As part of Auburn’s efforts to reduce the impact of stormwater runoff on our lakes and streams, each month we will publish some tips for residents to help. SOAK up the rain NH is a program of the NH Dept. of Environmental Services.

“Green” Yard Care and Landscaping Tips

- Reduce the square footage of your lawn area by planting low-maintenance ground-covers, trees, flowers and shrubs to help water infiltrate into the ground and prevent soil erosion.
- For new lawns, use six to 12 inches of topsoil to encourage deeper root growth.
- Choose native grasses and ground coverings as alternatives to conventional turf lawns on some or all of your property. Native plants have originated and evolved in your area and generally require less water, herbicides, pesticides, fertilizers and trimming.
- Test your soil to see what it really needs before you apply fertilizer or lime (contact your county UNH Cooperative Extension office for information on soil testing).
- When fertilizer is necessary, use a slow-release fertilizer to avoid excess nutrients running off your lawn. The New Hampshire Surface Water Quality Protection Act prohibits the use of fertilizer within 25 feet of public waters.
- If you have an automated irrigation system, make sure it has a rain gauge or soil moisture sensor to prevent watering when it isn’t necessary – like when it is raining or immediately following a rain shower.

To create a more fair way to register interested travelers, here are the guidelines for this new registration procedure.

- You will have a week to return your registration form to Parks & Rec. Registrations forms will be accepted between May 1 through May 9.
 - Please return the form along with the fee to Auburn Parks and Recreation, PO Box 309, Auburn, NH 03032 or you can drop it off at the Town Hall. All forms must be received no later than May 9.
 - If you are traveling with a spouse or a friend, register them on the same form with you. You can include up to 4 names on a registration form so they can be drawn together.
- The cost for this trip is \$30 per person and is open to Auburn residents 65 and over.
- Registration forms will be drawn on May 10. The first 54 names will be added to the trip and the remainder will be put on the waiting list.
- Confirmations and waiting list notices will be mailed to the address provided on the registration form.
- Also new this year, we are offering 3 different trips! Yay! So if you are on the waiting list for this trip, you'll still have 2 more chances to join us this year.

Spring Plant Sale: May 18

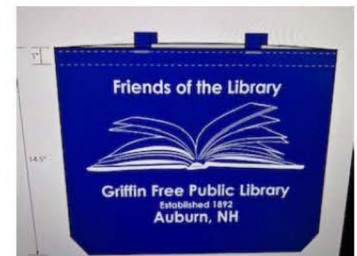

News from the Auburn Historical Association

Eaton Hill Farm, written by Dan Carpenter

Back in the “Good ‘Ol Days”, back before RFD (Rural Free Delivery, 1896) houses weren’t numbered in the country. Everyone ‘called’ at the Post Office and the Postmaster would check to see if you had mail. In order to distinguish your farm, rural residents named their farms and put up signs to help visitors. Until recently, there were only 4 signed properties still in Auburn - Massabesic Farm, Intimate Friends Club, Victoria Cottage, and Eaton Hill Farm.

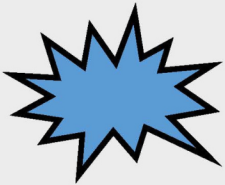
Now, the Eaton Hill homestead is sold and the sign is down. Four generations of Eaton’s owned the farm for 183 years, an average of over 45 years per generation. For 4 generations, the property passed from father to son. It never came on the market.

1. Lyman Eaton (1812-1863) and Lucy. Lyman moved from Candia in 1840 and purchased the farm from the Underhill family. The deal was completed with the understanding that the widow Underhill had a home for life. (Try explaining that condition to a real estate agent.). Lyman Eaton was a cooper, a barrel maker (the cardboard box of its day.). He had a separate building for the business in his side yard.
2. Benjamin Eugene Eaton (1844-1910) and Sarah. Ben farmed and they took in summer boarders. Eaton Hill Farm advertised that they could accommodate 15 guests. Room and Board was \$1 a day. With his wife cooking and cleaning, farmers could make good money catering to vacationers.
3. Albert Eugene (1880-1962) and Emma, The farmhouse burned about 1905. Bert and his father, Ben, built the present house. Bert started out logging with horses. As a young man, he logged with a team one winter and was given the 90 acres that became Spruce Lane. Eventually, he owned portable sawmills and had crews working in the woods. He gave a young Reverend Ken Sanford from the Longmeadow Church a house lot on Dearborn Rd. Bert was proud of providing house lots for 6 of his relatives.

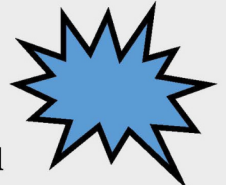

4. Harland (1927-2022) and June. At one point, Harland had Black Angus beef cows. After the cows left, he replaced the barn with a 3 car garage. Cars over cows. In the 1950's, Auburn was swept into the great megalopolis that stretched all the way to Virginia. Regional growth spurred the construction industry and the Eaton brothers were engaged in various types of construction. Harland and his brother William started out as shovel operators (early backhoe). Harland became involved with the union and was elected President of the NH AFL-CIO. His oldest brother, Ben, lived just down the hill and headed up Robie Construction. George lived across the road from the homestead and spent his entire career with Granite State Asphalt of Hooksett. Brother Albert had a portable sawmill, was an Auburn Selectman, Chief of the Auburn Volunteer Fire Department, Chief of the Grenier Field Fire Department, and then got with NASA and the manned space program.

Today, the homestead with 3 acres is sold but the 76 acre farm is part of a conservation trust. There will not be any further development on that side of Eaton Hill Rd between Raymond and Colman Roads. Six Eaton families still reside on Eaton Hill Rd.
