## Auburn Town Hall News



### Revaluation Underway of Auburn Property

The Town of Auburn is currently in the process of conducting a required once-every-five year revaluation of assessable property throughout the community. With the real estate market continuing to be in demand in southern New Hampshire, the current assessed values in Auburn have fallen to below 80% of market value.

With strong sales data for Auburn property from October 1, 2017 through April 1, 2018, the Auburn revaluation will be completed by a process known as a "statistical update".

Through the efforts of the Town's contract assessing firm, Avitar Associates of New England, the Town has been able to maintain an accurate database of what property, residences, commercial buildings and utilities exists throughout the community. In addition to the pick-up work of new construction and subdivisions done each year around April 1st, the Town has also been re-inspecting and verifying data on 20% of the properties each year. When coupled with the known and verified sales of property throughout the community, assessors are able to develop formulas that will statistically adjust the current values to values that will represent as close to 100% of current market value as possible.

Initial work on the updated values will be completed during the month of June. Property owners will be mailed notices of the revised values at that time, and those who have concerns with the revised values or seek additional information on their property will be able to schedule appointments

with the assessors in July to discuss the numbers and process. It is expected the revaluation work will be completed by the end of August. As a result, the new assessed values will be turned over to the Town to be used with the second property tax bill of 2018 to be issued in November.

# Patricia Rousseau Appointed Finance Assistant

Following a search that yielded nearly 20 applicants, Patricia Rousseau of Auburn has been hired as the Town's Finance Assistant in the Selectmen's Office. The position is a slight re-work of the Executive Assistant position held by Kathryn Lafond until February of this year.

Patty will be working under the direct supervision of Finance Director Adele Frisella, and will be managing and processing payroll, accounts payable, invoicing of police details, handling of the Town's public assistance efforts,

production of the annual Town Report and other finance and human resource efforts. In addition, she will continue to serve as the Editor of the Auburn Village Crier.

For the short term, Patty will also continue to assist Town Clerk Kathleen Sylvia and Tax Collector Susan Jenkins as the Deputy Town Clerk and Deputy Tax Collector until her successor is chosen.


The banners are the idea of AVS Principal Lori Collins and will provide a bright and colorful welcome to our community.




#### Parties at the Park





#### Hello Auburn Residents,

In May; myself and a few other people from Auburn went to a Primex conference to speak on how the different departments collaborate to bring great programs and events to the Town and our residents. As a presenter, I wanted to take a moment to relay what I spoke to the attendees about.

As the  $4^{th}$  anniversary of my employment with the Town approaches, I reflected on how things have evolved since I started. In 2014, I came to the Auburn Police Department at a time when America in general was losing faith in Law Enforcement. I found that in many ways the Town of Auburn was no different. One of my favorite phrases is that "The thing about a small town, is that when you don't know what you're doing, everyone else does."

It was apparent to me that many town employees and town officials had different views and opinions. This was causing bad blood, animosity and resentment, which was spilling over into the public. I was raised by a New Hampshire State Trooper and a hippy, so I have a deep respect for law enforcement but I'm also the "everybody gets a trophy" kind of girl. Law Enforcement has spanned my entire life, so it was important to me to have the residents of Auburn be able meet to the officers in a different environment. I would often hear people say, "police are there when you don't need them, and never around when you do." Often you meet police officers on what feels like the worst day of your life. It was paramount to me, to have residents interact with the officers on a more personal level and have an opportunity to get to know them.

Of all the Departments I've worked for in the past 20 years, Auburn is truly the most impressive department with caring employees. Residents need to know, these qualified men and women of the department, if inclined to do so, could venture out to find a department that had better pay, benefits, and/or opportunities to grow. They choose to stay because they are committed to the residents and the town.

Just like all aspects of life, there are always going to be highs and lows, but I speak for everyone here when I say the Police Officers of Auburn, have always been and will continue to remain devoted to the residents and keeping Auburn a safe community.


