



News from the Auburn Town Hall

Town Hall Septic System Replacement

During the past year or so, the need to replace the Town Hall septic system has become apparent as the existing system has on several occasions become overwhelmed with the result being it comes back through to its lowest point, which is the bathroom on the lower level of the building.



For the past couple of years, the Town has been pumping the system out three and four times a year, to the point that replacement became the necessary course of action.

Acting through its engineering firm, Stantec Consulting of Auburn, the Town had a replacement system for the Town Hall designed and permitted by the NH Department of Environmental Services (NHDES). When the project was put out to bid, four proposals were received which included Viking Excavation of Candia, \$26,961.24; Henniker Sewer & Drain Service of Henniker, \$38,581; W.P. Davis Excavation, LLC of Hampton, \$48,585; and C.S.S.I. of Bedford, \$60,700.

After a review of the proposals and a check of references, the Board of Selectmen awarded the project to Viking Excavation. Work on the project is expected to begin by September, and should be completed by October 1st.

Potential Auburn Skateboard Park

During the past several months, residents had approached the Parks & Recreation Commission and the Board of Selectmen with the idea of establishing a small skateboard park on Town property. The idea is to locate a facility in the area of the ice skating rinks, basketball court and lacrosse field adjacent to the Auburn Safety Complex on Eaton Hill Road.

Leading the effort is Karen Norris of Raymond Road, who reports there are dozens of young people in Auburn that are passionate about skateboarding, but have nowhere to do it safely.

Conceptual ideas and drawings of potential skate park features have been secured from a firm specializing in this type of facility. To minimize ongoing maintenance work, the organizers are looking at a cement facility as opposed to one built with plywood ramps and metal pipes. The intention is also to have the park open only from dusk to dawn, and not to add outdoor lights to keep it open into the night hours.

A fundraising effort will be undertaken with a goal of raising \$65,000. Organizers intend to raise funds to not only build the facility, but also to be able to put additional money away for future maintenance, and not ask the taxpayers of Auburn to fund the project.

Mrs. Norris reports organizers of similar facilities in other municipalities have indicated such a fund raising effort will take two to three years. The Board of Selectmen have approved of the fundraising activity, which will determine what the level of interest and support for such an undertaking is within the community. All funds donated will be held by the Town of Auburn for this purpose, and all donors will receive a letter of thanks and acknowledgement for their donation should they want to claim the donation on their taxes.

This has reduced the cost of printing and distribution from approximately \$11,000 per year to less than \$2,000 per year.

Police Department

I am so pleased to be able to report to the Auburn citizens how successful Detective Sergeant Chip Chabot has become in solving a number of this years burglaries, and a few more from 2013. Along with his talents, there are a few tools at his disposal to assist him. Some of those tools are DNA, fingerprints, a program called "Leads on Line", his computer knowledge, and of course - the Auburn Neighborhood Watch group.

Earlier this year I did an initial report of a burglary, and in doing so I collected a cigarette butt in the yard of the house that was burglarized. Chip had the butt analyzed at the State Lab, and a little while later the lab reported a match, and provided an ID of burglar. That information helped Chip solve two other burglaries in town, and also some burglaries in a couple neighboring towns. Excellent police work!

"Leads on Line" is a program that permits Chip to locate items that are pawned in and around the Manchester area. He has recovered a large amount of stolen items because of this program, and as a result solved some burglaries. One burglar he discovered from "Leads on Line" also was involved in a large burglary ring out of Derry and Salem, New Hampshire. That burglar is now serving a prison sentence.

Of course the best tool in the arsenal is the Neighborhood Watch group. The group has become the extra eyes the Police Department needs to patrol the streets in town. We receive at least a hundred calls a month from the various group members with information that at times is useful. Some of the information has lead to a few arrests. The members share information about the happenings in town, and give each other tips on how to protect your families and property.

Recently a young boy was home and heard someone knocking on the door, and later pounding on the door. He was knowledgeable enough to call a parent and report what was happening. His father was a short distance from the home and soon arrived. The father encountered two men who gave him a bogus excuse for being there. The father was very smart in not making a federal case out of this. Instead he sent them on their way, and appropriately wrote down the plate number of their vehicle. Guess what? They were burglars, and the father ruined their plan. The end story on this, is Detective Chabot followed up with the plate number and went to a Massachusetts Police Department investigating the two bad guys. They were already in jail for crimes they did in that Massachusetts town. That young boy's actions, and his father's actions, saved their house from getting victimized. Great job!


Now, a little advice. Please train your children the importance of 911. In the above case, everything worked out perfectly, but that may not always be the case. Burglars are not usually violent, they want to get in and out without any confrontation, but on occasion we have all heard the horror stories of someone being harmed during a burglary. We don't want that here in Auburn. In all cases when someone comes to your door, and they look suspicious and have no real reason for being there, call 911. It may sound like an over reaction, but why take the chance. Get a cruiser dispatched to your house, and let the Officer figure out whether there's a threat or not. If the person leaves before the Officer shows up, please try to get a plate number from their vehicle, and get a description of the vehicle, as well as a description of the person(s) that came to your house. Always remember to have the security of an Officer coming to your house to assess the problem instead of taking the chance of handling it yourself. Stay safe!

Some of the warning signs are for you to watch for are basic. 1. A person and/or vehicle you don't recognize or know. 2. Someone asking for a place or street you may or may not heard of. 3. Someone asking if so and so is home. 4. People trying to give you a deal on some house repairs, or trying to sell you some extra items that they just happen to have. Things like electronics equipment, gardening items, etc. 5. People claiming to be checking your cable TV, computer, or telephone lines.


There are more examples, but I think you have the idea. If it sounds or looks out of place, you're probably right. Before you do anything, CALL 911, and be safe.

By all means please remember that you are NEVER bothering us. We all took an oath to serve and protect the community we were sworn to be law enforcement Officers in. We will be there for you, and we will do everything in our power to keep your families and property safe.

Fire Department Considers Residential Knox-Box Program:

Knox-Box Program? What's that? Well, a Knox-Box (or Knox-Box Rapid Entry System), is a small, wall-mounted <u>safe</u> that holds building keys for <u>fire departments</u> and emergency medical service personnel to retrieve in emergency situations. The local fire department can hold master keys to all boxes in their response area, so that they can quickly enter a building without having to force entry or find individual keys held in deposit at the station. Most often, the Knox Master Key is stored in a key retention device that provides accountability on access to the key, as well as an audit trail of when the key is accessed. Key access requires a <u>dispatcher</u> to release the key with special tones sent via radio communications.

A Knox-Box can simplify key control for the fire department. It can also reduce monetary losses for homeowners since firefighters can enter buildings without breaking doors or windows. It can also reduce the potential of a firefighter being injured during forced entry operations.

When there is a fire or an individual is injured or ill, emergency personnel can respond quickly, without forced entry, when a Knox-Box is installed at or near an entry door and a small decal is placed on entry doors so fire fighters know a Knox-Box exists. The Derry Dispatch Center is also notified so first responders can be notified while they are responding. With the entrance key stored inside, the door can simply be opened and relocked when the emergency is over. Forced entry slows down response and can further traumatize an already incapacitated individual making a stressful situation even worse.

A residential Knox Box is ideal for individuals who:

- have a history of medical problems
- are recuperating from a hospital stay
- live alone

use an electronic calling/medical alert service
