Town Considers Declaring Robie Family Burial Ground Abandoned

The Board of Selectmen has scheduled a public hearing on Monday, December 17, 2018 beginning at 7:00 P.M. at the Auburn Town Hall, for the purposes of considering a request from the Trustees of the Cemetery to declare the Robie Family Burial Ground as an abandoned burial ground. This would enable the Town to preserve and maintain the burial grounds.

This process is occurring following the determination that the Robie Family Burial Ground has been abandoned for 20 years or more. By state statute, such an action by the Selectmen will enable the Town, through its Cemetery Trustees, to provide basic maintenance to the abandoned burial ground.

The Robie Family Burial Ground

is a small, private family burial ground located near the Auburn / Derry town line in a wooded area off Hemlock Spring Road, which today is known as Winters Way. The name "Robie" is also spelled "Roby" on a few headstones. The Robie Family Burial Ground is clearly identified with a granite fence post boundary and is properly identified in subdivision plans of the surrounding property.

It appears to be the burial site for at least six members of the Robie family. The names and dates on the gravestones in the burial grounds include:

ROBIE, Emeline W., d. Dec 18, 1860, a 30 y.

Mary J., dau. Of Nathan and Sophia, d. May 28, 1843, a. 20 y.

ROBY, Nancy, d. June 20, 1864, a. 36 y.

SHELDON, Lucinda (Roby), wife of Jacob, d. June 13, 1858, a. 37 y.

Mary J., dau. Of Jacob and Lucinda, d. Jan.28, 1849, a. 2y – 9m.

WELCH, Sidney B., son of Orlando and Hannah, d. July 9, 1858, a. 1y 7 m

Auburn Hazard Mitigation Plan Update Approved

The Town of Auburn worked over the past year with officials of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission to update the Town's Hazard Mitigation Plan. The plan provides guidance to local, state and federal officials of potential areas of hazards within the community, and further enables the Town to remain eligible for hazard mitigation and other funding that may become available through the

Federal Emergency Management Agency (FMEA).

Work on the plan involved a number of Town officials including the Fire Chief, Police Lieutenant, Building Inspector, Road Agent, AVS Principal and Town Administrator, in addition to staff members from the SNHPC. The cost of the update was covered through a grant made available by the NH Bureau of Homeland

Security and Emergency Management.

The plan was reviewed and approved by both the state emergency management office and Region 1 FEMA officials in Boston before being approved by the Board of Selectmen. The original plan was prepared in 2008, and was updated in 2013 and again in 2018.



Auburn Seeks Volunteers for Frost Scenic Byway Commission

The Robert Frost/Old Stagecoach Scenic Byway connects the towns of Atkinson. Hampstead, Chester, Auburn and Derry, and is designed to celebrate and interpret the historic Boston-Haverhill-Concord Stage Coach route that followed what is today Route 121; as well as the New England landscape featured in much of Robert Frost's work, including the settings of some of his most famous poems.

The Byway highlight the numerous historic sites, scenic views, outdoor recreational opportunities, and other attractions that the region has to offer – intended to raise awareness among local

residents and promoting visitation for economic development.

Each of the five communities is able to appoint two representatives and an alternate to the Byway Council. Auburn is seeking volunteers who may be interested in this effort. The link below provides general information about the Robert Frost/Old Stagecoach Scenic Byway.

Last month, they completed achievements involving exploring nature, bike safety, and being active with games. This enthusiastic group did a fantastic job hiking 3 miles to and from Battery Point at Lake Massabesic. The scouts are building their self-confidence while performing skits for the Cub Scout Pack. This month, they have learned about what it means to be a team player, and they will finish the month with a unit on nutrition. The scouts took part in the Scouting for Food drive to help provide nourishment for kids and families in need. These Tigers have a lot to be proud of, and they look forward to the adventures ahead of them.





AVS School Construction Update:



If you came out to vote last month, you were able to get a close-up view of the construction under way at Auburn Village School. While the new entrance through the cafeteria is old news for the students and teachers who are in the school each day, it was probably new to many residents in town who voted on November 6. The interim cafeteria entrance is an example of the many improvisations being made when working on a building at the same time learning and education is happening!

Over the last month, the construction site has become host to an excavator, bulldozer, and many cement trucks. And that can only mean one thing: foundations and footings. Cement has been flowing for several weeks for the footprint of the new classroom wing, and it's been nice to see things literally take shape. With the footings and foundation walls in place, plumbing and drainage follow and then the cement floors are poured. As of this writing, the plan is to begin steel framing by early December and wrapping the building soon after so that work can continue inside the new wing through the winter months with as much cover and wind protection as possible.

In addition to focusing on the new wing, we've also begun clearing the temporary access road to the school. The road stretches from the AVS ball fields through the woods and to the Safety Complex near the basketball courts. The road is going to be used for the many trucks and trailers expected in 2019 when all the wing interior work is in full force and some of the renovation for the existing school begins. The key is to keep the back AVS parking lot free from construction equipment and trailers as much as possible. Some of the land for the temporary road is owned by Manchester Water Works and they've allowed us to use the land for this purpose. They've been a great civic partner throughout the project.

The Building Committee made up of representatives from the School Board, Superintendent's Office, AVS Administration, The Turner Group (architecture company), Bonnette Page & Stone (construction management company), and Owner's Representative continues to meet weekly at the Safety Complex to discuss all elements of building design, construction, and renovation. The Town Building Inspector and Fire Marshall also join us on occasion to discuss permits, state and local regulations, and third-party inspections and oversight. Since we began the project in April of this year, it's been a truly collaborative partnership between all involved and we're pleased with the progress made to date.

Hope everyone had a fun- and food-filled Thanksgiving and look for the latest update in the

next Crier.






Lastly, when cleaning off your car after a snow storm, make sure the roof is clear! It is the law, and you could be given a summons for not doing so.

Information From The Building Official/Code Enforcement Officer

Dryer Safety Information

Fact – the leading cause of home clothes dryer fires is the lack of cleaning them. Follow these suggested operational and maintenance guidelines to protect your home and family.

- Have your dryer installed and serviced by a professional.
- Do not use the dryer without a lint filter.
- Make sure you clean the lint filter before or after each load of laundry. Remove lint that has
 collected around the drum.
- Rigid or flexible metal venting material should be used to sustain proper air flow and drying time.
- Make sure the air exhaust vent pipe is not restricted and the outdoor vent flap will open when
 the dryer is operating. Once a year, or more often if you notice that it is taking longer than
 normal for your clothes to dry, clean lint out of the vent pipe or have a dryer lint removal service
 do it for you.
- · Check the outdoor vent flap to make sure it is not covered by snow.
- Keep the area around your dryer clear of things that can burn, like boxes, cleaning supplies and clothing, etc.
