

## News from the Auburn Town Hall



### Town and Police Union at Impasse on Labor Contract

Following nearly three months of negotiating the Town and the Union have not been able to reach agreement on the terms of a new contract and have declared an impasse in their negotiations. The one year agreement reached last year will expire on March 31, 2014. The Auburn Police Commission, Board of Selectmen and the Auburn Police Union have been attempting to come to terms on a new two-year agreement that would commence April 1, 2014 and run through March 31, 2016.

The parties are currently working together to identify a neutral third-party mediator and schedule a mediation session to see if an agreement can be reached before the January 14<sup>th</sup> deadline for a 2014 Town warrant article.

If the parties are not able to successfully reach an agreement that is ratified by the Union and the Board of Selectmen, and presented to the Budget Committee by January 14<sup>th</sup>, then negotiations would likely continue into 2014. The next opportunity to present cost items related to a new agreement to the voters would be the annual meeting in March 2015.

### FY 2014 Budget

Since the Fall, town boards and commissions, department heads, the Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee have been working on proposals for the 2014 Town operating budget.

As this edition of the Village Crier is being prepared, work on the budget and most of the warrant articles have been completed. The bottom line of the proposed budget for 2014 is coming in at \$5,039,010, compared to this year's approved budget of \$4,977,052. The main differences between the two year's budgets are several including:

- \$8,593 for three elections to be held in 2014 (Town and School District elections in March, a State Primary Election in September and State General Election in November).
- \$6,500 for a part-time office assistant to be cross-trained for the Town Clerk & Tax Collector's Office to provide improved coverage including the full use of a second service window.
- \$10,939 increase in the contracted ambulance service for Auburn from the Town of Derry.
- \$8,522 in increased expenses for property and liability insurance coverages for the Town.
- \$1,000 to begin a process of digitally copying paper tax map documents and preparing smaller paper copies of the older records for permanent storage.
- \$44,067 for a Cost of Living (COLA) adjustment of 1.3% and Step Increases as applicable for non-unionized Town employees.

The Budget Committee will hold a public hearing on the proposed budgets for the Town and School District on Thursday, January 16<sup>th</sup> at the Town Hall at 7:30 pm.

The Town will be mailing out a copy of the proposed budget and the warrant for the 2014 Town Meeting to all residents at the end of January. This is to provide information in advance of the Deliberative Session of Town Meeting scheduled for Saturday February 1, 2014.





## Auburn Fire Department



### **Auburn Fire Department Plans Cold Water Ice Rescue Training:**

As our winter temperatures continue to drop, ponds and lakes will soon be frozen over. Walking, skating, ice fishing, snowmobiling or other activities on the frozen bodies of water is a great way to get out and enjoy the fresh air during the long winter months. Unfortunately, these pursuits can lead to accidents and ice rescue calls for the Fire Department. In light of this, Department members are gearing up to conduct Cold Water Ice Rescue Training. Each of the department's four fire crews will participate in detailed classroom sessions followed by a rigorous live practical exercise. Once Massabesic Lake has frozen over, firefighters will use cold water exposure suits, specialized ropes, harnesses and stokes baskets; and a fellow firefighter will actually be "rescued" from the icy lake waters. Once each crew has been trained and passes the practical exercise, a combined rescue drill will take place involving all crews and all phases of a cold water incident. The event will not only encompass a live rescue, but will also emphasize shore support operations, warming techniques and emergency patient transport. The greatest asset to successful cold water rescue is speed. As a citizen, if you see someone struggling in the water or you believe they've gone under the ice, Dial 911 and do your best to be cognizant of the location and how many people are in the water. Don't attempt a rescue yourself. Remain calm and don't become a victim yourself.

#### **The following are some tips that can help ensure ice safety:**

- Never go on untested lakes or ponds and NEVER go on the ice alone.
- Beware of ice covered with snow. Snow can insulate ice and keep it from freezing. Snow hides cracks as well as weak and open ice.
- Ice seldom freezes or thaws at a uniform rate. It can be a foot thick in one spot and an inch thick in another.
- Ice formed over flowing water (including springs under the surface) is generally weaker than ice over still water.
- Snowmobile riders should keep ice safety in mind! Check local conditions before heading out on snowmobile trails and ice.
- Know the body of water, nearby street, and where the nearest location is to go for help.
- Always keep pets on a leash. If a pet falls through the ice, do not attempt a rescue—go for help.

#### **What to do When Someone has Fallen Through the Ice:**

- Call 911
- If you're not alone, always have someone wait for the emergency responder to bring them to the exact location of the victim.
- Try to throw something to the victim to reach and retrieve them (a rope, tree branch, even jumper cables from the car, etc.) but never attempt to go onto the ice yourself in order to rescue someone. The ice could NOT support their weight, it will NOT support your weight.
- Try to remain calm and reassuring to the victim.
- If you fall in, try not to panic. Turn toward the direction you came from. Place your hands and arms on the unbroken surface, working forward by kicking your feet. Once the ice is solid enough to hold you, and you can pull yourself out, remain lying on the ice (do not stand); lying down spreads your weight across a wider area, lessening the weight on any one spot) and roll away from the hole. Crawl the way you came, keeping your weight distributed, until you return to solid ice or ground.

## AUBURN HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION




### Do You Remember When??


**The Bay View House:** Everett Seavey shared his memories of the Bay View House when Fred Stacy owned it in the early 1930's. Everett was just a young teenager at the time. He said that Fred grew a garden out in back of the house to feed the guests. It had a whole section of muskmelons & watermelons, in which he and his friends would raid. One night they decided to get the old man out of bed by throwing a pebble at the window, and when Fred came out after them, he wasn't very happy. He also shared that Fred Stacy let the town use the lower field as a baseball diamond for the older boys. Everett was too young to play but watched the game with others in town on Sundays. He said that Fred had the first motorized boat for guests to tour the lake in, which was docked at the old wharf, located at the bottom of Bunker Hill Road.

**The Ice House:** The next oral history column will be about the Manchester Coal & Ice Company's icehouse, built in 1896. Ice was cut into blocks from Lake Massabesic, guided to a conveyor that went above the road (Rt 121 near the rail tracks) and deposited into the building and preserved in sawdust. The photos depict the conveyor ramp at the lake, and the rear of the building at Severance Train Depot where the ice was loaded onto trains bound for Manchester.
