







A Thanksgiving Weekend to Remember

For many of us, Thanksgiving 2014 will be one that we are talking about for years to come due to heavy snow, power outages that lasted for days and, for many, a Thanksgiving dinner that was cooked unexpectedly on a wood stove or the gas grill.

While most of us were dealing with families and holiday plans, it was 'all hands on deck' for our emergency services personnel on the Auburn Fire Department, Highway Department and Police Department.

Between November 26th at 3 PM and 8 AM on December 1st, the main focus for everyone was to keep the roadways of Auburn open for the public and for emergency vehicles that may be called into service.

While Road Agent Mike Dross and his crew were kept busy moving heavy wet snow, and addressing trees and limbs that were falling on power lines and roadways, Fire Chief Bruce Phillips dispatched three three-man crews of firefighters to assist with cutting back trees and helping in the opening of roads.

During the weekend, the Auburn Police Department responded to 32 weather-related calls for assistance, while they had a total of 45 calls during that time period.

Power around the Town began to go out in the north and south areas first, with nearly 93% of Auburn without power at the peak of the storm activity. Unfortunately, for some, it was three and four days before electric power and/or cable and telephone service was restored. The hardest hit areas of Auburn from the storm were the McEvoy Drive, Hills Road, Hooksett Road, Heather Circle and Meadow Lane areas.

Both fire stations were opened early Thursday morning to the public for showers, water and to serve as a warming shelter. Residents filtered through the stations Thursday and Friday, with one resident spending the night on Thursday. The two stations remained open to the public through 8 AM Monday morning to ensure all Auburn residents' needs were met.

On Friday, a two-person crew from the Fire Department went door-to-door checking on senior citizens and shut-ins to make certain all was well. If there were trees blocking driveways, they would open them up for the resident.

Through it all the Highway crew, police officers and firefighters all worked extremely well together to provide the residents of Auburn with among the best and fastest service in our region.

We want to take this opportunity to acknowledge all of their efforts and to thank them for being there to take care of our community.

The public hearing on the 2015 Town and School District budgets will be held on Thursday, January 15th.







Every year, we prepare for a new batch of fresh electronics to make their way into the use of Griffin Free Public Library. Smartphones, tablets, laptops, e-readers...they are all popular holiday gifts, and all can be used to do so much with the library.



For those of you unfamiliar, or who might want a refresher, the biggest benefit of these devices is the use of New Hampshire Downloadable Books. Griffin Free participates in the statewide consortium for this service, which provides each one of our users with access to thousands of ebooks and downloadable audiobooks that you can use from almost any kind of electronic device - absolutely free of charge. See our calendar below for our next class on using this great service!

Another benefit of these devices is the ability to access your library account from anywhere with Internet access. When you access your account, you can place holds on library materials, see what you have out (and renew it), examine your checkout history, make purchase requests, and more. You will need to set up a password with us to access this information; get in touch with anyone on staff to get your account ready.

Finally, many of these devices are perfect for taking advantage of free public wifi. And Griffin Free Public Library has that ready and waiting. Additionally, our staff will do their best to help find you answers to any questions you have about your devices - no matter whether it's right after Christmas, or in the middle of summer.

Happy New Year! We at the Auburn Police Department hope that each of you had very wonderful and safe holiday season. We also want to send a HUGE thank you for the unbelievable amount of toys that were donated during the Auburn Safety Complex Toys for Tots drive.



While Thanksgiving did bring a large snowstorm, we did not see a lot of snow during the month of December. Unfortunately after the New Year and the months that follow are typically when we do see the majority of snow storms, weather related emergencies and power outages.

We urge our residents to be safe and think cautiously when it comes to winter to these cold winter months.

If you must drive during bad weather please keep the following tips in mind:

- If you don't have to go out PLEASE stay home
- Always wear your seatbelt (no matter what time of year it is)
- Put extra blankets, gloves, hats, snacks, water, and any needed medication in your car
- If you become snow-bound stay in your vehicle till help arrives
- Always keep your cell phone at least 50% charged in case of an emergency
- Clear off your car as much as possible, including scraping the entire window, and don't forget the roof.

For your home, yourself and your family:

- Stock up on non-perishable foods
- Make sure your flashlights have batteries that work, and that you have spare batteries handy
- A first aid kit
- Test your smoke detector and battery-operated carbon monoxide detector
- Stock up on salt or sand for slippery walk ways or pathways
- In the event of long periods of power outages, you may want to check on elderly neighbors
- Always dress warmly and stay dry, even if you think you will only be outside for a couple minutes. Be sure to layer your clothing with extra sweaters, hats, scarves, gloves and jackets
- Please don't forget your pets in these winter months, they get cold quickly too.

Taking preventive action is your best defense against having to deal with extreme cold-weather conditions. By preparing your home and car in advance for winter emergencies and by observing safety precautions during times of extremely cold weather, you can reduce the risk of weather related problems.
