





## Auburn Village School Master Plan Update



## News from the Auburn Town Hall



### Mosquito Collection and Testing Dates

The Town of Auburn's mosquito control program for 2015 was begun on April 15<sup>th</sup> with initial efforts focused on the control of larval mosquitoes in stagnant bodies of water.

Swamp Inc., the Town's contracted vendor, will start adult mosquito collections in the month of June. Mosquito populations will be recorded and only collections in June of *Cs. melanura* (primary vector for EEE) will be sent to the Connecticut Agricultural Experimental Station for EEE/WNV testing. The results of these collections are usually received by the end of the 2015 season.

The primary method of mosquito control in Auburn will be a bacterium (BTI) that is a naturally occurring parasite of mosquito larvae. Areas requiring control will be salt marshes, cattail marshes, red maple swamps, woodland pools, roadside ditches, street and parking lot catch basins, marshes, flooded fields and stormwater basins. Special emphasis will be placed upon the control of mosquito species that are known vectors of West Nile Virus and Eastern Equine Encephalitis.

Following state regulations, the mosquito season is separated into two phases for mosquito submissions: Phase I (early season) and Phase II (mid to end season). Phase I runs July 1<sup>st</sup> through 31<sup>st</sup>, (dates pertain to date of collection), while Phase II will be August 1<sup>st</sup> or first NH EEE or WNV detection (whichever comes first) through September 30<sup>th</sup>.

The NH Department of Health & Human Services (HHS) informs the media and public of positive tests results, regions of increased disease risk, and other important up-to-date information through the news media and other sources, including its website: <http://www.dhhs.nh.gov/dphs/cdcs/arboviral/results.htm>.

Information regarding personal protection measures, general background information, and regular updates on surveillance and laboratory analysis is available at this site.

Margie McEvoy was re-appointed as an alternate member of the Parks and Recreation Commission.

Jim Lagana was re-appointed to a three-year term on the Zoning Board of Adjustment, while Sharon Bluhm and Elizabeth Michaud were re-appointed to one-year terms as Library Trustee Alternates. Linda Dross was re-appointed to serve as Deputy Treasurer.

Tim Therrien's resignation from the Parks & Recreation Commission was accepted with regret, and David Nye was appointed to fill the vacant position.

The Board also accepted with regret the resignation of R. John Roy from the Board of Cemetery Trustees.




## MOSQUITO TRAP DESCRIPTIONS:

### Gravid Traps and Resting Boxes

The bucket contains a mixture of fermented hay and water which has a powerful smell but attractive to mosquitoes. A fan and collection net are set on top of the tray of smelly water. The fan is powered by a small battery. When the mosquitoes are attracted to the water to lay eggs, they pass by the trap opening and are pulled into the collection net. The mosquitoes are removed in the laboratory for examination and analysis.

### CDC/CO2 Miniature Light Traps


These traps are commonly suspended from tree limbs that hang above the ground and are powered by a battery. Traps attract mosquitoes by a light bulb and CO2 that is emitted from the dry ice in a cooler. When the mosquitoes get close to the light they are pulled into the container by a small electric fan where they are captured and collected for analysis.



### May is National Water Safety Month!

Temperatures are rising, and kids are suiting up for swim season. But if you're a parent, you're probably thinking about how to make sure your kids stay safe while they're having fun around water this summer.

Drowning is the sixth leading cause of unintentional injury or death for people of all ages and the second leading cause of death for children ages 1 to 14. Keeping your family safe in and around the water is all about knowing how to prevent accidents and handle emergencies. Planning ahead can help you be prepared.

Making sure every member of your family can swim is your first line of defense against water-related accidents, but that shouldn't be your only precaution. Even children who are excellent swimmers should not swim alone, and older children and adults should become certified in CPR to be able to help in case of a water accident.

In addition, there is a variety of safety gear available that can help you prevent accidents as well as respond effectively in an emergency. But remember: no safety device is a substitute for constant adult supervision.

If you have a home swimming pool, a well-secured, heavy-duty plastic cover for periods of non-use can help prevent children from accidentally falling in. No matter how old your children are, it's a good idea to keep a U.S. Coast Guard-approved life preserver readily accessible in case of an emergency. Check with your insurance company for emergency equipment recommendations and requirements for a home pool.

An ocean dip can mean sharp rocks and sea creatures under foot. Plastic water shoes can help remove the worry and make stepping out into the surf a lot more fun. And for serious swimmers, a high quality set of fog-resistant plastic goggles protects eyes from saltwater sting during a long afternoon swim. Snug-fitting plastic goggles can even let contact lens wearers go for a swim without losing a lens.

Carrying accessible, appropriately sized personal flotation devices - better known as life jackets - while boating is essential. State laws vary, so check with your state boating law administrator or the U.S. Coast Guard for specific requirements. Modern life jackets benefit from features like contoured plastic foam panels for greater comfort and fit.

All passengers also should wear plastic water shoes or boat shoes with skid-resistant soles to prevent slipping on slick decks. It's also a great idea to have a cellphone handy in case of an emergency - keep it in a sealable plastic bag to help protect it from water. And don't forget the importance of staying hydrated while out on the water: shatter-resistant plastic water bottles and cups are a great option for boating.

Swimming and boating can be great summer fun. Putting appropriate thought into preventing water accidents - and how to respond if an accident occurs - is the best way to make sure your family's summer fun stays fun.



## Griffin Free Public Library






# The Auburn Village School Garden

## Earth Day Celebration

We are pleased to announce that plans are underway for another growing season in Auburn Village School's Learning Garden! This collaborative effort sprouted from parents in the PTA and AVS Wellness Committee. Teachers and students in grades K-8 are looking forward to the 5<sup>th</sup> consecutive year of planting and harvesting various vegetables. On Earth Day, Wednesday, April 22nd students will celebrate between 9:00AM-3:00PM to launch the season with all the elementary students. Middle school students are assisting in planning and mentoring with support of parent volunteers. Plans to celebrate include: a healthy smoothie station, a baby chick petting station, worm races on a track designed by 7<sup>th</sup> graders, birch wood medallion necklaces, seeds planted in a recycled milk carton for the students to take home, a Yoga stretch station, face painting and recycling games.

Students in each grade own their raised garden beds and volunteers in the community help keep it going over the summer so that a bountiful harvest can be enjoyed when school resumes in September. Some early spring crop is enjoyed before school lets out in June. The garden is organic and lunch room generated compost is used to supplement the soil as well as vermiculture (worm) composters inside two of the classrooms where students dispose of snack scraps and learn about basic composting.

Teachers and students will once again be able to use the garden to enhance their subjects and offer a hands-on applied learning experience in the great outdoors. The garden has truly flourished over the past five years and is embraced by the Wellness Committee led by school nurse, Ellen Warecki, coordinated by Science Teacher, Wendy Smith and her middle school Garden Club. It brings everyone together outdoors and is a wonderful platform to educate on healthy choices and promote appreciation for a healthy diet and lifestyle. "I am always amazed to see how even a young student who struggles to eat their veggies will try anything they grew in the AVS garden and usually enjoy it!" Rachel Dowd, parent.
