

With Warm Weather Comes Issues with Off-Road Vehicles

With the earlier than normal warm temperatures comes an interest to get outdoors for all sorts of activity including the use of off-road vehicles in various locations.

One area that has poised more of a problem than normal this year has been the conservation easement property owned by the Town off Steam Mill and Nutt Roads.

This approximate 10-acres parcel is adjacent to, but is not a part of, the Wethersfield development or the open space land that is part of that development. This parcel of land was formally designated as conservation land by the Board of Selectmen working with the Conservation Commission in 2005.

As part of the conservation designation, the Town determined no motorized vehicles would be allowed to be used on this property. Despite posting the property for the motorized vehicle ban, there has been a noticeable increased use of this area by motorbikes, off-road vehicles and even golf carts. These motorized vehicles cause damage to the overall property and can not be allowed to continue.

Residents are encouraged to take note of this standard. The Auburn Police Department has been asked to take note.

Auburn to Receive Federal Funds

As reported last month in the *Auburn Village Crier*, the Town of Auburn will be receiving funds from the federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) that is intended to assist the Town and its taxpayers over the next several years.

Since last month's report, a final determination has been made that Auburn will receive a total of \$585,123 for use locally. The funds will be coming in two payments of equal amounts – one this year and one next year. The U.S. Treasury Department has just issued guidance for this program that is being reviewed now to ensure Auburn utilizes the funds for purposes allowed under the federal law and regulations. It appears the Town will have upwards of three years (through December 2024) to spend or obligate the money, and will have through December 31, 2025, to spend all the funds.

Details of the requirements for the Town to report how the funds are utilized are still being determined.

Negotiations to Commence with Auburn Police Union


It has been three years since representatives of the Town and the Auburn Police Union have met to negotiate terms of the collective bargaining agreement that covers the majority of the full and part-time law enforcement positions within the department.

With the current contract expiring on March 31, 2022, the time is at hand for representatives for management and labor to meet to discuss the potential terms of a new contract to commence April 1st.

The teams will begin meeting this summer with the goal of reaching agreement by the end of the year in order to have the funding for a new contract considered during the Town's budgeting process in order to be before the voters in March 2022.

The Police Union's team include Sergeants James Huard and Kevin Cashman and a Police Officer to be determined, while the Town's team includes Police Commissioner Patrick Bergeron, Police Chief Ray Pelton and Selectmen Chair Keith Leclair.

The Auburn Police Union and the Town have had three successful collective bargaining agreements since the

With increased functionality, these enhancements for 2021 will save you time with less over-the-phone hassle, fewer fire station visits, and allow you to manage your town's fire permits in a more organized manner.

Some features of the system include:

- Search permittees from 2013-present
- Add new customers to the system
- Log in-person permits online for no fee and print at the station
- Quick burn tracking and lookups with a visual map (Great for Dispatch Centers)
- Easy messaging to permittees via email and text to inform them of permit changes or cancellations
- Updated print template
- Administrator ability to immediately stop all sales or specific sales if weather condition change and add a restart time

By the time you read this, summer will have already begun and we will be out and about trying to recreate and enjoy ourselves and after what we all went through last summer we deserve it.

Many of us pursue our enjoyment of the outside in different ways. We camp, fish, hike or mow the lawn (just kidding-l can't stand to watch my wife push that old mower).

Another kind of recreation that has been rapidly growing in popularity is ATV riding.

We receive our fair share of complaints concerning ATV's or OHRV's (Off Highway Recreation Vehicles), such as people ATVing on the property of another without permission.

We have been hearing about ATV riding in the Nutt Rd conservation area between Wilson's Crossing Rd and Steam Mill Rd.



In case you did not know:

- OHRV's were specifically restricted from the Conservation area when it was established and,
- No person shall operate an OHRV on the property of another unless such person has obtained written permission from the land owner-NH RSA 251-A: 29 XI Like any violation, a person runs the risk of being cited for the infraction.

So, like many fun things, there are rules to go by. In case anyone is interested, the State of NH laws concerning ATV's (OHRV's) can be found in NH RSA 215-A

At anytime you can reach the police by dialing 9-1-1. Outside of normal business hours, you can call 603-483-2922, which is manned by the Rockingham County Dispatch 24/7. Our animal control officer is Jarlene Cornett and can be reached at 603-759-5937. Finally, please do not be afraid to speak up if you see something suspicious. You are not being the nosy neighbor by making reports of something that does not seem right- if you see something, say something! The Auburn PD and your fellow neighbors would rather be safe than sorry. If you have an elderly neighbor, don't be afraid to check in on them to make sure they are okay. Green Grass & Clear Water

Water-quality friendly lawn care and fertilizer recommendations for northern New England

According to a recent survey, it's likely that you and your neighbors believe having a lawn that is safe for the environment is very important. However, some lawn care practices can create water quality problems. Plants need nutrients to grow, but excess nutrients (including nitrogen and phosphorous found in fertilizers) that run off our properties into local waterbodies can trigger algal blooms that cloud water and rob it of oxygen.

Many of us enjoy the time we spend working on our lawns and are willing to try new practices as long as our lawns continue to look good. Here are some easy practices for creating and maintaining a truly healthy lawn that is both attractive and safer for the environment.

Simple Recommendations for Every Lawn

1. Choose the Right Grass Seed

Consider limiting lawn area to locations where grass will grow easily and will actually be used for outdoor activities.

Choose grass varieties that require less maintenance. For northern New England, choose seed mixes with higher percentages of turf-type tall fescues, compact-type tall fescues and/or fine fescues. Choose mixes with smaller percentages of Kentucky bluegrass and/or perennial ryegrass. Overseed bare spots.

In shaded areas, select shade-tolerant turf grasses like fine-leaf and tall fescues.

Up to 10% of total seed mix can be white clover to help fix nitrogen in soil naturally. Avoid clover if anyone in the household is allergic to bee stings.







2. Don't Overwater

1" of water per week (from rain or irrigation) is usually enough. Overwatering can cause excess nutrients to move out of the root zone and into waterbodies or groundwater.

3. Test Your Soil

To have your soil tested, please visit this site:

extension.unh.edu/programs/soil-testing-services.

Sometimes adjusting the soil pH or organic matter are the only treatments needed to improve a lawn. If your soil test results are acceptable but your lawn is not, check for other problems like pests, grass variety, or sun/shade conditions.

4. Mow Smart

Mow grass no shorter than 3" high. Cut no more than one-third (½) of the blade each time you mow to encourage longer, stronger roots. Leave the clippings after mowing so they can return nutrients to the soil. NEVER dispose of clippings in drainage areas, storm drains, or waterbooks.

Recommendations for Lawns That Need Fertilizer

1. Determine How Much to Apply

Measure the dimensions of the area where you plan to apply. The square footage of the area will determine how much fertilizer to purchase and use.

Only use what you need. Nearly half of homeowners mistakenly use the entire bag whether it is needed or not. Seal and store opened fertilizer bags in an airtight container or share excess with others.

Lawns older than 10 years usually need less nitrogen than newer lawns, especially if the clippings are left, so apply only half of the amount directed on the bag. Only apply more if there's no improvement over time in turf color and density. Staying under four applications per season at this reduced rate helps keep the overall application at the recommended level² for waterquality friendly practices.

Lawns less than 10 years old may need the full amount of nitrogen as indicated on the fertilizer instructions. Apply less than four times per year.

2. Know When & Where to Apply

Avoid applying fertilizers mid-summer when turf growth naturally subsides or before a big rain when it can run off into nearby waterways or leach into ground water.

In northern New England, apply no earlier than spring green-up and no later than mid-September to ensure the proper soil temperature for grass to take up the nutrients.

Know your local and state laws related to fertilizer application. For example, do not apply any fertilizers within 25 feet of water bodies in New Hampshire.

3. Choose the Right Fertilizer

Avoid combination products that include both pesticide and fertilizer unless confident you need both. Unnecessary applications of fertilizers and pesticides can lead to soil and water contamination.

Select lawn fertilizers with low or no phosphorus unless your soil test indicates otherwise. The fertilizer formula (e.g., 20-0-15) tells the relative percentages of nitrogen (N), phosphorous (P) and potassium (K), in that order.

3. Choose the Right Fertilizer, cont.

Slow release formulations (>50% water insoluble nitrogen, "WIN") are generally preferable. Only use quick release products when there is a need to grow turf very quickly, for example, to prevent erosion of bare soil during a new seeding. Check the product label to see what type of nitrogen it contains.

Organic fertilizers are typically slow release and contain micronutrients that are beneficial to soil. They are not petroleum-based like most synthetic fertilizers. Overapplying any type of fertilizer or over-irrigating fertilized turf can lead to water quality problems.

Auburn Working to Develop Database on Local Drinking Water Sources

The Auburn Conservation Commission and Planning Board are jointly working to develop a database of Auburn's residential, commercial and community drinking water wells.

Included as part of the Town's 2021 budget, the development of the database and ultimate recommendations for potential regulations will be of assistance to both of the land use boards as they consider future proposals for development within the community.

The boards have retained Stantec Consulting Services of Auburn to assist with this undertaking. Please take a few minutes to assist the Town with this effort and answer as many of the following questions as you can:

- 1. What date was your well drilled or dug (installed)?
- 2. What type is your well, Bedrock (drilled), Overburden (dug)
- 3. Is your well for a single family residence, duplex, commercial, or small community water supply?



Talking family and community with Jim and Norma Guinesso Written by Dan Carpenter







Briarwood fire, 1967. Personal possessions in front yard.

Briarwood Farm on the flat top of Pingree Hill was established by Stephen Pingrey. Pingrey and his family loaded all of their possessions into an ox cart and headed North. Reaching NH, they vowed to push hard and long for 3 days. After 3 days of goading the oxen forward, they reached the edge of Chester (Auburn today) and they purchased what would become Briarwood Farm.

Andrew Guinesso, Sr. purchased the farm in 1912. Six years later, he married Lillian Pingree of Derry who was related to the original Stephen Pingrey. Like many farmhouses, Briarwood rented out to summer visitors. Enough visitors stayed at the farm that a dance hall with its own piano was attached to the back corner of the building. Unfortunately, the farmhouse never had a good well. All water was trucked in from a spring a 1/2 mile away. When the building burned in 1967, this lack of water, the wind that blew unremitting across the top of the hill, and the distance from the Auburn Fire House all played a role in the total destruction of Briarwood.

Jim's Mother, Lil Guinesso, was a teacher. She started out at Auburn No 1 and was there in 1940 when the schoolhouse caught fire during recess. Although the fire created mostly ceiling and roof damage, the school never reopened and the kids were bussed into Auburn Village. Mrs Guinesso then worked in Methuen, Ma and in the early 1960's, opened a school for the severely handicapped at Grenier Field.

Jim hung out with Chuckie Preston. The 2 of them were driving around and creating trouble when they came across an abandoned car at the intersection of Pingree and Calef. Almost immediately, up drives Chief of Police Emerson Heald. Chuckie announces that the car was stolen in Windham last night. The Chief calls the incident in and to the boys amazement , they hear the Police Dispatcher announce that the car was stolen in Windham. The boys figure that they have talked themselves into trouble. But Emmett never missed a beat... "You two are not smart enough to steal a car".

Chief Heald would open the Auburn school gym and let the kids play basketball. He often played with the kids. Some felt that his patented 'Chief' moves were just 'dirty'. The Chief once stopped Jim 3 times within 50 feet. "Where is your front plate?" "What's with the back plate?" Finally he said, "Take this thing home and don't let me see it until it's fixed." Of course, behind Briarwood barn were 85 cars with various problems. So, it wasn't much of a punishment to banish one.

In time of emergency, the Town Road Agent would ask for volunteer help. Hurricane Carol, 1954, roared through Auburn and left trees blocking roads all over Town. The Guinesso boys helped the roadways. Blizzards would leave Pingree Hill closed. The Road Agent would call and report that the plow truck could not make the Hill. The Guinesso boys would shovel out the drifts and then spend the rest of the day sledding in the road.

Briarwood Farm is almost exactly 1 mile to a Derry school bus line. If Eva Guinesso Linnie could get there, the Derry bus would take her to Pinkerton Academy. Unfortunately, a small corner of Chester crosses Pingree Rd for about 1/2 a mile. Without any houses for Chester to be concerned about, they never seemed to get around to plowing this section. So Eva, who had polio as a child and suffered permanent leg problems, had to hand shovel a path close to a mile long. Eventually, Auburn took responsibility for Chester's section and I'm sure Chester reciprocated in some fashion.

"Fire!" was a constant threat for country folk. Everyone burned wood and chimney fires in unlined chimneys could burn down the house. Short of water, the Guinesso's went up on the roof during a chimney fire and used 10 gallons of milk to cool down the chimney. (If you have never seen a chimney fire.....the flames are like a blow torch reaching 25' out of the chimney and the sound, a jet engine taking off.)

Back to the Briarwood Fire - The storm windows for the house were stored on the second floor of the barn. As the fire accelerated, the windows started breaking and the overheated glass was pouring into a box stall below housing 3 ponies. Before the ponies could be freed, the hot glass badly burned them. Taken outside, the ponies rolled and large chunks of their flesh just fell off. What to do? There were those in the crowd of onlookers that felt that the only solution was 3 shotgun shells. Frank Seavey (93 Raymond Rd) disagreed and offered to take the ponies to his barn. He did and the ponies responded. They survived.

A few more of Jim Guinesso's memories:

Andy Guinesso, Jr was color-blind... but he did not realize it. He came home with paint looking for a nice "Barn Red". He set to work and was pleased with the results. Most passerby's thought "Pink" but the can said "Fuchsia".

As a Halloween prank, Jim and his friends put a large stuffed alligator on top of Emery's Oak Farm (50 Chester Rd) in Auburn Village. He assumes that the Griffin Museum was its rightful home.


In the 1950's, Jim's Mother, Lil, would pick wild blueberries and sell them to the bakery in Derry for 50 cents a quart. Friday was shopping day in Derry. Lil would take 20 quarts in on a Friday giving her \$10 in cash to go shopping.

Today, both Jim and his son, Jim live on the site of the original farm, Briarwood. Young Jim owns a construction company and to honor his family's heritage, he calls it Briarwood Construction.

AVS SCHOOLYARD NEWS



Auburn Village School (AVS) has flexibly managed to keep its students in school for 160 out of 181 student days this year, 88% of the school year, which likely ranks among the most days a public school in southern NH has been in-person vs. remote!

Thank you to our committed administrative staff, teachers and paraprofessionals, food service, and custodial staff, for enabling students to continue many of the activities they were accustomed to with COVID-19 modifications. COVID-19 infections remained remarkably low, while students enjoyed outdoor learning days, virtual field trips (e.g. 4th grade – the State House, with Virginia Drew, Director of the Visitor's Center, and 7th grade – Lowell Mills to learn about the Industrial Age), a sledding day, outdoor award ceremonies and Kindergarten graduation, and virtual annual projects continued, including the 3rd grade Market Day and 4th grade Wax Museum project. The student-led AVS Leadership Group for 7th and 8th graders led spirit weeks, raised money for a local charity, and executed an outdoor learning day for the

middle school. Using health screenings and requiring masking, team sports were held throughout the year.

As many schools have canceled Field Day, team sports, and most inperson learning opportunities this year, AVS was able to continue to offer many of these fun activities to their students. A tremendous thank you to Tower Hill Church and, especially, Mike and Kendra Sullivan whose hard work and dedication made the fun day, graduation and dance decorative
