

News from the Auburn Town Hall

Town and School District to Look At Building Maintenance

The Board of Selectmen and the Auburn School Board have agreed to take a look at what advantages there may be to potentially partnering together in the area of building maintenance efforts.

Both Boards have designated individuals to meet as a study committee to look at the potential of working together. This could range from determining if there could be benefits to simply bidding together for various services all the way through to potentially fully integrating all school and town building maintenance efforts.

Several years ago the School Board had initially inquired about this idea, but the overall timing was not good for either side at that time. Since then, the Auburn School District has ceased contracting services in this area with the Candia School District and has the Director of Maintenance and staff focused on Auburn only.

A recent operational review and risk analysis of the Police Department has suggested the Town consider aggregating some of the expenses of public facilities into a central account under a central responsibility on the Town side. In addition, town officials acknowledge they are historically more reactive to building issues than proactive, and could use more focus in this area.

Both Boards have agreed to look at this with an eye to ensuring quality service is maintained for all facilities, while potentially being able to improve results and/or save money by joining efforts.

The School Board designated School Board member Mark Comeau, Business Administrator Karen Lessard and Director of Maintenance Scott Dube to work on this topic, while the Selectmen have tagged Selectman Dale Phillips, Finance Director Adele Frisella and Town Administrator Bill Herman.

Whatever recommendations the study committee may develop will be presented to both the Board of Selectmen and the School Board to determine whether they should be implemented.

Board of Selectmen to Establish Goals for 2017

Henry Ford said: *"Working together is success."*

Aiming to develop further focus for town operations, the Board of Selectmen will be undertaking a formal goal setting process in the months ahead intended to establish goals and strategies that will help guide the Town in 2017.

The Board will be following the lead set by other communities in recent years by working with the Center for Public Sector Advancement that is within the Town's risk management pool organization, Primex.

The Center will be facilitating a workshop process for the Board of Selectmen and Town Administrator to identify what they believe the top goals for the Town of Auburn are, and to develop a work plan with measurable milestones to accomplish those goals.

An end result of the goal setting process will be a simple, but formal report that will be shared with all Town departments and the public to fully communicate the goals the Board of Selectmen establishes for 2017.

This goal setting process may become an annual activity for the Board which, moving forward, would allow it to review goals and results from the prior year before establishing goals for the next year.

Don't Forget to Vote – November 8th

The final election of a busy year will be held next month on Tuesday, November 8th.

Votes will be cast for the next President of the United States, as well as Governor, U.S. Senator, U.S. Congress, State Senators and Representatives and a number of county offices.

Make your voice and vote count. Cast your ballots on November 8th. The polls will be open from 7 AM to 7 PM at the Auburn Village School.







Information From The Building Official /Code Enforcement Officer

After much anticipation the Town of Auburn has activated the On Line Permitting Icon on the Town Website

Residents and Contractors can apply for permits from the convenience of their home or office for projects such as minor additions and renovations, shed, decks, swimming pools, new and upgrades to electrical, plumbing and mechanical systems. Payment is made with credit card during the on line process, or if you prefer, an invoice can be printed and payment made in person at Town Hall with check or cash.

It is our intention for this on line option to be a benefit to residents and make the process of securing a building permit a bit easier to fit into busy schedules. During this initial "launch" period we welcome your comments and suggestions to make any necessary adjustments and improvements to the program.

For those wishing to secure permits in the "traditional" fashion, applications and issuance of permits at Town Hall will remain the same. As always, residents and contractors are encouraged to contact the Building Department if they have any questions about permitting requirements.

Auburn EMS **911 Fire**

It's not all Lights and Sirens

In New Hampshire when someone dials 911 the call is picked up at a public safety answering point or (PSAP). The phone operator there makes decisions about how quickly your call goes to the local emergency dispatcher. Some calls are passed off rather quickly such as reported building fires. While other's medical emergencies have at least seven questions asked than the call is graded for severity and a response level is given before it is turned over to the local dispatch center. Calls are graded as Alpha through Echo. Here in Auburn Alpha level calls are no lights or sirens everyone moves with the speed of traffic. Bravo calls the first piece of emergency equipment uses lights and sirens the rest are no lights or sirens. Charlie, Delta and Echo calls all Emergency responders use lights and if needed sirens.

Once on scene your Emergency Medical Responders can upgrade or downgrade the status of a call as needed. For example last weekend we had a very brave little patient that fractured their arm while outside playing. The call came from the PSAP as an Alpha level calls. Once we arrived on scene and saw the very obvious gross deformity of the forearm the responding ambulance was upgraded to Charlie level as there was no doubt the little one was going to need surgery sooner rather than later.

We are often asked "what's the worst part of your job" the answer always the same driving to the emergency. As many people go through their busy day the number of distraction grows as the day wears on. Folks driving in their vehicles often try to get ahead of us because they don't want to get stuck behind us if we are responding to an accident. May times emergency vehicles are cutoff or force to take some other type of evasive action due to a distracted driver. For us we treat every emergency like it's our own. Our grandmother with chest pain, our little brother who took a nasty spill off his bike, our sister with a belly ache.

All we ask is when you see us coming with the light and sirens on please find a safe spot pull to the right and Stop. Many times people pull over but keep moving. This makes it difficult as we approach intersections or the driveway we need to turn into. If you're searching for that safe spot please turn on your blinker so we know your looking and you realize emergency apparatus is behind you.



Longmeadow Serves!


