#### **Tax Rate Set**

The NH Department of Revenue Administration has finalized the Town's 2022 tax rate at \$17.85 per thousand dollars of assessed value. That is a decrease of \$0.29, or 1.6%, compared to 2021.

A few factors go into determining the tax rate:

- The amount needed to cover budget appropriations, as approved by voters at Town and School District Meetings. These are offset by revenues.
- The amount needed to cover State School Tax and County Tax obligations. These are set by the state and county, not locally;
- The total value of property in Town, which increased last year by \$8.1Million (0.9%). The largest factors in the decrease from last year were an increase in school district revenue and a decrease in the required State Education Tax.

Two tax bills are issued each year. The June bill is generally equal to one half of last year's full year bill. The December bill calculates the full year at the new tax rate. Therefore, this year the second bill will be smaller for most properties.

The tax bills will arrive around November 18th and are due December 19th.

Following is a breakdown of the components of the tax rate:

#### **2023 Budget Process**

Town department heads are working with the Budget Committee and Board of Selectmen to finalize the 2023 budget proposal for Town Meeting. Inflation is going to be the biggest challenge for the year, with fuel, energy, supplies, wages, and benefits all affected. Other considerations include new firefighter positions and small improvements to town facilities.


#### **2022 General Election**

Many thanks are due to our election officials and volunteers for a safe, smooth election day on November 8th. A large turnout of 3,175 voters, including 163 new registrants, turned out that day. 2023 Town Elections - The filing period for elected town offices will be Jan. 25 – Feb. 3.



#### **Jumping Beans**

Jumping Beans is a fun class for children ages 2-4 to get out and get moving with Miss Joelle. This parent/child class kids gives kids an opportunity to make new friends and dance to some of their favorite songs. With simple dance moves and sing-along songs, our little beans will definitely be jumping!

Classes will be held on Wednesdays from 9:45 am until 10:45 am. The fee for the 6-week program is \$42. The session starts January 11 through February 15.

#### Strength Training for Active Seniors

This Strength Training class for active seniors will be a mixture of light weights and your own body weight. This class will be a combination of Pilates, yoga and weight training. With Joelle Ray as your trainer, you are sure to be challenged but yet encouraged to try your best and most importantly to have fun! Our goal in this class is to build muscle and increase flexibility to create a healthy body and mind. There will be fun music to help motivate our iron pumping!

Joelle Ray has been a fitness instructor since 1999, starting off her fitness career with teaching kickboxing and strength training. Her career continued as she became a Jazzercise instructor, a runner, an instructor of little kids dance and mentor to many of her students. She thrives off seeing her students flourish and gain confidence not only with their fitness levels but in their personal lives.

This 45-minute class will be held on Wednesdays from 8:45 am until 9:30 am. The fee for the 6-week program, January 11 through February 15, is \$62 for Auburn residents.

## **Parents' Night Out**

Need an evening out *without* the kids? Sign them up for the first ever Parents' Night Out. Kids will enjoy an evening of fun games, arts & crafts and a pizza dinner in a safe, supervised environment while parents get a well-deserved break. Parents' Night Out is open to kids in grades K-4 and will be held at the new Severance School Community Center on Friday, January 20<sup>th</sup>. Drop off is at 6:00 pm and pick up is 9:00 pm. The fee for the night, including crafts, games, pizza and drinks is \$39 per person. Advanced registration is required, and spaces are limited.

### **Crafty Kids**

Crafty Kids with Kristy is a new class for kids in grades 1-4 that combines great stories and fun crafts. Each week, Kristy will read a story to the group and then create a craft based on that book. Crafty Kids will meet on Tuesdays, January 17 through February 14, at 4:00-5:00 pm at the Severance School Community Center (515 Manchester Road). The 5-week session will cost \$65 per child which includes all supplies. Preregistration is required and space is limited.

#### Tai Chi

Tai Chi is a mind-body exercise from China. It has its roots in martial arts, philosophy, and Traditional Chinese Medicine. The Tai Chi forms are slow, gentle choreographed movements that gracefully flow from one to the next like a dance. More and more seniors are doing Tai Chi to improve their health and reduce their risk of falling. Classes are held on Thursdays, from 11:00 am until noon. The 8-week winter session runs from January 5 through February 23 with a cost of \$58.

#### **Cookie Decorating**

Why should kids have all the fun? This cookie decorating class is for adults. In this class, each participant will learn the basics of royal icing including how to handle a piping bag, pressure, and piping techniques. Using these skills, participants will then decorate 6 winter themed cookies with demonstrations throughout and get to take home their delicious masterpieces!

Local Aubum resident Allison Hopkins teaches this cookie class with 10+ years of baking experience in the industry and opening her small cookie business during 2020. She is looking forward to teaching others her passion of cookie decorating! This class will be held on Wednesday, January 25 from 6:00-8:00 pm at the Severance School Community Center. The fee is \$52 which includes all the supplies needed including 6 prebaked cookies.

Instructions for the app are in the attached photo. The code to track Santa will be announced the day before the parade. We cannot promise this will work, but we will do our best. Please listen for the sirens coming closer to your area, if your road is not one Santa will be going down, you are welcome to come to the station or the closest intersection. We will try to update as we go what area of town we are in.

We will once again be using the real time tracking app Life360 to better show where Santa is on his route



The day before the parade we will share the code to join the Santa Parade Circle in the Life360 app.

#### How to sign up for the Santa Parade life360 Circle

Once downloaded and an account has been created from the main screen

Tap the dropdown menu in the top middle of the screen

Tap join a circle

#### AGAIN, WE WILL SHARE THE JOIN CODE THE DAY BEFORE THE PARADE.








Once you have been added to the circle. You should see Santa's location.




Her outstanding commitment to not just the school but the community is second to none. Even though she is no longer the President of the PTA, she continues to be an active member

and committee leader. She is truly our definition of "Member of the Year."



On a recent Sunday afternoon, my husband and I decided to visit the Aviation Museum of New Hampshire. The relatively small museum is just packed with all kinds of information. Our very knowledgeable volunteer guide, Tom, told us the background story of how a young Alan Shepard worked at the airbase in exchange for flying lessons. I learned that Bernice Blake Perry from Milford was the first woman from NH to pass the test for a pilot's license in 1929. There are plenty of exhibits from wings to wheels, that tell the story of early local aviation personalities coupled with photos, artifacts and museum programs. We happened to be there to see an amazing exhibit of card stock aircraft models created by 92 yr old Dick Zoerb of Nashua.

Our guide told us about another hands on experience for students. After 3 years and a pandemic, the first student-built RV-12iS was airborne on August 13, 2022. Work has already begun for the 2nd student-built RV-12iS at Manchester School of Technology (MST). Students along with qualified instructors will have the opportunity to learn about aviation by being involved with the build, and the opportunity to fly in it after!

The Aviation Museum has exciting family events and programs all year round. Exhibits change throughout the year. A hands on museum, welcoming to families, children, and adults. It's a little known gem that is worth visiting, and to connect all of us to aviation. We enjoyed our first visit and plan on returning to visit their library sometime soon. And one more bonus. If you plan it right you can watch planes land and take off. The kid in all of us just love it!! Please check their website for days and hours of operation.

The Friends of the Library have purchased 15 discount passes and this museum is one of them.
Although The Friends will not be hosting Breakfast With Santa on December 10th, please support the PTA by attending and enjoying the breakfast.







# <u>Auburn Village School Soccer Teams are 2022 Tri-County League Champions</u> <u>Girls Cross Country Team also Takes Championship</u>

Both the Auburn Village School (AVS) Division 4 Boys and Girls soccer teams are 2022 Tri-County League Champions. This is the very first division win for the Girls team and the first for the Boys team since 2005. In addition, the AVS Girls Cross Country team won the Division III New Hampshire Middle School State Cross Country Championships, with eighth grader Sookie Folsom coming in first place. She was also named female HOKA athlete of the week.

The AVS soccer teams represent middle school students in grades 5 through 8. The Boys team consists of 23 players, with 10 eighth graders. Led by Head Coach Kevin Huston and Assistant Coach Brian D'Amelio, the team was in second place entering the playoffs against Nashua's World Academy. The Tri-County League Division 4 Girls teams are: AVS, Chester Middle School, Concord Christian Academy, the Derryfield School, Epping Middle School, St. Christopher Academy, Presentation of Mary Academy, and World Academy.

### Downtown Heroes— The Newcomb Family

Ida Preston Newcomb (1902-1983) and Clarence L Newcomb (1900-1983) were born and raised in Auburn Village. Ida 's father was Albert Preston, the village blacksmith whose shop was on Raymond Rd across from the old Auburn Fire House. Ida, one of 13 siblings, had 3 brothers, John, Harry, and Richard, and 2 sisters, Ola and Dora Mae, who would end up living their lives in Auburn Village.

Clarence Newcomb's father was the Station Master at the B&M's Auburn Depot. The family lived on the second floor above the Depot. Clarence and Ida married and purchased a home at 28 Manchester Rd where they had one child, Clarence Jr. (1921-1943). As an only child, Junior grew up smart and confident with an inclusive friendly-type personality. He loved kids and enjoyed entertaining them. Ida's older sister, Ola (1897-1972), also lived with the family. Ola had some issues and perhaps Junior's contact with her helped him learn how to listen to others and help them better themselves.

Junior graduated from Manchester Central High School in 1939. He found employment at an aviation plant in Springfield, Mass. While in Springfield he meet Josephine Urbini who became his bride in March of 1943. A week after the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor, 12/7/1941, Junior enlisted in the United States Army. Six months later, he was a certified pilot and after additional training, assigned to teach new pilots aerial gunnery. On 8/5/43, Junior was killed instantly when his plane crashed into the desert near Las Vegas, Nevada. Josephine sent his parents a telegram explaining the situation and that she was bringing him home with a military escort. An hour later, the Newcombs received official notification of his death from the Department of Defense.

Wartime funeral services for small town heroes can be huge spectaculars. The Longmeadow Church was packed for Lieutenant Newcomb's funeral. Townspeople who came to mourn the loss of a son of a respected long time family stood shoulder to shoulder. Ten year old Cedric Preston was devastated by the loss of his friend and neighbor. Perhaps the only child in the Longmeadow that day, Cedric received permission to attend the service. The townspeople did their best to show love and respect but at the end of the day, Clarence and Ida left their only child under a mound of flowers.

The Newcomb's enjoyed ice skating right into old age. Their house on Manchester Rd stood across from the town's ice skating rink. Their love of skating and their rapport with kids, made the Newcombs the unofficial chaperones of the rink. Neighborhood kids would skate after supper until Ida turned on her porch light. All the kids knew that signal meant time to "go home".

When the US Government began upgrading Grenier Field in Manchester, Clarence along with other Auburnites, got a job with the airport fire department. In retirement, he drove a school bus for Auburn. When he took the bus into Manchester for fueling, he often picked up pre-schooler Jimmy Trombly for the ride.

Clarence was a whistler. Good enough, said Don Sowa, that the kids would sit quietly and listen to the whistle concert. In the summer, Clarence manned the fire tower above Devil's Den for the Manchester Water Works. Neighborhood kids and out of town visitors would climb the tower to see the view and say hello to Clarence. While there, they might get a math lesson in determining the location of a fire.

Ida provided a taxi service between the Auburn Depot and the various guest houses (hotels) around town. She started out with a horse and buggy and eventually got an auto. Ida also had the Post Office contract for the daily mail train. She would drop off outgoing mail and bring incoming mail back to the Auburn Post Office.

Although they faced personal tragedy, the Newcombs maintained a positive attitude, knew everyone in the Village, and were always ready to make Auburn better.

On September 24th, The Friends of Auburn and The Auburn Historical Association participated in a historic bus tour of Auburn's summer resorts. Thank you to Alan Villeneuve and Dan Carpenter for making it such an enjoyable and interesting tour!
