Work on Town's FY 2023 Budget Underway

By the time you are reading this, work will be underway with Town boards and departments presenting their FY 2023 budget requests to the Board of Selectmen.

The Board received a total Town budget package at its August 22nd meeting, and then will be meeting with the individual Town officials throughout the month of October and November.

The Budget Committee is also scheduled to begin its work on the FY 2023 budget on September 29th and will continue to meet through December for both the Town and the School District budget proposals.

Good Shepherd's Foundation to add Little Free Libraries

The Youth Advisory Council of the Good Shepherd's Foundation attended the Board of Selectmen meeting on August 8th to gain permission to place "Little Free Libraries" at locations throughout town including the Town Hall and Pingree Hill Fire Station. Madeline Hajduk, of the Good Shepherd's Foundation Youth Advisory Council, explained that books will be left by local residents and then returned. Auburn resident, Ed Gannon, has volunteered to check on these libraries on a weekly basis.

You can also find a "Little Free Library" located at the Circle of Fun Playground thanks to Jackie and Bill Wood.

<u>Transfer Station Temporary Closure</u>

It has come to the Board's attention that the Auburn Transfer Station, located at 24 Grey Point Ave, will be closed from Wednesday, October 19th through Friday, October 21st due to scales being replaced. Massabesic Garden Club



Our first meeting of the 2022-2023 year will be held on October 12, with the location to be announced. We will have a guest speaker from UNH Cooperative Extension, and the topic is Gardening in a Changing Climate. I'm hoping for advice on what backyard garden plants are somewhat drought resistant, but still high yielding vegetables.

Our Duck Race participation was great fun, and we had a wonderful day at this great community event. We held our second annual plant sale which was very successful, and

we will be collecting outdoor and house plants again next September. We met and talked with a lot of folks interested in membership--all are welcome.

Have you heard about the Griffin Free Library's initiative for sharing seeds? We are very excited to support the library's new seed library and will encourage our members to save seeds and share seeds grown locally. From the Library website: "Miss Jessica will be developing a program where community members and patrons will be able to drop off and take home seeds from and for their home gardens. (Kind of a Little Free Library, but for seeds!) We hope to follow that up with a small community garden on the library grounds next spring."

If you have an empty patch in your garden, it is not too late (almost!) to throw in some spinach and kale seeds for salad greens that will grow (slowly) even past our earliest frosts. Just remember to keep them wet until sprouting. Even better if you can rig hoops, cover them with plastic, and give that area some fall protection.

AVS SCHOOLYARD NEWS

Spotlight on Science, Technology, Engineering, and Art (STEAM) Class





Linda Reinelt, AVS STEAM Teacher, has created some very engaging activities for AVS middle school students. Students are encouraged to take thoughtful risks, engage in experiential learning, persist in problem-solving, embrace collaboration, and work through the creative process.

Seventh graders were tasked with creating a new ride for a theme park!
They were given a budget and costs for their materials and labor. They had

to consider restrictions, safety, quality control, and design. Their ride had to encourage more tourists to visit their park and appeal to a range of ages. The students worked together to make these fun and creative projects.

We continue to use our many 3D printers in our STEAM program. Students use a free web based software program called Tinkercad to design their models. They print their prototypes to any of the printers.





The AVS STEAM program also participates in the FIRST® LEGO® League. FIRST® LEGO® League introduces science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) to children ages 4-16 through fun, exciting hands-on learning. Participants gain real-world problem solving experience through a guided, global robotics program, helping today's students and teachers build a better future together.


Since then, he's gone to write 12 more books in the popular, best-selling series. Paul is one of the library's most requested authors, in particular his latest, 'Hatchet Island."





Massabesic's First Steamboat—The Daisy Written by Dan Carpenter

According to "B", a newspaper correspondent, Lake Massabesic needed a steamboat to be considered a resort destination. Henry J Eaton (no relation to Auburn family) fulfilled this need by launching the sidewinder steamboat 'Daisy' in 1876. It was capable of carrying 75 passengers and was named after his 4 year old daughter.

Eaton had big plans for his steamboat. A 4 hour tour of the Massabesic Front Pond could be had for 50 cents. Eaton purchased a lot for docking privileges near the Massabesic Railroad Depot and today's Front Park. Passengers were expected to bring a picnic lunch. The "Daisy" set off on a 10 mile trip around the Front Pond. First, they traveled South across the lake to Hunting Beach. (The Hunting Family lived at 68 Hunting Rd and owned down to the lake). After lunch, the 'Daisy' headed North towards Auburn Village and Loon Island. In 1877, Eaton built a pavilion and swing sets on Loon making possible dancing, fishing, and relaxing.

People were also pushing to raise Deerneck Bridge which would allow steamboats with smokestacks to access the entire Lake. A few years later, Manchester and the State Of NH did rebuild the bridge. Patrons of the Island Pond House, Stearn's, and the Massabesic House, all on the Back Pond, could now go anywhere on the Lake.

But not everyone was happy. The "Daisy" made the newspaper again in 1879. There were rumors and safety questions raised about the boat and on June 28 it sank 200 feet from its dock. A.H. Bailey, an engineer visiting from Texas, set out to determine the cause of the accident. When the boat was raised, he was first aboard and concluded that someone had removed a 1 inch drain plug. "With confidence", Bailey reassured the public that the 'Daisy' had "perfect safety ".

There were also questions regarding the ownership of Loon Island. Eaton had built his Pavilion there in 1877 and the MWW eventually ordered him to vacate the premises. When nothing happened, Charles K Walker, the first Superintendent of the MWW took a crew on a Sunday morning in 1885 and burned the Pavilion.

By the late 1880's, Henry J Eaton's health was becoming a problem which he blamed on his 20 career with the Boston & Maine Railroad. He sold his steamboat, "Daisy" to the Offutt brothers who owned the Massabesic House. With his two daughters and his second wife, Mary, Henry headed to California. Once there, Eaton becomes involved with the wine industry and spent the last 17 years of his life in the vineyards.

One last strange twist concerning the saga of Loon Island. In 1908, Henry J Eaton was dying in California while the Manchester Water Works was negotiating the purchase of the island from one Nellie Eaton. According to the deed, Nellie was from Manchester but no other reference to her can be found and she does not appear to be related to Henry.

Things have been quiet on Loon Island since 1908 but a turnbuckle used to anchor Eaton's Pavilion to the granite is still there to remind us of dance parties gone bye.

Our National Thanksgiving: With Thanks to President Lincoln and Mrs. Hale Nov 3, at 6:30pm at the Auburn Historical Association, 102 Hooksett Rd, Auburn, NH



"Our National Thanksgiving: With Thanks to President Lincoln and Mrs. Hale" will be presented by Steve and Sharon Wood of Claremont. They will portray our 16th president and the editor of the popular 19th century magazine, Godey's Lady's Book, who was born in Newport, New Hampshire. Together they will tell the story of Sarah Josepha Hale's thirty-year campaign to have Thanksgiving declared a national holiday. Her efforts were successful when Lincoln signed his Thanksgiving Proclamation in 1863.

The Woods are historical presenters specializing in 19th century American history. Steve has been a Lincoln presenter since 1995 and has presented his program, A Visit with Abraham Lincoln, for schools, libraries, historical societies and community events.

In addition to portraying Mary Todd Lincoln, Sharon also offers several other first person historical programs set in the same time period. She has done considerable research on Sarah Hale, who is generally remembered more for her children's poem, Mary's Lamb, and her lifelong campaign for a Thanksgiving holiday, than for the influence she had on American culture through her widely read magazine. Sharon was honored to portray Mrs. Hale at the dedication of the Sarah Josepha Hale Memorial Park next to the Richards Free Library in Newport in November, 2013.
