

Summer Senior Trip



Re-Thinking Used Waste Oil Collection

During the past couple of months, the Town has focused attention on the handling and disposal of waste materials largely concerning the one Saturday per month waste oil collection program at the former landfill property.



Since the landfill was closed and the Waste Management transfer station became operational, the Town has continued to accept used waste oil from residents at a once-a-month collection program in partnership with Waste Management. Unfortunately, over time, individuals began dropping off waste containers with oil and other materials on days other than the designated collection day. Sometimes the containers were left near the collection shack, while others were left next to the property gate near Chester Turnpike when it was closed.

Not knowing who generated this material, it was not able to be included in the approximate 50-gallons per month of waste oil Waste Management collects at the Auburn site. So it became material the Town became responsible to handle and dispose of through other means. So far this year, the Town has incurred approximately \$4,000 in expenses to properly dispose of this material.

Discussions are underway to relocate the collection program from the Town property to the Waste Management transfer station off By-Pass 28. Officials from Waste Management, NH Department of Environmental Services (NHDES), Manchester Water Works and the Town of Auburn have agreed everyone will be better served by the re-location of this program. Auburn residents in particular would have a greater access to the service in that it would go from being available one Saturday a month to being available the six days per week the transfer station is open for residential drop-off.

There remain operational plans and details to be determined, but all parties are optimistic that this change in location will occur before the end of this year.

Roadside Waste

In addition to dealing with the waste oil issue, the Town has also adopted a policy to deal with the issue of waste and materials that are dropped along the roadside throughout our community.

The policy establishes the Auburn Police Department will first be notified of any materials found along the roadside for potential action against the offenders. It further authorizes the Road Agent to be able to remove the material to ensure its appropriate disposal.

While this may seem to be a relative small issue, residents would likely be surprised at the volume of material that is dropped along the roadsides in Auburn, and also what is dropped. There is typically what you might expect with garbage bags, tires and other assorted household items. But there is also a significant amount of televisions, electronic equipment, furniture and other large bulky items that can be found in areas throughout the town.

It is often times extremely difficult to determine who the culprits are who might dispose of their property this way. And, unfortunately, the pick-up, collection and disposal by the Town ultimately does cost some money. But the alternative of leaving this material along the roadside is really no alternative at all.

Stable Monitoring Well Results

Since the Town closed its landfill, the Town has maintained a series of approximately 12 monitoring wells around the property. Twice a year, the Town has water samples pulled from the wells and tested for various containments that would be found in landfill operations. This testing process is required by the NH Department of Environmental Services (NHDES), with the results reported and filed with the state agency.

Auburn received the results of its most recent monitor sampling from earlier this year, and has been provided a positive result with all items being consistent with previous test results. There have been no further actions recommended for any remediation work or efforts.

E-Waste Collection Event Scheduled

Mark your calendars now. Auburn's annual Electronic "E-Waste" Collection Day has been scheduled for Saturday, October 18th in the front parking lot of the Auburn Village School from 9 AM to 2 PM.

Police Department

It seems like it's been an eternity since I wrote anything for the Town Crier. I didn't write an article for the May issue, and when I returned to work in early May I wrote a short article for June, but then there was no issue for July. That's a large dry spell for me, so let me try to get the dust off the keyboard and write something useful.

First, there have been a few personnel changes at the Police Department this year. Sergeant David Garofano retired, and stayed on as a part time Patrol Sergeant. It was a perfect solution to one of the part time Officer openings on the roster. There were no added costs, and he actually took a cut in pay as a result of going part time. Dave was instrumental in establishing the integrity of the evidence room, and by staying on, he remains the evidence tech for our department. That alone is a huge plus for the Auburn Police Department.


Dave's retirement created an opening for a full time Patrol Officer. The opening was filled by Officer Kevin Cashman, who comes to us with about eight year's experience from the Candia Police Department. He's not a raw rookie, so the training curve was small to get Kevin on patrol here in Auburn. He started at a much lower rate of pay than Sergeant Garofano was earning, which is a large savings in the operating budget of the Police Department. Kevin is young, experienced, well educated, and extremely professional. Some of the residents who have met him have actually contacted the Chief to compliment Kevin on how he handled some calls. He is fitting in perfectly.

Recently our Administrative Assistant Annie Flight retired. She has been with us for nearly fourteen years, and turned the magical age to explore other avenues in her life. She felt it was time to spend more time with her husband, and get off the law enforcement stress train. Annie answered our telephones, and handled all the data entry for us. She was also the person the public first encountered when they came to the Police Department to register a complaint, or to get information on any issue. Annie did a good job. We wish her well in her new endeavor.

It's been a while since we lost Police Commissioner Hubert Topliff. Speaking for myself, I will say he is greatly missed; Pastor Topliff helped me weather some tough times in the past. Hu wasn't only a Police Commissioner, he also served us as our Chaplain. His position as Chaplain put him in some precarious spots over the years, and he handled those challenges very well. As Chaplain he frequently would help an Officer get through those first time traumatic events, like investigating a fatal motor vehicle crash, or having to go to someone's home to make a death notification. He was always compassionate and professional, and never violated any code of confidentiality. After his passing there was a very large void in the Police Department. Recently that void is starting to get occupied. Pastor Ruth of the Longmeadow Church has joined our Department as our new Chaplain. So far she has met with the Chief and some of the Officers here at the station to get acquainted, and to make herself known. Excuse the pun, but she is Heaven sent. She has also done some ride-a-longs to meet Officers and to experience what a cruiser shift is like. Of course, bringing in homemade cup cakes certainly warmed up the Officers as well. It won't be long before she is earning the same status Commissioner Topliff held. We thank her for taking on this responsibility.

The Auburn Historical Association is conducting their annual Duck Race and Community Event on September 13, 2014. There are many activities planned. The Auburn Police Department will be involved with the event also. The plans are still in the development stage, but there will be a law enforcement presence.
