

Color Leaves and Tax Bills Mark the Fall

For municipal governments throughout New Hampshire, the fall is a busy time of year as budgeting for the next year is in full swing, while the setting of tax rates, the mailing of property tax bills and the preparation to close out financial records for the current year are also underway. And Auburn is no different

With property tax bills likely to be in the mail by the last week of October, it may no longer be news to property owners the tax rate for 2019 was set at \$18.81 per thousand by the NH Department of Revenue Administration (NHDRA).

Auburn realized a significant increase in additional property valuation from new homes, commercial buildings and additions in 2019 which results in slight more than \$15 million of new value being recorded. Auburn's net assessed property valuation now totals \$860,548,828.

The tax rate includes four components -- \$3.59 for the town; \$12.35 for the local education: \$1.96 for the state education, and \$0.91 for the county. For comparison purposes, the 2018 total rate of \$17.06 per thousand, was inclusive of \$3.36 for the town; \$10.86 for local education: \$1.93 for state education and \$0.91 for the county.

Various budgets and warrant articles approved by local voters last March established total appropriations of \$21,558,985 for the town and school district combined. And the Town's share of the Rockingham County budget adds another \$781,399. Of that total amount, \$18,474,885 needs to be raised by taxes, which results in the \$18.81 tax rate.

Mildred Eisman is 33rd Auburn Resident to Hold Boston Post Cane

The presentation of the "Boston Post England towns to be presented to Cane" began in 1909 as a marketing gimmick to increase the circulation of the Boston Post.

There were 431 of the canes produced to begin with, which were made of African ebony with 14-carat gold heads. Some say that Edwin A. Grozier, publisher of the Boston Post, had picked them up cheap at an auction before he came up with

each town's oldest citizen then passed along to the next oldest as each holder of the cane departed the earth.

Though intended at first only for men, by 1930 women were receiving the canes thus ensuring that truly the town's oldest citizen became the temporary holder of the cane. Auburn was ahead of the curve. the idea of distributing them to New however, with Sarah Watson being

the first woman recognized in 1919.

In October, the Board of Selectmen was pleased to recognize and present the Boston Post Cane to Mildred Bovarnick Eisman who. at 96 years young, is the oldest resident of Auburn.

The presentation took place at the Town Hall with Mrs. Eisman's family, neighbors and friends in attendance.

Mrs. Eisman becomes the 33rd Auburn resident to be recognized with the Boston Post Cane. Although men had an early advantage of being the only ones to be recognized, there have been more Auburn women as holders of the cane than men. Of the 33 residents recognized, 15 have been men and 17 have been women. The cane, or staff, is an ancient symbol of deference to age and reverence for ancestors.

Auburn is among a number of New Hampshire communities that has maintained the tradition of presenting the Boston Post Cane. The Town has retained the ownership of the original cane on display at the Auburn Historical Association, while a replica is presented to the holders to keep as testament of the milestone.



Have you started applying to post secondary schools? <u>The cost of education is expensive!</u>

Here are a few tips when looking for <u>scholarships</u> to help pay for your education:

- 1. Visit <u>scholarshipamerica.org</u> and make a list of scholarships for which you may qualify. Many of these are available to all students.
 - 2. Search for <u>scholarships often</u>. Many open in the fall/winter while student are applying to schools.
 - 3. Keep track of all <u>scholarship due dates</u>. You don't want to miss out on any financial help.
- 4. Apply to as <u>many scholarships</u> as you think you can complete! Most applications will require the same information. This should save you time, after the initial information is gathered.
 - 5. <u>Keep studying!</u> Your high school grades can be a big influence on receiving a scholarship.

Auburn Dollars for Scholars offer 9 scholarships to <u>all</u> Auburn students <u>currently attending or</u> <u>planning on attending</u> a post secondary school for the 2020/2021 academic school year. Auburn's scholarships open <u>Feb. 1st 2020.</u>

ATTENTION NEW VOTERS

Interested in voting in the Presidential Primary election?

Do you need to register to vote and/or request an absentee ballot?

If you are leaving town for the winter months you may want to come into the Town Clerk's Office before you go to get registered to vote and/or request an absentee ballot.

Prospective voters will be asked to show proofs of identity, age (18 by the next election day), domicile/residence in Auburn, and U.S. Citizenship. A driver's license and a birth certificate or passport are useful. Affidavits may be signed under oath if proofs are lacking.

News from the Auburn Historical Association <u>MILDRED (BOVARNICK) EISMAN HONORED</u>

On Tuesday, October 15, Millie Eisman was presented with Auburn's Boston Cane Post. The cane is given to the town's oldest resident and 96-year-old Millie is the 33rd holder of the cane.

Millie was married to Morris Phillip Eisman and they lived on Chester Road, across from Lake Massabesic.

Millie worked for many years at Elliot Hospital in Manchester and went on to become the head nurse of the French Unit at the hospital. She retired at 65-years-old and volunteered until she was 92-years-old at the hospital's library.

Millie was one of the first women on the Auburn School Board and a District Officer and was one of the original founders of the Auburn's Woman's Auxiliary.

Millie has three children (Nancy, Glenn and Alex), eight grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren.



SAYING GOODBYE AND THANK YOU TO SUSIE

The Auburn Historical Association would like to send a heartfelt "THANK YOU" to Susie Thiboult. After five years of volunteering with the Historical Association, Susie has decided to hang up her duck socks and "retire".

Susie was responsible for spearheading annual fundraisers like the plant sale and daffodil project. She also spent countless hours sewing, painting and organizing the popular "Auburn People" scarecrows. With help from AHA President Dan Carpenter, Susie wrote, compiled and photographed the Town of Auburn, Auburn Barns, Old Homes and Auburn Elders books.

Susie is probably most known for being the mastermind behind the wildly successful Auburn Day and Duck Race. She organized volunteers, sought out vendors and worked tirelessly with her daughter, Morgen, to get the word out to local media outlets about the event.

Susie is a compassionate, dedicated and hardworking woman and she will be missed by the entire organization.

We wish Susie a happy "retirement", although we know she'll be busy with keeping up with her four grandchildren and taking care of her husband, Joe.





- 5. Try a lockbox. Lockboxes can be used to protect packages until you can make it home and retrieve them.
- 6. Monitor your front porch. Security cameras or video doorbells can be used to keep an eye on your packages.

<u>Auburn Fire Department News</u>

With fall upon us and winter approaching, it's a good idea to refresh your memory on fall fire safety tips. Some safety tips are the same regardless of the time of year, but many safety concerns are seasonal, particularly those that involve keeping your home warm.

Time Changes Mean Battery Changes

Get in the habit of changing the batteries in your smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors every fall and spring when changing the clocks for Daylight Savings Time. It is also a good idea to make it standard procedure in your household to verify that all fire extinguishers are fully charged and in working order when you adjust the clocks each season. Home Heating Tips

No matter what type of device you use to heat your home, making sure your heating devices and/or systems are in good working order is an important part of learning some fall fire safety tips. Many things can go wrong with heating equipment during the spring and summer months. Verify that everything you need to keep your home warm throughout fall and winter is in good working order before you experience the first cold snap of the season. **Central Heating System Safety Tips**

• Get your central heating system cleaned, inspected and serviced by a certified HVAC (heating, venting and air conditioning) contractor every year before using it.

• If you have a gas heater, make sure that you have a sufficient quantity of fully functioning carbon monoxide detectors installed in your home.

Space Heater Safety Tips

- Make sure that any space heaters are surrounded by at least three feet of empty space.
- Never place clothing or any other objects on a space heater to dry.
- Do not place space heaters near furniture or drapery.
- Turn space heaters off when you leave the house or go to bed.
- Avoid storing any combustible items near heaters.

Fireplace Safety Tips

- Get your chimney inspected each year to make sure that it is safe.
- Hire a chimney sweep to clean out your chimney every fall.
- Repair any cracks in fireplaces.
- Use fireplace screens to keep sparks and fire debris inside the fireplace.
- Do not every use gasoline to start a fire in the fireplace.
- Never leave a fire unattended.
- Make sure that combustible materials are not stored within three feet of your fireplace.
- For gas fireplaces, get all connections and lines inspected before use each season.
- Remember that outdoor fireplaces can be just as dangerous as indoor units, and observe all safety precautions when using them.

The AVS Health Office is excited to announce that we are holding the New Hampshire Lions KidSight vision screening on Friday, November 8th. The vision screening utilizes the Welch Allyn's Spot Vision Screener in a hands free vision exam of children. There is no subjectivity in this exam and is 98% accurate. The exam takes less than one minute with the device being held 3 feet from the face and the child only needs to look at the screen. Results will be available immediately and will be sent home within a few days. Parents of children with abnormal results will be contacted by the school nurse. What can be detected?

· Astigmatism

· Myopia (nearsightedness)

· Hyperopia (farsightedness)

· Anisometropia (differences between the two eyes)

• Strabismus (misalignment of the eyes)

· Amblyopia (lazy eye)

· Anisocoria (pupil size anomalies)



This exam will take place of the usual school vision exam. Each child must have a signed permission slip to participate.


Our kindergarten through fourth graders are learning to identify their state of mind or feelings by determining what "Zone" they are in.

- The Red Zone is used to describe extremely heightened states of alertness and intense emotions. A person may be elated or experiencing anger, rage, explosive behavior, devastation, or terror when in the Red Zone.
- The Yellow Zone is also used to describe a heightened state of alertness and elevated emotions, however one has more control when they are in the Yellow Zone. A person may be experiencing stress, frustration, anxiety, excitement, silliness, the wiggles, or nervousness when in the Yellow Zone.
- The Green Zone is used to describe a calm state of alertness. A person may be described as happy, focused, content, or ready to learn when in the Green Zone. This is the zone where optimal learning occurs.
- The Blue Zone is used to describe low states of alertness and down feelings such as when one feels sad, tired, sick, or bored.

The Zones can be compared to traffic signs. When given a green light or in the Green Zone, one is "good to go". A yellow sign means be aware or take caution, which applies to the Yellow Zone. A red light or stop sign means stop, and when one is the Red Zone this often is the case. The Blue Zone can be compared to the rest area signs where one goes to rest or re-energize. All of the zones are natural to experience, but the framework focuses on teaching students how to recognize and manage their Zone based on the environment and its demands and the people around them. For example, when playing on the playground or in an active/competitive game, students are often experiencing a heightened internal state such as silliness or excitement and are in the Yellow Zone, but it may not need to be managed. However, if the environment is changed to the library where there are different expectations than the playground, students may still be in the Yellow Zone but have to manage it differently, so their behavior meets the expectations of the library setting.

When you talk to your child, use the "Zones" to help them identify and manage their feelings.
