Auburn Town Hall News

Colored Leaves and Tax Bills Mark the Fall



For municipal governments throughout New Hampshire, the fall is a busy time of year as budgeting for the next year is in full swing, while the setting of tax rates, the mailing of property tax bills and the preparation to close out financial records for the current year are also underway. And Auburn is no different.

With property tax bills in the mail by the first week of November, it may no longer be news to property owners the tax rate for 2021 was set at \$18.14 per thousand by the NH Department of Revenue Administration (NHDRA).

Auburn realized a significant increase in additional property valuation from new homes, commercial buildings and additions in 2021 which results in slightly more than \$12 million of new value being recorded. Auburn's net assessed property valuation now totals \$886,024,130.

The tax rate includes four components -- \$3.29 for the town; \$12.02 for the local education; \$1.95 for the state education, and \$0.88 for the county. For comparison purposes, the 2020 total rate of \$18.48 per thousand, was inclusive of \$3.22 for the town; \$12.44 for local education; \$1.91 for state education and \$0.91 for the county.

Various budgets and warrant articles approved by local voters last March established total appropriations of \$22,291,329 for the town and school district combined. And the Town's share of the Rockingham County budget adds another \$778,977. Of that total amount, \$16,050,599 needs to be raised by taxes, which results in the \$18.14 tax rate.

Two Final Members Named to Zoning Board of Adjustment

Since our report last month, James Carroll resigned from his position of the Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) due to plans to relocate from Auburn.

The Board has appointed Shawn Matte of Spruce Lane as a full member of the ZBA having been the senior alternate member of the board. The Board also appointed Nick Pappas of Rattlesnake Hill Road to fill an alternate member position on the board.

These appointments enable the ZBA to have a full complement of five full members and three alternate members.



FY 2022 Budget Development Nearing Completion

Work is nearly complete by the Board of Selectmen on the review and discussion of the budget requests developed by Town boards and departments for the FY 2022 Town budget.

The Selectmen initially received the total Town budget package at it's September 27th meeting, and then began meeting with the individual Town officials on October 4th. The budget that is developing will total \$6.3 million, which represents a 3.12% increase over the approved FY 2021 budget.

On October 14th, the Budget Committee also began its work on the FY 2022 budget by also receiving the total budget package for consideration before beginning individual meetings with Town boards and department heads.

Moving forward, the Board of Selectmen will wrap up its budget efforts by the end of November before considering potential warrant articles items.

The Budget Committee will be meeting into early December to manage its work on the proposed Town budget, in addition to consideration to the proposed budget for the Auburn School District.

The 2022 Deliberative Session of Town Meeting is expected to be held on Saturday, February 5th when voters will have the opportunity to initially consider budget and warrant article proposals.

NATIONAL RECOGNITION – Two Auburn residents were among 18 Americans recognized by the Carnegie Hero Fund with the Carnegie Medal as individuals who risked their lives for others. Alan R. Cote and Stephen P. Carkhuff, both of Pingree Hill Road, were recognized for helping to save the lives of Cohen Bergeron and Fallon Andrews from a late-night automobile crash outside their home. The car they were in hit a roadside tree and immediately burst into flames on October 23, 2019. Both individuals were saved from burn injuries because of the duo's efforts. Carnegie Hero Fund Commission President Eric Zahren made the presentations during a ceremony held at the Auburn Town Hall on November 4th. Auburn Police Chief Ray Pelton and Fire Chief Michael Williams were part of the presentation program.



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

Seacoast Mental Health Center, Inc. Awards 2021 Erik Cogswell Memorial Award to NH Kid Governor Charlie Olsen

PORTSMOUTH, NH - Seacoast Mental Health Center, Inc. (SMHC) was honored to award Charlie Olsen, New Hampshire's Kid Governor (NHKG) the 2021 Erik Cogswell Memorial Award.

The award is presented annually by SMHC to recognize an individual for their outstanding contributions to help improve the lives of people living with bipolar disorder and other mental illnesses. The recipient provides Hope, Education or Support for those living with mental illness, as well as those who care for them and/or contribute to the community at large in New Hampshire.

SMHC President and CEO, Jay Couture, praised Olsen for his inspiration to both his peers and adults, as well as for his impactful work throughout his tenure as NHKG.

"Charlie has embodied the meaning of the Cogswell Award. He has used his platform as NH Kid Governor to bring awareness to mental health and to work to erase the stigma often associated with mental health and its treatment" Couture shared. "By sharing his personal experience, Charlie has been able to bring awareness about the struggle many face who are diagnosed with a mental illness. His message of not being alone and to not be afraid to seek care when it is needed, is one that many youth need to hear during a very challenging time as they navigate the pandemic and social isolation. There is not a more deserving individual of the 2021 Erik Cogswell Memorial Award. We are honored to offer him this recognition."

"I am so honored to be receiving this award. It is humbling to be included with the amazing people that have been chosen to receive this award. Thank you to the Seacoast Mental Health Center and the Cogswell family for considering me," expressed Olsen. Throughout his speech, Olsen illustrated why SMHC chose him as the clear winner for 2021. "I have been fortunate to work with so many amazing people over the past year...I never thought that I'd be able to be involved with so many amazing groups of mental health advocates and be able to reach so many kids around the state....My main goal is to eliminate the stigma around mental health issues and get kids talking....You don't have to be afraid to talk about it....You don't have to do this alone...You are not alone."

George Bartholomew as Santa in 1972

For a generation of Auburn Village children, George Bartholomew was Santa Claus. For George, it started as a family event. Santa appeared for Marcia Trombly and Norm Bouley and as time went on, other kids in the Village were included. Santa arranged for a present to be left outside. He had a driver. Santa arrived at the house, checked his costume, gathered up the presents, and entered the house with a cheery "HO HO HO". Pandemonium ensued!

Five year olds can be a tough sell. Kit Harris sat on Santa's lap and peaked behind that fake beard. It sure looked like Bucky Bart (George's nickname). Another year, Kit saw his Father (Bob Harris) pulling into the yard. Santa was seated in the back of the pickup. What kind of a Santa travels in the back of a truck? Five year old Norm Bouley put out carrots for Santa's reindeer. He was really not that interested in Santa or his present. He wanted to see the reindeer. Norm looked outside and saw Santa's driver, Don Dollard. Realizing his credibility was on the line, Santa ran out of the house and right by his driver yelling, "My reindeer ran off." And then there were the kids who knew Santa too well. A young Jon Dollard asked his Mother : "Why is Santa wearing Grampa's shoes?".

Brad Sargent lived through all three phases of the Auburn Santa. As a child, he was visited by Santa George. Later, he drove Santa on his rounds around the Village. From 1970-2001, Brad was Santa. The McGraph family lived in the old Pine Bluff Inn on Bunker Hill Road. Even with a one present per child rule, the gift bag is large when a dozen children are involved. Brad was pulling out presents when a live lobster latched onto his glove. Some present, Patty McGraph Stanton! The older kids thought it was hilarious- Santa didn't know what was in his own bag of presents. That same day, Patty was going up Roy Davis Hill on Chester Road when she passed Santa. He had slid off into the ditch. That can be a nasty hill on a snowy day but Santa in the ditch? Hard to believe!

These Christmas' weren't that long ago but it feels like another era.
