## Auburn Town Hall News

We hope you enjoyed this year's Auburn Night, Auburn Day, and Duck Race as much as we did. The rain did not dampen spirits for fireworks which were accented by a terrific lightning show. Many thanks to the countless volunteers and vendors that make it happen!

That day it was our pleasure to present Auburn's "Boston Post Cane" to **Pauline Heckthorne**, who at 98 is the town's oldest resident.

Work on the 2024 town budget is underway. Town boards and departments will be presenting their requests to the Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee through December. The public is welcome to attend. The meeting and presentation schedule will be posted on the town's website. Public Hearings on the final town and school budgets will be held in January before the voting process begins in February.

Major road work for 2023 is wrapping up with reconstruction of a portion of Dearborn Road along with paving on Wilson's Crossing, Rattlesnake Hill, Squirrel and Depot Roads.

We thank Patrick Bergeron for his service on the Zoning Board of Adjustment. Following his resignation, Steve Kimball has become a full member of the board. The ZBA, along with our Planning Board and Conservation Commission, have open seats for Alternate Members. Alternates sit in for full members in the case of absence or recusal. Please contact the town office for information about serving. This is a great way to help the community and learn how these important bodies contribute to our quality of life in Auburn.

As a final reminder, <u>E-Waste Collection Day AND Shredding Service / Collection will be Sat. 9/30 at the Safety</u> <u>Complex and Town Hall</u>, respectively. These are available to Auburn residents only, free of charge.

# FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

As Fire Prevention Week approaches, Auburn Fire Department reminds residents:

"Cooking safety starts with YOU. Pay attention to fire prevention."

The Auburn Fire Department is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA®) — the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week<sup>TM</sup> (FPW) for more than 100 years — to promote this year's FPW campaign, "Cooking safety starts with YOU. Pay attention to fire prevention<sup>TM</sup>." The campaign works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take when cooking to keep themselves and those around them safe.


According to NFPA, cooking is the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries in the United States. Unattended cooking is the leading cause of cooking fires and deaths.

"Year after year, cooking remains the leading cause of home fires by far, accounting for half (49 percent) of all U.S. home fires," said Lorraine Carli, vice president of outreach and advocacy at NFPA. "These numbers tell us that there is still much work to do when it comes to better educating the public about ways to stay safe when cooking."

The Auburn Fire Department encourages all residents to embrace the 2023 Fire Prevention Week theme, "Cooking safety start with YOU". A cooking fire can grow quickly. I have seen many homes damaged and people injured by fires that could easily have been prevented."

Auburn Fire Department offers these key safety tips to help reduce the risk of a cooking fire.

- 1. Watch what you heat. Always keep a close eye on what you are cooking. Set a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- 2. Turn pot handles toward the back of the stove. Always keep a lid nearby when cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan and turn off the burner.
- 3. Have a "kid- and pet-free zone" of at least 3 feet (1 meter) around the stove or grill and anywhere else hot food or drink is prepared or carried.





  - Connect learning with real life and provide the necessary skills for success in college, career, and citizenship.

  - o Promote student learning that extends beyond the classroom and is amplified through family and community experiences.
  - o Attract and retain high-impact talent across all education professions in the District.

Thank you to the teachers, administrators, and parents who spent many nights over many months developing this educational roadmap for Auburn. Also, a big thank you to our educators, parents, and students who in close partnership, will bring these concepts to life.

# "Neighbors" and "Lost Time" Two Short Stories by Dan Carpenter

#### **Neighbors**

Fifty years ago, the talk was that electricity would be so cheap when Seabrook Nuclear Plant came on line that Public Service Of NH would not need to read the meter. Based on reasoning like that, I put electric baseboard heat in my house. One winter of electric bills ended that utopian thinking. By the next Fall, a one ton wood furnace was ordered from Riteway Manufacturing in Pennsylvania. The trucking company called that delivery would be tomorrow morning and someone had to be there to receive it.

At the time, people gathered at the Auburn Village Store in the morning. Men on there way to work in Manchester would stop for a coffee and maybe buy a couple gallons of gas. Old timers, like George 'Bucky Bart' Bartholomew and John Preston would pick up the Union Leader and say hello to the clerk. Local kids looking for day work would hang around for a while. There was enough traffic that Alan Young eventually opened a breakfast counter (Remember Nancy and Ralph Johnson on the grill?).

I went to the store looking for someone to be there for the arrival of the furnace and found Stanley Wood. He lived a mile away from the 5 Corners but there were only 7 houses between us. We were neighbors! Stan agreed to help out.

When I got home that afternoon, there was no large crate in the driveway. "What had gone wrong?" A closer look showed that something heavy had gone down to the walk-in cellar door. And on the far end of the cellar stood the 2000 lb. furnace. Stan had recruited a couple of friends at the store and the three of them rolled the furnace right into position. Neighbors helping neighbors. It was a great time to be in small town America.

#### **Lost Time**

The Town of Auburn celebrated its 150th birthday in 1995. As part of the festivities, the Auburn Historical Association and Town put together a time capsule. A 10 inch diameter plastic pipe was threaded on both ends and capped. AVS students and various other groups contributed items. The plan was to retrieve it at the Town's Bicentennial celebration in 2045. Don Dollard oversaw the burial which took place in the front yard of the Town Hall. Multiple measurements were taken to accurately pinpoint the time capsules location.

Six year old Curtis Morrill and his family came out from Manchester to attend the Duck Race in 1995 and witnessed the time capsule burial. Curtis now lives in Auburn and inquired about the time capsule. In 2014, the Town undertook a major renovation of the Town Hall. The septic system was upgraded and the new leach field was right over the time capsule. Dollard's measurements made identifying the location easy and the septic installers dug up-and moved the time capsule. But where?

The Town Engineer took measurements but can't find his notes. The septic installers remember the job but not the location of the time capsule. Former Town Clerk Joanne Linxweiler reminded everyone that the entire town hall offices moved to the Safety Complex for the duration of the renovation. So, no town employees were around Town Hall to witness the event. Joanne researched and found a brief mention of the time capsule in the 2014 Selectmen's minutes. Town Administrator Chris Sterndale checked Bill Herman's computer but found nothing. Building Inspector Carrie Cote holds out hope that when the Town Engineer is on site, he may recall where the capsule resides. Perhaps, there is a high tech solution to the problem. Cemetery Trustee Jim Thompson uses ground penetrating radar to solve mysteries. Perhaps, radar can find the spot where the capsule resides. We still have 22 years before the Bicentennial celebration.




