







FY 2020 Budget Near to Completion

As we are writing this near the end of November, the Board of Selectmen is near to completing its work on the FY 2020 Town operating budget and warrant articles which should total approximately \$5.7-million. As we write this article, the Board's overall spending proposals appear to be coming in at approximately \$50,000 more than the budget and warrant articles approved by the voters in

March 2019.

But the Town will also be receiving an additional \$43,000 in Municipal Aid from the State of New Hampshire that was not available last year to offset the expense.

The Board's budget effort is only part of the Town budgeting process. The Budget Committee is also working on the Town and School budgets. The Budget Committee is on track to complete most of its work prior to the Christmas holidays, ahead of the January 16, 2020 public hearing on the budgets they will propose to the voters for their approval.

The Selectmen will be working with the Auburn Historical Association, in addition to possibly appointing a special 175th Anniversary Committee to spearhead an appropriate observance.



Interested in voting in the Presidential Primary election?

Do you need to register to vote and/or request an absentee ballot?

If you are leaving town for the winter months you may want to come into the Town Clerk's Office before you go to get registered to vote and/or request an absentee ballot.

Prospective voters will be asked to show proofs of identity, age (18 by the next election day), domicile/ residence in Auburn, and U.S. Citizenship. A driver's license and a birth certificate or passport are useful. Affidavits may be signed under oath if proofs are lacking.



News from the Auburn Historical Association <u>AHA ACQUIRES UNDERHILL TOOL COLLECTION</u>

The Auburn Historical Association is excited to announce that it recently made room at the museum for some Underhill Edge Tools, including some forged edged steel chisels and axes.

People who work with their hands, use tools to make or shape wooden creations and people who repair machinery might be interested to learn that Auburn was once home to the Underhill Edge Tool Company.

Underhill Edge Tools was a vibrant hand tool business in the 1800s and was operated by the Underhill family; the Underhill's family home, built in 1766, still stands on Chester Road.

In the 1820s, the Underhills were making edge tools at their forge on Chester Road, and in 1835, they purchased the mill site in Auburn Village. For 30 years, the Underhills, along with the help of friends and family, produced axes, chisels, adze, and other sharpened tools at the dam in the Village.

Underhill Edge Tools were sold to woodworkers all over the United States and many pieces can still be found for purchase on eBay and, more often than not, in piles in dark corners of old barns, basements or antique shops. Each tool was stamped by its maker and the earlier tools also had "Auburn NH" stamped on them.

Auburn once had a number of tool collectors, Ed Locke, Carl Mayland, as well as brothers Paul and Jim Wood. Ancestors of the Underhills still living in Auburn include: Herb Chase, Don Dollard and Nancy Allen Mayland.

Don Dollard began collecting Underhill tools over 30 years ago. He went to tool auctions, bargained with antique dealers, and talked to other collectors. Over the years, he amassed a large collection of Underhill tools and especially loved the early ones stamped "Auburn NH". Don wanted to keep the collection in Auburn, so he sold the tools at a discount to the Auburn Historical Association, who received contributions from individual members to make this possible. The AHA thanks everyone involved in making this important acquisition possible and is especially grateful to Don Dollard to helping us preserve this slice of Auburn's history.



Winter holidays are a time for families and friends to get together. But that also means a greater risk for fire. Following a few simple tips will ensure a happy and fire-safe holiday season.

🗚 HOLIDAY DECORATING

- Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.
- Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.
- Keep decorations away from windows and doors.

HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING

- Test your smoke alarms and tell guests about your home fire escape plan.
- Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop.
- Ask smokers to smoke outside. Remind smokers to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers. Wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.

AVS Renovations Update

Welcome to the holiday season and hope everyone had a nice Thanksgiving with family and friends. As we near the end of 2019, we are nearing the end of the construction and renovation project at Auburn Village School. There will likely only be a couple more updates like these as the project winds down and the last construction zones pack up. Here's where things stand:

- **Rear entrance restrooms** The restrooms next to the cafeteria and gym are complete and now include a boys restroom, girls restroom, and handicap accessible family restroom.
- **Five-classroom elementary wing** These are the classrooms to the left when you're looking at the front of the building. We're on track to open this wing at the end of the year and are working on plans to move the three third grade classrooms into the wing for the second half of the school year.
- Main entrance, front office, and nurse's office Final touches are being made on our new entrance, front office, and nurse's office. The front entrance will have additional waiting room space and has been carefully designed to accommodate the flow of students, parents, and materials that come through each day. And after many years of making do with a very tight front office area, our administrative team will have more space and better-designed space built around their job functions. As we've reported in previous updates, the nurse's office is significantly larger and has been designed to accommodate the varied needs of students ages 5 to 14. Like the elementary wing, plans are underway to move the administration and nursing teams into their new spaces for the second half of the school year.
- Athletic Fields and Grounds Many of you have likely seen a sea of green grass behind the school. It's wonderful to report that seeding, sodding, and irrigation are complete on our soccer/lacrosse and softball fields. Our spring teams will have the benefit of being the first teams to use the fields. Work has begun to clear the new baseball field which will be beyond the soccer/lacrosse field, and while the field won't be ready for spring 2020, it will certainly be so for spring 2021. Having a baseball field at Auburn Village School after 10+ years will be a nice capstone to a tremendous investment in our town's school.

As this article is written, the town Budget Committee will have a tour of the school on November 21 and we are planning for an additional tour at the Deliberative Session in February 2020. We invite as many folks in town to come out and tour the school in February and see how our facilities, together with great instruction provided by our teachers, are in place to provide a 21st century education to our young people.




