# FY 2021 Budget Work Has Begun

As we are writing this near the end of November, the Board of Selectmen is working at completing its work on the FY 2021 Town operating budget and warrant articles.

The Board's budget effort is only part of the Town budgeting process. The Budget Committee is also working on the Town and School budgets. The Budget Committee is on track

to complete most of its work prior to year end, ahead of the January 2021 public hearing on the budgets they will propose to the voters for their approval.

### General Election Went Smoothly

Much like we saw during the State Primary Election, voter turnout set records both locally and nationally. Once again, we'd like to thank and

congratulate all the election officials and volunteers for their efforts ensuring a safe and smooth election. We'd also like to thank all the voters that





# AUBURN FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS



As you deck the halls this holiday season, be fire smart. A small fire that spreads to a Christmas tree can grow large very quickly.



### **PICKING THE TREE**

• Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched.



#### PLACING THE TREE

- Before placing the tree in the stand, cut 2" from the base of the trunk.
- Make sure the tree is at least three feet away from any heat source, like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents or lights.
- Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit.
- Add water to the tree stand. Be sure to add water daily.



### LIGHTING THE TREE

- Use lights that have the label of a recognized testing laboratory. Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Never use lit candles to decorate the tree.
- Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.



# After Christmas

Get rid of the tree after Christmas or when it is dry. Dried-out trees are a fire danger and should not be left in the home or garage, or placed outside against the home.

Check with your local community to find a recycling program.

Bring outdoor electrical lights inside after the holidays to prevent hazards and make them last longer.

### **FACTS**

- More than **one of every four** home Christmas tree fires is caused by electrical problems.
- ! Although Christmas tree fires are not common, when they do occur, they are more likely to be serious.
- (!) A heat source too close to the tree causes **one in every four** of the fires.



# News from the Auburn Historical Association

## John Harko — Blue Glass Artist







In 1907, John Zacharko, his wife Anna, and toddler son, Jan left Austria and sailed to Galveston, Texas. There, the family shortened their name to Harko and their son "Jan" became John - John Harko. Within a year, the senior Harko accepted a job with the Amoskeag Mills and the family moved to Manchester, NH. There, young John Harko graduated from grammar school and went into construction. He also was a local boxer who won the New England featherweight championship twice.

After the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, 35 year old Harko joined the US Navy. He served for the duration of WWII and taught young sailors the 'sweet science' of boxing. After the war, Harko owned a tire shop and used car lot on Elm Street.

When he retired, Harko set up a glass furnace at his home on Crystal Lake. He knew that in the 1840's, a glass works in Suncook, NH, had produced blue glass from Lake Massabesic sand. The blue color comes from trace elements of cobalt in the sand. After obtaining permission from the Manchester Water Works to use Massabesic sand, Harko tested samples and found that the best sand for making glass was at Preston Beach (Manchester Rd, MWW Fire Trail 48). Heated to 2500 degrees, the sand liquifies and becomes a beautiful cobalt blue color. From aluminum molds, Harko made pitchers and containers that honored organizations like the Lions Club and Boy Scouts and historical figures like John Stark and George Washington. He also melted down green 7 Up bottles and applied the green glass to his fancier creations. The 'HARKO' signature is etched into the bottom of all pieces.

John Harko had a wide circle of friends and acquaintances in the Manchester area. He gave away all of his creations to people that he thought would enjoy them. Harko died in 1997 at the age of 91. In October of this year, a cobalt blue pitcher made from the white sand at Preston Beach was put up for auction on eBay with a starting bid of \$90.






### Massabesic Seniors


