

Streetlight Conversion Project to Get Underway

After several years of discussion and the use of a formal request for proposal process, the Board of Selectmen has accepted the proposal of Affinity LED Lighting of Dover to convert the 83 streetlights throughout Auburn to LED units.

The conversation of the lights to these types of units is expected to reduce the Town's annual \$12,000 expense for electricity by more than 50 percent.

With more than 40 other municipal conversion projects in New Hampshire, as well as projects for the NH Department of Transportation and other New England states to their experience and their ability to manufacture the new light units in New Hampshire with a workforce of U.S. Veterans, Affinity anticipates completing Auburn's project before the end of this year.

The units to be installed in Auburn are a 3,000K correlated color temperature unit which offers a cooler light and not the harsh, bright light people may associate with LED lighting. The unit, which was physically demonstrated at one of the Board's meeting in September, is "Night Sky Friendly" that pre-

vents uplight. They also include integrated back shields and reduced-glare optical lenses to direct the light at the area immediately beneath it and not bathe a larger area with bright light.

Beyond the anticipated reduction in annual cost, the LED replacement lights will also reduce the energy consumption by the streetlight by 69%. Based on the total project cost of \$25,299, of which \$8,300 will be paid through a program rebate from Eversource, the project payback would occur in 2.61 years.

Chief Goldstein may be most widely recognized through his efforts as a member of two critical incident teams and is available 24/7 to any department that requests his help whether it is for-



AUBURN FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

ADOPT A CISTERN/DRY HYDRANT PROGRAM





The Auburn Fire Department relies mostly on "Rural" water supply within our town for our fire protection. This means that we have 28 Dry Hydrants and Cisterns to provide us with our water to aid us in our firefighting operations. If these water supply locations become hindered by obstruction such as snow, ice, or overgrown vegetation this may hamper our efforts in providing adequate water supply in a timely fashion.

During the winter months these cisterns and Dry Hydrants can become buried in snow and despite our best efforts we cannot always clear out these water supply locations in a timely manner. During the summer months these hydrants can become overgrown with grass and weeds blocking the fire departments connections. If a fire were to occur, time is a critical factor and if the hydrants were not cleared, firefighters would have to take the time to clear the hydrant before taking up firefighting operations. This is the reason why we are asking for your help.

The Auburn Fire Department would like to initiate an "Adopt A Cistern/Hydrant" program for our residents who may live close to one of the critical water supply locations. Although it is not our resident's responsibility to do so, you could aid in providing a valuable public service. If you could locate a Cistern/Hydrant near your home and take the time to clear snow, vegetation, and debris from these locations, you would be providing a valuable service by keeping these connections clear and open.

Should you decide to participate in our "Adopt A Cistern/Hydrant" program, please contact Captain James Saulnier at 603-483-8141 ext. 110. It is our intention to publicly recognize everyone who can help us in our effort by listing their name and the location of the Cistern/Hydrant.

If for any reason you choose not to participate in this program, we ask you to please be aware of these locations when clearing your driveways and walkways of snow and ice.

Our Auburn neighbors and friends continue to be in our prayers in these challenging days. Although our circumstances have led us to close our building for safety purposes, our church remains alive, vibrant and eager to serve God and our neighbors in new ways. In this autumn season we are continuing with our traditional seasonal outreach project but in new ways and we welcome the participation of our Auburn friends and neighbors:



Scarves in the Park:

The current pandemic has necessitated that we make some changes to ensure the safety of both our volunteers and those

who receive the scarves. For this year we will forgo hanging the scarves in an actual park out of concern about accidental transmission of contagion by too many people handling them. However, we have reached out to five different shelters and programs serving homeless individuals and will be providing the scarves directly to them. We are also not able to have our regular "tagging party" and so, if you have scarves



completed, we can pick the scarves up from you and get them tagged. Please contact Pastor Ruth at the church to arrange a pick up and thank you to all of our Auburn friends and neighbors who have worked on scarves throughout the year.

Thanksgiving Baskets: For decades our church has served our Auburn neighbors in need with our annual Thanksgiving Baskets in-gathering of food to help make the festivities of the season brighter. Current physical distancing recommendations in NH would prohibit the activities of sorting and distribution as we have usually done them and so, for this year, we will be providing Grocery Store Gift Cards only, which we can mail to the families. Donations of Gift Cards in any amounts are greatly appreciated, however, in order to make the distributions easier for different sized families, we ask that you send gift cards in denominations of no more than \$25 each. Please con-

tact Pastor Ruth at the church to arrange a pick up or simply mail any gift cards from any of the local grocery stores to the church office (P.O. Box 356 Auburn, NH 03032).

As of the submission deadline for this article, our church is continuing with our weekly on line interactive worship gatherings and the church leadership will be making a decision shortly about the viability of in-person gatherings with restrictions. We have begun the concrete step necessary to prepare our building to reopen with as much safety as we can provide. Regardless of the date of reopening the building, we will be continuing to offer both interactive Zoom gatherings as well as pre-recoded YouTube Sunday Worship and Wednesday Children's Messages for those not yet ready for in-person gatherings. Notices will be posted on our church's website, Facebook page as well as on the Auburn Community Facebook page. We ask for your prayers as we discern which is the wisest and safest way forward. None of it has been easy and we have all made mistakes, but we are continuing to come together in new ways that reflect who God has called us to be.

No matter who you are or where you are on your spiritual journey, there is always a place for you with us, whether in the building or on-line. News from the Auburn Historical Association

1795—Violence and Justice in the Longmeadow (Auburn) By Dan Carpenter



Thomas Shirley who lived in what is now Auburn Village stopped at Moses (Hatter) Underhill's tavern (near present day Auburn Tavern) on Christmas Day, 1795. There he encountered John Patten on his way to have a blacksmith fix an old scythe. There was an altercation. Patten struck Shirley in the head with the tang. (A metal piece that attached the blade to the wooden handle of the scythe). The wound did not appear too serious but Shirley died 5 weeks later. Patten was indicted, tried, and convicted of manslaughter. The sentence: "To be branded in the hand." Shirley was about 60 years old and the father of 6 grown children. Patten was about 40 and the father of 7. (Chase, History Of Chester", P 590,91)

There was another fight in November, 1795, and three weeks later, George Bell filed a complaint against Nathaniel Dearborn. The complaint states that Dearborn is a minor who "with force and arms an assault... did beat and wound and willfully hurt... contrary to law, and against the peace and dignity of said state."

Justice James McGregor ordered the Sheriff to "apprehend the body of the said Nathaniel Dearborn... and bring him before me... that he may be examined... and dealt with". On 1/5/1796, Sheriff Morrison reported, "have taken the body of Nat Dearborn before a justice...". He was accompanied by his father, John Sanborn Dearborn, who plead "not guilty " and the case was referred for trial. The elder Dearborn signed the document as did George Bell. Both George Bell and the defendant Nat Dearborn were 14 years old. (The outcome of the trial is unknown at this time.)

Perhaps Nat Dearborn learned something from this experience, he became an attorney and worked for many years in Northwood, NH. Before his death, Thomas Shirley had manufactured potash near where the Auburn store is today. George Bell would open a store and "made potash near the pond". (Chase, P471) on Shirley's old location. Bell never married and he died at the age of 23 in 1803.
