Town and School District Deliberative Sessions on February 1st

For the second year, the annual Deliberative Sessions of the Town Meeting and School District Meeting will be held on the same day. The School District Meeting will be held on Saturday, February 1st at 9 AM at the Auburn Village School, and the Deliberative Session of the Auburn Town Meeting will immediately follow the School District Meeting.

For those who may not have had an opportunity to tour the new addition and renovations to the Auburn Village School, the School Board is planning to offer tours of the school to interested residents immediately following the two deliberative sessions.

Should weather force a delay, the two meetings will be held on Monday, February 3rd beginning at 6:30 PM.

A copy of the Town Meeting Warrant and Town budget has been sent to all residents separate from this edition of the Auburn Village Crier.

FY 2020 Budget Near to Completion

The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee have completed their work on the FY 2020 Town operating budget and warrant articles which totals nearly \$5,717,000. The overall spending proposals are coming in slightly under the total budget and warrant articles approved by the and an increase in the Town's net voters in March 2019.

While the general spending amounts are about level, we are anticipating a reduction in the Town portion of the tax rate of a minimum of 12-cents.

The anticipated tax rate reduction is the result of approximately \$43,000 in additional Municipal Aid funds from the State of New Hampshire, using nearly \$150,000 from the Town's undesignated fund balance to cover some one-time expenses, assessed valuation due to the continued residential and commercial building in the community.

The work of the Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee was presented during a public hearing on the Town and School District budgets held on January 16th.

The budgets and warrant articles acted upon during the deliberative sessions will be presented to the voters for their final action at the Town and School District ballot voting on Tuesday, March 10th at the Auburn Village School from 7:00 AM to 7:00 PM.

Walter Milne Named Deputy Tax Collector

Tax Collector Susan Jenkins and the Board of Selectmen have jointly selected Walter Milne of Auburn to fill sign from that position in order to the vacant Deputy Tax Collector's position effective February 1st. Mr.

Milne has served as Town Treasurer for the past three years, and will reaccept the Deputy Tax Collector's position.

It is anticipated over the next three years or so Mr. Milne and Mrs. Jenkins will likely reverse roles as Mrs. Jenkins looks at cutting back in her work efforts in the future.



NHDES Renews Auburn's Groundwater Management Permit

Since closing the Town's landfill and To maintain this effort, the Town is incinerator facility back in 1996, the Town has had to maintain and monitor the closed landfill property. Part of that effort consists of the installation of groundwater monitoring wells and annual groundwater testing to ensure there is no unacceptable pollutants coming from the former landfill.

issued a Groundwater Management Permit from the NH Department of Environmental Services (NHDES), which is reviewed every five years. The NHDES just renewed Auburn's permit for another five years but, in doing so, has required the installation of two additional monitoring wells with a focus on additional

testing for PFAs. The Town has not had issues to date in this area, and already tests for these items in the existing monitoring wells. The additional two wells will provide additional information in a different area of the closed landfill.

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

The "Little Red House"



Above: Summer 1959. Dearborn Road is still a dirt road and the grass is growing on Chester Turnpike. Dutch elm disease kills all the elms. The barn was destroyed by arson in 1969.



2019 - How the old Cooper's shop looks today. The entire house was refurbished in 2000. Out with the indoor outhouse— in with the plumbing. A new roof line and round window in the loft were added.

The "Little Red House, situated on the five corners (intersections of Dearborn, Coleman, and the Chester Turnpike), was originally built as a cooper's shop, making barrels. It catered to the farmers who took their produce to markets in Haverhill, Methuen and Boston. Two hundred years ago, barrels were as essential to commerce as the cardboard box is today.

In 1852, William A. Pingrey and Hannah (Colman) Pingrey purchased the property. They made several additions to the house and built the barn. Their only daughter, Rosa, married Frank Forsaith who moved in with them. Two boys and 12 years later, the Forsaith's purchased the old Clay's Tavern and moved across Dearborn Road.

After William Pingrey died in 1909, the "Little Red House" sat empty until his grandson Carl and his wife Grace Forsaith retired. They turned it into a summer guest house and moved into the old tavern. Stephen Lafay and Debbie Asquith now live in the tavern.

Thank you from the Friends



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Auburn Police News



January has been pretty good to us with weather, but we wanted to remind everyone about parking during Snow Storms as we head into February.

Parking During Snow Storms

- A. From November 2nd to April 1st each year no person shall park any motor vehicle on any public way between the hours of 11PM and 8AM or at any time in such manner as to impede snow removal operations.
- B. Any vehicle parking in violation of this may be towed by the road agent, the Chief of Police or their agents or by independent contractors engaged by the road agent or Chief of Police; any vehicles so towed shall be stored and released to the owner only upon payment of the cost of towing and storage by the owner.
- C. Any person violating Section A hereof shall be subject to a penalty not to exceed twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars for each offense.

Auburn Fire Department News



Winter storms can happen almost anywhere. They can cause us problems. Know what to do before, during and after a storm. This will help keep you and your family safe from a winter fire.

- Test all smoke alarms. Do this at least once a month.
 This way you will know they are working. Install carbon monoxide alarms in your home. Test the alarms.
- Plan two ways out of the home in case of an emergency.
 Clear driveway and front walk of ice and snow. This will provide easy access to your home.
- Make sure your house number can be seen from the street. If you need help, firefighters will be able to find you.
- Be ready in case the power goes out. Have flashlights on hand. Also have battery-powered lighting and fresh batteries. Never use candles.
- Stay aware of winter weather. Listen to the television or radio for updates. Watch for bulletins online.
- Check on neighbors. Check on others who may need help.
- Generators should be used outdoors. Keep them away from windows and doors. Do not run a generator inside your garage, even if the door is open.
- Stay away from downed wires. Report any downed wires to authorities.
- Be ready if the heat stops working. Use extra layers of clothes and blankets to stay warm. If you use an emergency heat source, keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away.
- Turn portable heaters off when you leave the room.
 Turn them off when you go to bed.

School Construction News 🕻



Well, after almost two years, ~45 classroom and office moves, more concrete, bricks, flooring and windows than we can count, and enough grit, perseverance and patience to fill a school, the Auburn Village School construction project is coming to a close. Everyone who learns or works in the building is now in their true classroom or office space, and our traditional front entrance is open again. With everyone 'home', this will be the last update for the Crier and while there are details to share as to what work will continue (and there will be some), we need to take a moment and look back at what we set out to achieve.

In 2014, the Auburn School Board identified four goals for the school:

- Remove portable & modular structures and have all kids in the same brick and mortar building Remember the portable and modular classrooms? They served their purpose, but we were happy to see them go. After 24 years of using these temporary classrooms, all students and teachers are in the same building. And while we didn't think of it at the time, removing them gave us a beautiful recreational space in the rear of the building.
- Comply with safety & security findings from the Department of Homeland Security survey, including improving access to the building and traffic flow While it's not always visible and we purposefully don't provide a lot of details on this topic, the school has received a host of safety & security updates. Among the improvements is a new fire alarm system, addressable fire alarms, more secure front entrance, new phone and communication system, and the ability to monitor our doors and mechanical systems remotely. It's reassuring to our professionals who work in and protect the building to know they have upgraded and integrated systems behind the scenes.
- Address space shortages and add space for additional classroom, special education, nursing, teacher and cafeteria space In 2018, we were 22% over capacity and our space utilization rate was 125%, much higher than the NH Department of Education's recommended rate of 90%. Our new classroom wing brought new, larger classrooms to replace those in the portables and modulars, as well as much needed storage space for equipment for the town, school, and community organizations. We also expanded our cafeteria which has brought more kids eating closer to the noon hour and given them a longer time to eat.
- Allow room for student enrollment growth and changing educational needs over time Like anything else, education changes with time. How we reach, teach and engage kids with different capabilities and needs evolves and we learn new methods of instruction. And in many cases, those methods require different types of learning spaces. With this in mind, our building has flexible, multi-use space to accommodate activities like small team discovery and projects and will accommodate full-day kindergarten at some point. Through our project, AVS has the facility to accommodate the demands of a 21st century education.


With these achievements behind us, our construction company is crossing things off their punch lists and putting the final touches on the building. Site work will continue on the baseball field as the ground allows to position us for spring 2021 opening day, and additional fire and safety improvements will be made over the summer months.

As noted in prior posts, the construction and renovation project was possible because of the many people involved in it, starting with the great residents of Auburn who approved the funding for the much-needed upgrade. Beyond Auburn residents, a hearty thanks goes out to the School Improvement Committee, Auburn Fire Department, Auburn Building Inspector, State Fire Marshall's Office, The Turner Group, Bonnette Page and Stone, Jobin Construction Consultants, and the many companies and trades, many of which are Auburn companies, who did their part. A big thank you also goes out to our Superintendent, SAU Business Manager, AVS's school principal, facility director, and technology director who spent many hours every week above and beyond their day jobs to make decisions and weigh in as issues arose. Finally, a nod to our students, teachers, and others who work and learn in the building every day. You weathered the moves and changes like champions. We hope you love your new space and we look forward to hearing how it's supporting our collective goal of educating Auburn's young minds.
