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Auburn will Hold November 6th Election at AVS

Despite the activity of the building renovation and addition project at the Auburn Village School, the Town will be holding voting for the State General Election in the AVS gymnasium.

Voters are cautioned there are limitations to the site and facility due to the ongoing construction.

A different door in the rear of the school will be used for voters to access the building. Please watch for prominently placed signs directing to the "Entrance". A portion of the back parking lot has been fenced off due to the construction area. As a result, the remainder of the back parking lot is reserved for voters parking only on November 6th.

School will not be in session, however parent-teacher conferences are planned on November 6th. Parents

and others with AVS business should park in the front parking lot of the school.

Arrangements have been made for teachers and election workers to park their vehicles at the Safety Complex and the adjoining skating rink and basketball court in order to free up space in both of the AVS parking lot.

Color Leaves and Tax Bills Mark the Fall

For municipal governments throughout New Hampshire, the fall is a busy time of year as budgeting for the next year is in full swing, while the setting of tax rates, the mailing of property tax bills and the preparation to close out financial records for the current year are also underway. And Auburn is no different.

With property tax bills likely to be in the mail by the last week of October, it may no longer be news to property owners the tax rate for 2018 was set at \$17.06 per thousand by the NH Depart ment of Revenue Administration

(NHDRA).

Auburn conducted a required revaluation process in 2018 that resulted in property valuations on average increasing by approximately 22%. This change in valuation correlates with the resulting 19.3% reduction in the tax rate.

The tax rate includes four components -- \$3.36 for the town; \$10.86 for the local education; \$1.93 for the state education, and \$0.91 for the county. For comparison purposes, the 2018 total rate of \$21.15 per thousand, was inclusive of \$4.05 for the town; \$13.59 for local education; \$2.38 for state education and \$1.09 for the county.

Various budgets and warrant articles approved by local voters last March established total appropriations of \$18,495,162 for the town and school district combined. And the Town's share of the Rockingham County budget adds another \$768,316. Of that total amount, \$14,389,638 needs to be raised by taxes, which results in the \$17.06 tax rate.

A Change in Leadership for Parks & Recreation

After 12 years as an alternate member, member and chairman of the Parks and Recreation Commission, David Nye has decided to not accept reappointment to the Commission. A truly hands-on and active member of the Commission, the Board of Selectmen accepted with regret his decision to resign at their October 15th meeting.

The Town is seeking individuals who may be interested in serving in this volunteer role. The Parks and Recreation Commission is responsible for managing land owned by the Town as a park or recreation area, in addition to overseeing various program offerings for young and mature alike. The Commission consists of seven voting members including six individuals appointed by the Board of Selectmen and one Selectman designated by the Board to serve as an ex-officio member. The Parks and Recreation Commissioners meet monthly, as well as attend and assist at Parks and Recreation events.

Cast Your Ballots on Tuesday, November 6th

As you will have read elsewhere in The Crier, Tuesday, November 6th is the State General Election where voters statewide can cast ballots for Governor, Congress, Executive Councilor, State Senator, State Representatives and county officials, in addition to two proposed Constitutional amendments.

In Auburn, voting will take place at the Auburn Village School gymnasium on November 6th from 7 AM to 7 PM.

Due to the school construction project that is underway, the layout of the school property is restricted from what it normally is on an election day. The rear entrance to the voting area has been changed due to the construction, while a portion of the parking lot is also unavailable and has been fenced off.

Voters are urged to follow signs that will be prominently placed for the entrance to the school. Due to the limitation on parking space, there will be an effort made to ensure only voters vehicles are parked in the rear parking lot of the school. All other individuals having business at the AVS will be asked to park in the front parking lot of the school.

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
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Bears in the Woods

<u>School Improvement Committee Update</u>

On Wednesday, September 19th, the School Improvement Committee reconvened in the AVS media center for the first time since the Town of Auburn approved the funding of the school renovation.

The Committee is made up of several Auburn citizens, AVS educators, School Board members, a selectman, and a state rep. The committee meets monthly. Meetings are open to the public and minutes are recorded and posted on the Auburn Village School Website. The new purpose of this committee is to gather monthly updates of the construction project from the Building Committee, including Bonnette Page Stone (BPS), the construction management company, and Jobin Construction Consultants, the project owner's representative. The committee has an opportunity to review the information, ask questions and then discuss ways to disseminate the factual information out to the town.



In terms of changes over the last month, the boys and girls locker rooms off the gym have been completely renovated and now include full working bathrooms! The Fall sports teams are already using them and they'll be a nice addition for town events held in the gym. Nice to make these rooms functional again and free them from being storage closets. The front roof of the school has also been fully replaced as of September. If you have children in the school currently, you have probably already noticed the new temporary back entrance. The entrance has been constructed off the cafeteria for students, parents and faculty to use while the old entrance is blocked off to make room for



the construction of the new addition. This clearly marked entrance will be in use for the upcoming election and other town and school events.

As this update goes to press, the foundation for the new wing is being poured, and steel framing will soon be erected. The construction crew will be working diligently to wrap the new wing and put the roof on it ahead of the cold winter months. Most of the work in those months will happen inside - pouring concrete floors and starting other interior work.

This is an exciting time for the Town of Auburn and our school, and the committee felt that historical documentation of the project will be important going forward. Jim and Carol Cloutier, owners of Red Dog Ariel Media,LLC have graciously volunteered to create a pictorial timeline of the renovation with their ariel photography technology as the project progresses. Be on the lookout for their work on the AVS website and Facebook page.

School Improvement Committee meetings are currently being planned for the busy months of November and December. Once scheduled, dates and times will be posted in town hall, the school and on the AVS website.

AUBURN FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

The kitchen is the heart of the home, especially at Thanksgiving. Kids love to be involved in holiday preparations. Safety in the kitchen is important, especially on Thanksgiving Day when there is a lot of activity and people at home.

- Stay in the kitchen when you are cooking on the stovetop so you can keep an eye on the food.
- Stay in the home when cooking your turkey and check on it frequently.
- Keep children away from the stove. The stove will be hot and kids should stay 3 feet away.
- Make sure kids stay away from hot food and liquids. The steam or splash from vegetables, gravy or coffee could cause serious burns.
- Keep the floor clear so you don't trip over kids, toys, pocketbooks or bags.
- Keep knives out of the reach of children.
- Be sure electric cords from an electric knife, coffee maker, plate warmer or mixer are not dangling off the counter within easy reach of a child.
- Keep matches and utility lighters out of the reach of children — up high in a locked cabinet.
- Never leave children alone in room with a lit candle.
- Make sure your smoke alarms are working. Test them by pushing the test button.



Have activities that keep **kids out of the kitchen** during this busy time. Games, puzzles or books can keep them busy. Kids can get involved in Thanksgiving preparations with recipes that can be done **outside** the kitchen.





With winter approaching the Auburn Fire Department would like to share some tips on making sure everyone stays warm and safe during the long cold months ahead. With the upcoming time change this is the best reminder to change out the batteries in your smoke and CO detectors. Since the detectors are done check the date of manufacture. A good rule of thumb is to replace your smoke detectors every eight to ten years. A CO detector should be replaced every five to seven years. Any dust that may be on the detector should be cleaned, and once a new battery is installed test the detector to make sure it is working properly.

With colder weather every homeowner should make sure their furnace, wood stove, pellet stove, or any other heating device is clean and working properly. Have a qualified professional clean and inspect the heating equipment yearly. Keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away from any heating source in your house. If you have a fireplace make sure to have a heavy duty screen in front to keep sparks from flying into the house. When you clean out a woodstove, fireplace or pellet stove make sure the ashes are cool and you discard them in a metal bucket away from the house.

Also with winter comes the potential for storms where you may lose power. If you have a portable generator make sure to run it before you need it. If you do need to use a portable generator make sure to have the exhaust point away from the house and any doors or windows. Never place a portable generator in garage. If you need to refuel the portable generator make sure to shut it off first, and use the correct fuel. Once you are done using the generator make sure to let it cool down before putting back into storage.

The Auburn Fire Department would like to thank Road Agent Mike Dross, Micky Rolfe, and anyone else that donated their time and helped correct the drainage problem at the Pingree Hill Station. On their own time, they installed a catch basin and new drainage pipes that will divert water away from the front of the building. With poor drainage in that area the department has noticed water seeping into our radio room and into the sleeping quarters of the station.
