

As we write this right after the March 8th Town and School District election, we want to congratulate and thank all the Auburn residents who volunteered to run for office to help make our community a better place.

We look forward to working with all Town boards, commissions, and residents in the year ahead for the betterment of Auburn.

Selectmen Organizational Meeting

The first Selectmen's meeting following the election was the Board's organizational meeting. Keith Leclair was re-elected as the Chair for the Board and Michael Rolfe was elected as the Vice Chair.

Each Selectmen also is assigned to at least one other Town Board as a Selectmen's Representative.

Keith Leclair will continue as the Selectmen's Representative to the Budget Committee, while Michael Rolfe will be the Selectman member of the Planning Board.

Tom Carroll will be serving as the Selectmen's Representative to both the Highway Safety Committee and the Parks and Recreation Commission.

Appointments to Various Town Boards Confirmed

The Selectmen have also made a number of appoints to multiple Town boards and commissions including reappointing Margret P. Donovan and Richard Burnham to new three-year terms on the Conservation Commission.

The Board also reappointed Daniel Carpenter, Michael DiPietro and Dennis Vieira to new oneyear terms on the Highway Safety Committee.

David Oliveria and Patrick Kelly were reappointed to new three years terms on the Parks & Recreation Commission, while Patrick Bergeron and Jill Dross were re-appointed to new three year terms on the Zoning Board of Adjustment. Nick Pappas was also re-appointed to a new three year term as an alternate member of the Zoning Board of Adjustment.


APRIL IS NATIONAL DISTRACTED DRIVER AWARENESS MONTH

AUBURN FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

FIRE PERMITS REQUIRED BY LAW

In New Hampshire RSA 227-L:17 requires that a fire permit be obtained by the person conducting and responsible for the open burning whenever the ground is not covered with snow within a 100 foot radius of the burn site. For additional information on open burning laws and applicable administrative rules please visit http://www.nh.gov/nhdfl/
or contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department.

Please be advised that some communities may also have additional restrictions regarding open burning and specific local permitting requirements.

Options for Obtaining a Required State of NH Fire Permit

- Contact your local Forest Fire Warden, Deputy Warden or a fire department official to obtain a written fire permit.







A Hooksett Road Neighborhood

Fifty years ago, between 550 Hooksett Rd and Maple Farm Rd, Bucky Gingras cut hay on both sides of Hooksett Rd. The road itself was hemmed in by a straight line of white pine trees. Driving Hooksett Rd, that long straightaway between the pines felt like passing soldiers on parade. Overtime, the hay fields became housing lots and a neighborhood grew up.

Walter Desmarais was a local contractor and his wife Gwen was in real estate. They lived in the North end of Auburn and built the houses that became homes for the Hill, Hujar, Miller, McLaughlin, Nicholas and Minakin families.

Ernie and Patty Allard were early home owners and raised two daughters there. They got used to finding Gingras' whole herd of cattle in their front yard. Patty served as a Trustee of the Longmeadow Congregational Church and was an active member of the Ladies Circle. She was also a Trustee of the Trust Funds and Supervisor of the Checklist for Auburn.

Ron and Chris McLaughlin are also long time residents. Chris took care of the flower gardens at the Longmeadow Church for many years. She served on both the town Planning and Zoning Boards and can occasionally still be found attending a Selectman's Meeting. In the 1970's, Chris owned a 6 wheel dump truck and worked for Auburn Road Agent Joe Stacy. She is probably the first woman in Auburn to work 'On the Roads'.

Frank and Judy Minakin lived in this neighborhood until Frank needed more room for his equipment. They moved over to Depot Rd where Frank built a big garage and had enough room to put a sawmill in his side yard. Frank and Judy were very active with the Auburn Historical Association. They took care of the Duck Race Ducks, everything from cleaning to dumping the ducks into Griffin Brook for the big race. Frank also used his backhoe to prepare the property at 102 Hooksett Rd for a Museum. He rolled over a stone post and discovered that it really was a stone watering trough left behind by the Griffin Farm. It now serves as a flower pot for the Museum.

Phil and Vera Hujar were big supporters of the Griffin Free Library. Phil was on the Auburn Planning Board and served as a Selectman in the 1980's. Ken and Donna Robinson also lived in the neighborhood. Ken served as an Auburn Police Commissioner for many years. Anita Nicholas was a dental hygienist for Dr. Ray Bolduc and belonged to the AHA.

Dick Miller was an Auburn Town Auditor and Town Treasurer. He belonged to the Lions Club and appeared in a skit put on by the 1976 Bicentennial Committee. His wife Marion was a Trustee for the Trust Funds when every cemetery lot with perpetual care had its own savings account. Marion had a shoe box full of these \$5 accounts that had to be taken into the bank every year and a few cents of interest added to the bottom line of each one.

The pines that lined Hooksett Rd got old. Their limbs grew large and fell into the roadway endangering the electric wires and posing a threat to the driving public. Today, that twin line of pines is gone and the neighborhood that grew up along it is turning over. Let's hope that the new community is able to make as many contributions to Auburn as the old one did.
