased funding could reduce the wait for Auburn to potentially a three to five year time frame.

In order to potentially secure 80% state funding for this work effort, the Board of Selectmen has decided to apply for the Municipal Bridge Aid Program administered by the NH Department of Transportation in order to determine how much the time frame may have changed. If the new funding dramatically makes a difference, a decision may be made to postpone the actual construction work for Griffin Mill Bridge in order to secure the 80% state funding for this project.

Town Property Maintenance

The Town recently put the mowing and care of 12 Town properties, parks and ballfields out to competitive bid. This is something the Town does regularly once every three years. A total of eight contractors submitted proposals. After a careful comparison and a check of references on the four lowest vendors, the Board of Selectmen awarded the contract to Bill Jones & Sons Lawn Care and Landscaping of Manchester. Their total bid proposal was \$26,900, which is slightly less than the funds budgeted for this work.

The Screaming Eagles

The New Hampshire Legislature has just approved legislation that will name a portion of New Hampshire Route 101 after the historic 101^{st} Airborne Division. The " 101^{st} Airborne Division Screaming Eagles Highway" will run from the Intersection of Route 101^{st} Airborne Division of Hourn/Candia town line near Exit 3.


Appropriate signage honoring all New Hampshire veterans who have served with the 101st Airborne Division will be erected along that stretch of Route 101.

Auburn Selectman James Headd participated in the bill signing ceremony held at the State House on April 22^{nd} with Governor Hassan.





Auburn Fire Department to Participate in Nuclear Decontamination Exercise

The City of Manchester, NH has accepted the designation as a host city for evacuees of several towns around the nuclear power plant in Seabrook, NH. Basic responsibilities include acceptance, monitoring and possible decontamination of evacuees in the case of a radiological release of materials from the plant. A team has been developed and trained by the Manchester Fire Department and the Hillsborough County Sheriff Department. The team members are made from the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Department, Manchester Firefighters and their families, surrounding town fire departments, *Aubum*, Bedford, Goffstown, Hooksett, the Manchester Medical Reserve Core, Goffstown Cert Team, AES Ham Radio Group, State Department of Health and Human Services, and other City and State departments.

All previous training as it relates to the Radiological Emergency Response Plan (RERP) will be put to the test. Participating agencies will be graded and the exercise will take place on Monday, May 5th at the Memorial High School, in Manchester, NH.

The RERP organizes emergency capabilities for a rapid and coordinated response to any incident at a commercial nuclear power plant in or adjacent to NH (i.e., NH Seabrook and VT Yankee nuclear power stations). The NH Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (HSEM) will coordinate the plan and delegate responsibilities to other state and private agencies. The Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) Commissioner is assigned responsibilities to establish and manage Registration and Rendezvous Services (R&RS) at Reception Centers in the event of a need to evacuate the population from impacted areas. Whenever a significant incident occurs at a commercial nuclear facility, HSEM mobilizes a decision-making team at the state's Emergency Operations Center (EOC). This team classifies the incident in conjunction with the utility involved. All evacuees will be registered, their housing and other needs determined, and assistance provided to reunite them with other family members. Coordination with other Reception Center operations will be established and maintained. The Coordinator of Emergency Services (CES) will be in continual contact with R&RS staff at the EOC and respond to needs for material and staffing resources. If an incident at the Seabrook or Vermont Yankee nuclear power stations requires the evacuation of towns in any affected areas, the host communities of Manchester, Dover, Rochester and Keene will open Reception Centers, as needed, in selected schools in each host community. Evacuees will register upon arrival at a Reception Center and be referred to a Red Cross shelter as necessary.

As you can see, the Auburn Fire Department continues its quest to maintain the highest levels of readiness and proficiency for the protection of both the local and surrounding communities.





"COWS & COMMUNITIES"


How the lowly Bovine has nurtured NH through four centuries.

A thriving 160-acre farm, it features 120 head of cattle, a creamery & store and a maple sugar operation. Holding the position of Commissioner of Agriculture for 25 years, Steve has shared his commitment to the celebration & presentation of an old New England way of life.



Great news for all of you who bring youngsters to the library! Starting this month, our storytimes (and some other children's programs) will be designed for specific age groups. This will help you in deciding which Griffin Free events are best for you and your children.

Once a month, we will have a storytime for little ones (0-4). These will be held
on Tuesday mornings at 11:00 a.m., and will involve stories and a basic activity
(clapping games, movement, dancing, or other age-appropriate activities).



The Friends of the Library are planning a bake sale that day and will have drinks and food for sale with a corner where you can relax and have a snack or lunch while you shop.



AVS Garden Celebrates Earth Day!


We are pleased to announce that plans are underway for the 4th growing season in Auburn Village School's Learning Garden! This collaborative effort sprouted from parents in the PTA and the AVS Wellness Committee, and is embraced by teachers and students alike. By the time you read this newsletter we will have finished celebrating Earth Day in the Garden with activities including: a healthy smoothie station, a baby chick petting station, a seed planted in a recycled milk carton with a wish written on paper, Yoga & Tai Chi stretching station, rock & face painting, and much more! Earth Day marks the beginning of our new season and creates a lot of excitement for students as they look forward to getting outside to apply their learning in the great outdoors!


Teachers and students will once again be able to use the garden to enhance their subjects in the areas of Science, Math, Social Studies, PE, Writing, Music and Art. The garden also serves as a platform to reduce obesity by promoting appreciation for a healthy diet and outdoor lifestyle and appreciation of the natural world. Principal, Sean Pine has always supported the garden and had the following to say after watching the corn harvest last fall, "It's a truly wonderful thing to see what the children are learning outdoors and to see how the garden allows it all to come to life!"

Last year's biggest accomplishment was the outdoor classroom built by 7th grade students in which they utilized their geometry skills to plan the space, craft the frame and spread the wood chips. The space has 4 large tables and a peach tree in the center that was planted on Earth Day 2013. There is also a new Tee Pee that 7th graders from the Nature and Garden class built so that kindergarteners could plant climbing green beans and Morning Glories, allowing for a shady place to relax and read. First graders were mentored by 5th graders for the planting and harvesting of potatoes that were later roasted in the lunch room once again. Fourth graders planted corn that was successfully harvested by them as 5th graders in the fall and enjoyed as popcorn in December! The 2nd grade team planted both daffodils and tulips, as well as peppers and sunflowers. Third graders started mini pumpkins from seed indoors and then planted them outside to later enjoy in the fall as 4th graders. In the fall of 2012 the entire 4th grade was able to pick one of 68 birdhouse gourds they grew in the garden, dried them over the winter months, drilled a hole and then painted the bird houses bring home!

Finally, the school cafeteria began composting last year with help from the 7th graders who built the compost bins and 2nd graders who bring scraps outside weekly. This year the school has added two indoor worm composters in 5th and 7th grade classrooms where fruit and veggie snack scraps help worms make a compost "tea" for plants and fresh compost for fertilizer.

If you are interested in helping with the garden, making a donation or in-kind gifts, our wish list includes: water proof gloves, 5 gal buckets, wood chips, mulch, gazebo tent for shade, gift cards to hardware or retail stores with garden centers. 




