

Ice Skating Rinks

STATE REP ROLES IN NEW SESSION

With the election of Representative Sherman Packard (R-Londonderry) as Speaker of the NH House on January 6, 2021, House leadership and committee assignments have been finalized. The 2020 elections resulted in the advancement into leadership positions for Sandown, Chester, and Auburn's State Representatives as well as key committee assignments.

Representative Jason Osborne (R-Auburn) has become the House Majority Leader. In that capacity, Jason will be challenged with the goal of prioritizing bills and keeping a relatively small majority of Republicans united. Jason will also serve on the Commerce & Consumer Affairs, Legislative Administration, and Rules Committees.

Rep Chris True (R-Sandown) enters his fourth term and will serve as the Assistant Majority Whip. Additionally, Rep True will hold a seat on the Criminal Justice and Public Service Committee after three terms on the Transportation Committee.

Rep Jess Edwards (R-Auburn) has been named as the Chairman of Division III Finance. Division III is one of three component committees of the House Finance Committee and directs the resourcing for the Department of Health and Humans Services as well as the NH Veterans Home, approximately 46% of the state budget. Jess will also serve on the Health and Human Services Oversight Committee and as an alternate on the Joint Legislative Fiscal Committee.

Rep Tony Piemonte (R-Sandown) will serve as the Vice Chairman of the Municipal and County Government Committee. The Committee considers all matters pertaining to town, city and county officers; changes in municipal and county government; local revenue, including fees, property taxes and exemptions; and such other matters as may be referred.

Newly elected Rep Oliver Ford (R-Chester) will take his decades of experience leading colleges and universities to the Education Committee. The Committee considers the regulation of school districts and schools; the postsecondary college system; the University System of New Hampshire; and other matters concerning education. The Education Committee will be responsible for key legislation as part of the Majority's policy agenda.



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AUBURN POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS

Hello Auburn Residents,

January has been pretty good to us with weather, but we wanted to remind everyone about parking during Snowstorms as we head into February.

Parking During Snowstorms

- A. From November 2nd to April 1st each year no person shall park any motor vehicle on any public way between the hours of 11PM and 8AM or at any time in such manner as to impede snow removal operations.
- B. Any vehicle parking in violation of this may be towed by the road agent, the Chief of Police or their agents or by independent contractors engaged by the road agent or Chief of Police; any vehicles so towed shall be stored and released to the owner only upon payment of the cost of towing and storage by the owner.
- C. Any person violating Section A hereof shall be subject to a penalty not to exceed twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars for each offense.

The police department closed out the year with 11,183 calls for service in 2020. This included:



5,301 business and property checks 228 directed patrols 2,468 motor vehicle stops 370 suspicious activity checks 327 offense reports And 86 arrests



While we do have officers on duty 24-hours a day, 7 days a week we would like to take the time to thank the Auburn Community for continuing to be safe and reporting suspicious activity to our officers. It is with your help that the crime in Auburn continues to be very low.

For those residents who may be new to town, we have a very active <u>Neighborhood Watch Program</u>. In January the leaders began updating members who may not know about Auburn Neighborhood Watch, or those who are already members, but information has changed.

If you have been a member of the neighborhood watch group in the past, or are new to the program, we urge everyone to send you current information. 

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News from the Auburn Historical Association




Over the past 50 years, wildlife in New Hampshire has rebounded. Back then, there were very few beaver in southern NH. Today, nature's engineers are the bane of Road Agents and despised by municipal water supply people. There were no turkeys in the state until 1977 when 48 birds were relocated from New York State. Today, NH holds a turkey hunting season in both Spring and Fall. Fifty years ago, no one would believe it possible to photograph the majestic Bald Eagle in the town of Auburn. Up until 1955, the State Of NH paid a bounty for every black bear killed and there were very few bears in Southern NH.

Today, the black bear is once again in Auburn at a time when more people live here then ever before. The bears are coming for backyard chickens and bird feeders. The black bear will walk in a straight line from one bird feeder to the next. (More efficient than using the driveway.). If you want to know what happens in your yard after dark, set up a game camera with a flash attachment. (These pictures were taken in a Pingree Hill neighborhood.)

When I used to talk to a lot of Auburnites, it was possible to track bear movement in town. The big males came down from Bear Brook State Park into the Tower Hill area. Hopefully, they use the underpass to cross Rt 101 and go around Clark Pond, the Little Massabesic Pond and on to Spruce Swamp. From there, they cross Rt 121 and enter the Cohas Brook watershed which covers the Pingree Hill area and departs Auburn at the intersection of 28 By-Pass and Wilson's Crossing Rd. From reported sightings, it appears most bears reverse their direction and head back North basically the way they came.

In the 1970's, Dottie Carpenter had a 120 pound dog named 'Ms.'. The husky/shepherd/wolf mix dog was extremely intelligent and loved to take walks. Starting from the 5 Corners, a favorite walk was down the Chester Turnpike, up the garden path to the field, across the field and back through the woods to the house. One year, we had a mild Fall and the first big winter storm did not arrive until Christmas. When Dot and Ms. came back from a walk, it was snowing hard. She came in the house yelling about bear tracks. I went out to look and found prints way bigger than my hand with very visible 2 inch nails in the fresh snow. Days later, Dot announced that Ms. no longer wanted to go to the field. I told her not to make the dog go anywhere it did not want to go. Come March, Dot and Ms. came charging into the house with the announcement that the bear was back. "No," I said. "He just left." "What do you mean?", asked Dot. I told her that during the Christmas blizzard, the bear must have found a place to spend the winter.

I did not want to know where a hungry bear was headed but I did want to know where he had been. After finding his track, I back tracked him to the garden path where 25 feet off the roadway he laid up against a big broken pine log. The log protected one side and snow created a cave around him. It appeared that he spent the winter quite comfortable. And that explains why Ms stayed away and gave up her favorite hike.

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AUBURN FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS



Winter storms can happen almost anywhere. They can cause us problems. Know what to do before, during and after a storm. This will help keep you and your family safe from a winter fire.


- Test all smoke alarms. Do this at least once a month. This way you will know they are working. Install carbon monoxide alarms in your home. Test the alarms.
- Plan two ways out of the home in case of an emergency. Clear driveway and front walk of ice and snow. This will provide easy access to your home.
- Make sure your house number can be seen from the street. If you need help, firefighters will be able to find you.
- Be ready in case the power goes out. Have flashlights on hand. Also have battery-powered lighting and fresh batteries. Never use candles.
- Stay aware of winter weather. Listen to the television or radio for updates. Watch for bulletins online.
- Check on neighbors. Check on others who may need help.
- Generators should be used outdoors. Keep them away from windows and doors. Do not run a generator inside your garage, even if the door is open.
- Stay away from downed wires. Report any downed wires to authorities.
- Be ready if the heat stops working. Use extra layers of clothes and blankets to stay warm. If you use an emergency heat source, keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away.
- Turn portable heaters off when you leave the room. Turn them off when you go to bed.

There are more home fires in winter than in any other season. Half of all home heating fires happen in December, January and February.

January 2021 Real Estate Market Update

Market Update. According to New Hampshire REALTORS® December is normally one of the slowest months of the year but strong buyer demand across most segments of the market, buoyed by near-record low interest rates, continue to drive a healthy sales pace in the face of a new wave of COVID-19 infections and a softening jobs market.

New Listings increased 29.9 percent for single family homes and 20.3 percent for townhouse-condo properties. Pending Sales increased 33.8 percent for single family homes and 29.6 percent for townhouse-condo properties. Inventory decreased 61.8 percent for single family homes and 47.1 percent for townhouse-condo properties.

The Median Sales Price was up 16.6 percent to \$349,900 for single family homes and 23.5 percent to \$271,750 for townhouse-condo properties. Days on Market decreased 47.6 percent for single family homes and 19.1 percent for townhouse-condo properties. Months Supply of Inventory decreased 62.5 percent for single family homes and 47.4 percent for townhouse-condo properties.

With low mortgage rates and strong buyer demand in most market segments, the housing market of early 2021 looks to continue the trends we saw in the second half of 2020. Low inventory and multiple offers on in-demand properties and market segments are likely to remain common while the market waits and hopes for a boost in new construction and a surge in home sellers to help provide more balance to the market.
