Auburn Town Hall News

Time for Auburn's Local Elections and Voting

February and March are the culmination of the Town's preparations for the year ahead, when voters elect officials for open positions and decide the Town's budget and other matters at Town Meeting.

Town Meeting has two sessions – the first is coming up quickly – the Deliberative Session will be held Saturday, February 4th at the Auburn Village School. The Town meeting will commence at 9:00AM and the Auburn School District session will follow immediately after.

At this meeting, voters will discuss and possibly amend warrant articles that deal with the Town's operating budget, collective bargaining agreements, zoning changes, and other business for the coming year. The Board of Selectmen, Planning Board, and Budget Committee are recommending a total of eleven articles on this year's warrant. Voters at the Deliberative Session will advance all of these articles in some form to the official ballot for March voting.

Later in February, all households will receive a 'voter's guide' that explains the warrant articles, and March's edition of the Crier will have information about candidates for office. The second session of Town and School District Meetings – official ballot voting – will be held on Tuesday, March 14th.

We encourage all voters to participate in their local government by taking the time to attend the Deliberative Session on February 4th and to vote on March 14h.

NEW FIRST GRADERS TO Auburn Village School: All children living in Auburn who will be six years old on or before September 30th, 2023 are eligible to enter first grade in the fall of 2023. New Grade 1 students are able to register now. You will be asked the year of enrollment in the preregistration survey. Please

be sure to note 2023-2024. If your child currently attends kindergarten at AVS you do not need to register for the 2023-2024 school year.

NEW STUDENTS (grades 2 – 8) TO Auburn Village School: To register a child for grades 2 – 8, please complete this online form. We will need the following information:

- The Child's Birth Certificate
- Picture ID of Parent/Guardian
- 2 Proof of Residency (examples include a current Utility Bill, Tax Bill, Mortgage Statement, Purchase and Sale Agreement, Certificate of Occupancy, or a Lease/Rental Agreement)
- Residency Affidavit only if living with another family (please ask office for form)
- The Child's Immunization Record
- Documentation of the child's last physical exam (must have occurred on or before September 1st for the start of a new school year)
- Court Order/Custody Agreement Parenting Plan

AUBURN POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS

Hello Auburn Residents,

We hope everyone is able to stay healthy and safe through these chilly winter months. Just a reminder while we finish up these last few winter months:

Parking During Snowstorms

- A. From November 2nd to April 1st each year no person shall park any motor vehicle on any public way between the hours of 11PM and 8AM or at any time in such manner as to impede snow removal operations.
- B. Any vehicle parking in violation of this may be towed by the road agent, the Chief of Police or their agents or by independent contractors engaged by the road agent or Chief of Police; any vehicles so towed shall be stored and released to the owner only upon payment of the cost of towing and storage by the owner.
- C. Any person violating Section A hereof shall be subject to a penalty not to exceed twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars for each offense.

The police department closed out the year with 9,811 calls for service in 2022. This included:

5,269 business and property checks
115 directed patrols
1,851 motor vehicle stops
338 suspicious activity checks
260 offense reports
And
131 arrests

While we do have officers on duty 24-hours a day, 7 days a week we would like to take the time to thank the Auburn Community for continuing to be safe and reporting suspicious activity to our officers. It is with your help that the crime in Auburn continues to be very low.

For those residents who may be new to town, we have a very active <u>Neighborhood Watch Program</u>. In January the leaders began updating members who may not know about Auburn Neighborhood Watch, or those who are already members, but information has changed.

If you have been a member of the neighborhood watch group in the past, or are new to the program, we urge you to send your current information. We will then put you in touch with the leader based on where you live.



The honey bees that are here today were imported by settlers from Europe and Asia to pollinate crops. To cultivate a rich home habitat, it is easy to attract a wide variety of native bees. According to UNH, there are could be from 100-250 different types of bee species that are native to NH. Some of these include Bumble, Sweat, Carpenter, Leaf Cutter, and Mason Bees. 70% of bees live underground, the other 30% are cavity nesters. Ground dwellers can often be seen in the spring in a sandy or bare earth part of the yard. Pictures are easily found on the UNH cooperative extension website. You might see the stinger-less male flying just above the ground to find a suitable mate. Most ground dwellers are not aggressive, the exclusion to this being the yellowjacket wasp, so it is helpful to identity the inhabitants. Yellow jacket nests will have many bees coming and going, instead of just one single bee. Most solitary ground dwellers tend to seem to disappear after spring. Native bees have great ecological value to fruit trees, vegetables and flowers so it is worth considering leaving the nest or creating a bare, sandy area off the beaten path for these hard workers. According to UNH, one out of every three bites of food we eat is delivered by an animal pollinator. What other pollinators are out there aside from bees, you ask? Butterflies, moths, wasps, flies, beetles(including the firefly!), and birds are all pollinators. Bats in NH are insectivores; however, elsewhere, they are pollinators and if you drink tequila, you can thank a bat who pollinated the agave plant.

If you'd like more information on how to cultivate a productive habitat in your yard, come listen to the pollinator pathways talk later this month. If you prefer to study at home, Doug Tallamy also has several books, pods casts, and documentaries on creating a 'hometown habitat'.

Winter-Time Ice (Some Very Short Stories)

Little Massabesic Pond is an often overlooked Auburn "Gem". It is small, shallow, and above the Griffin Dam on the Village Brook. (Manchester Water Works pumping has no impact on Little Massabesic.). It is a great place to take a kid skating or do a little ice fishing. Last December 22, Dee Cleary and her friends were skating on 3 inches of ice on Little Massabesic. At that time, Lake Massabesic was still open water.

In the winter of 1887, Willard Griffin wrote in his "journal", that he, his wife Frances, and 5 year old son, George, attended church. After lunch, they rode over to the Severance hotel to watch them cutting ice. Before electricity, everyone used ice for refrigeration. Cutting ice on the lakes and ponds was cold, hard, dangerous work for man and beast. Just days after watching the Severance's ice operation, Willard noted in his "journal" that a Severance horse has fallen in and drowned.

Tom Martin lived with his dog on the old Nixon place just east of the Longmeadow Cemetery on Chester Rd. In early December, 1985, Tom and his dog drove up to Tower Hill Pond to hike the Water Works trails. The dog ran out onto the ice and fell through. Tom rescued the dog but in the process ended up in the pond himself. Completely soaked, Tom made his way back to the car and drove home. He got out of his wet clothes and went to bed trying to get warm. They found him the next day - dead of hypothermia. The dog was fine.

Government regulation and associated paperwork is not a new phenomenon. The ice on Lake Massabesic could make a level, smooth highway - perfect for wintertime travel. From his barn on Spofford Rd, George Spofford walked his oxen down to the Lake that was behind the house, got on the ice, and eliminated the hill above Deerneck Bridge. But in order to utilize this winter highway, George had to get permission from both the Town of Auburn and the City of Manchester. In 1900, Spofford spent a whole day walking first to the Village, then to City Hall on Elm Street filling out the necessary paperwork. After all of that, he walked home.

An Everitt Seavey Story: There was a Mr. Bramhall that lived just North of the Griffin Mill Pond in Auburn Village. One winter, he cut two holes in the mill pond ice - He dove in one and surfaced in the other - like a seal!

David Raiche (1951) lived across from Severance School on Manchester Rd. Donnie Sowa who lived above Deerneck Bridge on the Londonderry Turnpike was his best friend. In the wintertime, the quickest route to Donnie' house was over frozen Massabesic in a straight line. On an early Spring walk, everything seemed fine but as David neared Deerneck the ice began undulating up and down. David flopped on his belly and 'swam' the last 100 feet. He was very wet but he was off the ice. When it came time to go home, he walked the road.

In 1974, the Auburn Volunteer Fire Department purchased their first new fire truck, a Mack, No 4. The committee had worked extremely hard to get everything right. Unfortunately, the pump was located on the front of the truck and on a cold Winter day it would freeze up enroute to the fire. Eventually, they figured out that if the pump PTO was engaged before leaving the Fire House, circulating water would not freeze and the truck would be ready when they arrived on the scene.

Sunday mornings the volunteer firemen gathered at the Fire House for work details, training sessions, and repair projects. In the winter, it was not unusual to drive Engine 6 onto Lake Massabesic at Clair's Landing (foot of Bunker Hill Rd). A hole was drilled into the ice, suction line inserted, and water pumped into the sky to make perfect rainbows. When No 4, a much larger truck was still fairly new, it was taken onto the ice. Fortunately, things went well and No 4 came off the ice. All of the 'What Ifs' remained hypothetical and it never went on the ice again.
