



Looking Forward to 2019

As we look forward to the coming year and beyond, the Board of Selectmen took time at the end of December to participate in a facilitated workshop meeting focused on taking stock on progress made during the past year and to identify goals the Board has for the Town during the coming year.

The Board held similar goal setting meetings in 2017 and 2018, and have found it to be helpful to just discuss what might be possible for the coming year.

In the February edition of The Crier, we will be able to publish what main goals were identified by the Board for 2019.

The Board has appointed Mary Royer to fill the vacant position on the Parks and Recreation Commission. Mary's term on the Commission will run through March 2021.

FY 2019 Budget Near to Completion

The Board of Selectmen is near to completing its work on the FY 2019 Town operating budget and warrant articles which should total approximately \$5,600,000. As we write this article, the Board's overall spending proposals are coming in at approximately \$50,000 more than the budget and warrant articles approved by the voters in March 2018.


The Board's budget effort is only a part of the Town budgeting process. The Budget Committee is still working on the Town and School budgets, and will complete their work by the January 10, 2019 public hearing on the budgets they will propose to the voters.




Scholarships open February 1, 2019

AVS School Improvement News

Happy New Year and hope you all had a nice holiday filled with friends and family. The 2019 new year is a significant one for Auburn Village School, one in which the construction and renovation project will come to a close and our students and educators will be learning and working in a building designed for a 21st century education. Before we get there though, there's still a lot of work to do, so a quick update on where we are with the project and a preview into what's on deck the rest of the winter and early spring. Yes, we're already planning for spring!

New Classroom Wing – Steel is Flying! The new classroom wing is framed and our construction company is focused on decking, drainage, and wrapping in order to get heat in the structure and begin working on the inside. The crew has had a challenging fall with record rain and snow and have spent much time pumping water from the work area. We are currently on track to open the new wing for the 2019-2020 school year.

Temporary Access Road – The temporary access road going behind the Safety Complex and entering the rear of the school property has been cleared. As we reported in previous updates, the road will be used by the various trades (plumbing, electrical, painting, glass, doors, etc.) to gain access to the building and keep as many construction vehicles as possible out of the rear parking lot of the school.

Renovation Planning – The renovation of the school is going to be the most challenging part of the project due to the short summer window available to do the work. We've begun discussing the logistics involved in clearing the administration area, classrooms, kitchen and cafeteria, and other space targeted for renovation in time for as much work as possible to be conducted in the 8-10-week summer timeframe. Adding to the challenge is the reality that much still happens at AVS through the summer – our administration is still working and AVS, PTA & Parks & Recreation summer programming is in full swing. Discussions will continue, and the Building Committee will provide ongoing updates through the Crier and other school and community communication outlets.

The Building Committee comprised of AVS and SAU 15 leadership, town officials, construction management and architecture companies, and School Board members continues to meet each week to discuss the progress of the project, review designs and vendor bids, and address any day-to-day needs of the school. As we bid 2018 farewell and look forward to 2019, the School Board members on the Committee would like to thank other Committee members for their hard work balancing the demands of the project and the need to ensure teaching and learning is happening each day. Auburn is lucky to have such a dedicated group of people focused on both.

2019 - 2020 Kindergarten & Grade 1 Registration

KINDERGARTEN: All children living in Auburn who will be five years old on or before September 30th, 2019 are eligible to enter kindergarten in the fall of 2019. Registration packets will be available at the main office beginning Monday, January 14th. Completed registration information packets are due in the main office by Friday, January 31st. There will be a kindergarten parent information meeting that will be held in the spring.

NEW FIRST GRADERS TO AVS: All children living in Auburn who will be six years old on or before September 30th, 2019 are eligible to enter first grade in the fall of 2019. Registration packets will be available at the main office beginning Monday, January 14th. Completed registration information packets are due in the main office by Friday, January 31st. The students will be given a vision and hearing screening as well as a phonemic awareness assessment to help determine reading

readiness skills. Screening will be held in May.

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






AUBURN FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

The Auburn Fire Department along with Chester and Sandown Fire Department's had applied and received funding for a Federal Grant to replace aging and outdated SCBA's. An SCBA is what a firefighter wears on their back to provide breathing air when we enter any environment where the air is unsafe to breath.

Auburn's percentage of the grant allowed us to purchase 23 new SCBA's, 2 RIT packs, and a new mobile cascade system. RIT packs are special packs with an air cylinder that we can bring to a trapped firefighter to give them more air to breathe. The cascade system fills the air cylinders at a fire scene. This piece of equipment is often called for by surrounding communities to assist at fires. By the time you read this the new SCBA's will be in service.

Other features on these SCBA's. 6 have an integrated TIC (thermal imager camera) built into the SCBA. This tool allows firefighters to find hidden fires faster without creating anymore damage to a home. All SCBA's are now working off of 1 lithium ion battery. Our old SCBA's had 3 different batteries we had to change out to make sure they were working properly. The masks are lighter, an adjustable lumbar support helps the firefighters wear it properly possibly avoiding strains or back injuries. With the grant the towns were able to purchase a fit testing machine. All firefighters were tested to make sure they are wearing the correct size masks. After the Fit testing each firefighter went through an in-service training, and then a small obstacle course.

Once again, I am humbled and blown away by the response of the Auburn Safety Complex Giving Tree. One resident and her Granite State Credit Union coworkers adopted a whole family from these last-minute additions and got everything on the list. The tags I put out for the other two were almost all immediately gone.

I know that we keep this as anonymous as possible, but I wanted you to know that over the couple months we do this, I often have to call parents to get clarifications or in some way have contact with them, and the help you provide them is not only needed, but immensely appreciated.

To the children of Auburn, you have amazed us with your generosity and we are thankful for all you have done to help us. I Look forward to our Wrap Party each year and I'm always in awe of the children and adults who come to help during a week night at such a busy time of year.

All the items have been successfully delivered to the families here in Auburn. With each delivery, the families were forever grateful for the assistance, and we wanted to pass that thanks along to each of you. Because of the overwhelming generosity of the residents, we can say with confidence that these Auburn families will have a magical and happy Christmas.

From the men and woman of the Safety Complex, thank you. We hope that everyone had safe and happy holidays.
