Did you know you can renew your vehicle registrations online?

If we have an email address associated with your name you will get an email reminder that you can link through to renew online. You can also just go to the Town website (www.auburnnh.us) and click on the E-reg button to do your renewals.

There is a 2.79% surcharge plus other fees for cards, but if you choose the ACH payment option you will only pay a total extra cost of \$3.45 for the convenience of having your registrations mailed to you!




Auburn Parks and Recreation Commission Helen Hiltz Community Service Award 2022 Nomination Form





As of November 1st, the Auburn Giving Tree "trailer" will be set up in our parking lot. There is a bin with tags in front of the trailer, items can be placed inside the trailer, and they will be taken into the station regularly.

For those of you not familiar or new to town. Each year The Safety Complex accepts information from residents who might need some assistance with Santa's holiday magic. We then put take those requests and put them on "ornaments." Each ornament has a gift or gift suggestion for someone on our list. Take the tag, purchase the item, and return both to the safety complex by December 17th. Santa's helpers here at the Safety Complex will ensure the items are delivered in time for Christmas morning.









During this time of year, we start to see an increase in phone and internet scams. Here are some tips to help keep you safe:

- Do your homework on the retailer/website/person to ensure legitimacy.
- Conduct a business inquiry of the online retailer on the Better Business Bureau's website (www.bbb.org).
- Be wary of online retailers who use a free email service instead of a company email address.
- Beware of purchases or services that require payment with a gift card.
- Beware of providing credit card information when requested through unsolicited emails.
- Do not click on links contained within an unsolicited email or respond to them.
- Check credit card statements routinely. If possible, set up credit card transaction auto alerts, or check balance after every online purchase. It is important to check statements after the holiday season, as many fraudulent charges can show up even several weeks later.
- Avoid filling out forms contained in email messages that ask for personal information.
- Be cautious of emails claiming to contain pictures in attached files, as the files may contain viruses. Only open attachments from known senders. Scan all attachments for viruses if possible.
- Make charitable contributions directly, rather than through an intermediary, and pay via credit card or check. Avoid cash donations if possible.

Daniel's Story

Ms. Marcelle Worth, a 92 year old senior citizen had lived in Exeter for 31 years. She asked "Neighbors Helping Neighbors", an Exeter community group organized by Michelle Hamilton, for help with her yard work. The volunteers showed up and were immediately drawn to a small headstone in the middle of her Lily of the Valley garden. It read: "DANIEL - Son Of Cpt Miles, Salome Burnham - 1 year and 4 months- April 4,1842".

Ms. Marcelle explained that 40 years ago her friend purchased a property and in the barn under a pile of junk was the tombstone. It was headed to the dump until Marcelle stated that Daniel had been forgotten too long and that she would find a place for the headstone. And that's how Daniel's headstone ended up in Ms. Marcelle's Lily of the Valley garden.

A few months later, Marcelle told Michelle Hamilton that she was moving to Florida. Michelle asked how was she was going to get Daniel's headstone there. Marcelle became upset and said that, unfortunately, she could not bring it with her. Michelle offered to take the Daniel's headstone home to her flower garden.

Once home, Michelle "Googled" Capt. Miles Burnham and the Longmeadow Cemetery in Auburn popped up. She clicked on the link and found Daniel's parents, Miles Burnham and his wife, Salome Hall Burnham. Michelle was shocked how quickly Google solved the mystery and that they were so close by. Further research revealed that Daniel's siblings were also buried there.

Michelle immediately placed a call to Cemetery Trustee Jim Thompson and left a message. Within 30 minutes, Jim called back and she told him about her newly acquired headstone. Jim asked if she would email the story of how she came to have Daniel's stone. On September 26, Jim called again to make arrangements to bring Daniel's headstone back to the Longmeadow. The following day, Michelle, Jim, and Dan Carpenter met at the cemetery and installed Daniel's stone in the Burnham family plot. All three were excited to have the stone back where it belonged.

It was comforting to know that although his presence had been unknown for so long, he had in fact not been alone. He was at rest with his family. Daniel's journey home is now complete. 

Our National Thanksgiving: With Thanks to President Lincoln and Mrs. Hale Nov 3, at 6:30pm at the Auburn Historical Association, 102 Hooksett Rd, Auburn, NH



"Our National Thanksgiving: With Thanks to President Lincoln and Mrs. Hale" will be presented by Steve and Sharon Wood of Claremont. They will portray our 16th president and the editor of the popular 19th century magazine, Godey's Lady's Book, who was born in Newport, New Hampshire. Together they will tell the story of Sarah Josepha Hale's thirty-year campaign to have Thanksgiving declared a national holiday. Her efforts were successful when Lincoln signed his Thanksgiving Proclamation in 1863.

The Woods are historical presenters specializing in 19th century American history. Steve has been a Lincoln presenter since 1995 and has presented his program, A Visit with

Abraham Lincoln, for schools, libraries, historical societies and community events.

In addition to portraying Mary Todd Lincoln, Sharon also offers several other first person historical programs set in the same time period. She has done considerable research on Sarah Hale, who is generally remembered more for her children's poem, Mary's Lamb, and her lifelong campaign for a Thanksgiving holiday, than for the influence she had on American culture through her widely read magazine. Sharon was honored to portray Mrs. Hale at the dedication of the Sarah Josepha Hale Memorial Park next to the Richards Free Library in Newport in November, 2013.
