Re: Community Discussion – Future of Parks & Recreation

One of the goals established by the Board of Selectmen for 2018 is to have a community discussion intended to determine whether Parks & Recreation should remain predominately volunteer driven or should it become a formal town department with further oversight from town staffing.

We are writing to propose a multi-step process intended to gain input from as wide a portion of the community as possible so that good information is at hand to assist the Board in reaching decisions in this area.

With some guidance through the Department of Recreation Management and Policy at the University of New Hampshire, we are suggesting the Board authorize a three-step process that we believe should result in the gathering of good information from a cross-section of the community that will provide the basis for the facilitated community discussion meeting the Board included in its 2018 Goals.

The steps we are proposing include:

- ➤ A series of small facilitated focus group discussions with various stakeholder groups to gain specific information from these diverse segments of the community. These groups would include: sports leagues and teams (i.e. Little League, Soccer, Softball); Senior Citizens; School Administration & Athletics; Parents; Town Officials; current Parks & Recreation Commission.
- An online survey that any resident of Auburn would be able to complete and offer their thoughts about programming, structure, level of interest and ideas about how Parks & Recreation should be operated in Auburn.
- Armed with information and data from these two efforts, the Town would then host a larger facilitated discussion meeting facilitated by staff from Primex intended to present the information learned from the earlier efforts and to conduct overall group discussions on that information.

As outlined, we anticipate this process could be accomplished in a two-to-three month time frame between the end of March and the beginning of June.

The Department of Recreation Management and Policy has provided us with samples of similar community surveys they have assisted with in the past that we could build from to establish an online survey for Auburn. With a tool such as "Survey Monkey", we can make the survey process fairly easy for anyone who would want to participate, while the system will tabulate the results for us.

The first step would be to undertake hosting a number of small focus group discussions aimed at soliciting information from specific stakeholder groups that may well have different levels of expectations from the Town and Parks & Recreation. These focus group discussions would be facilitated by Amy Lachance, Julie Glosner of Auburn (who works for UNH in Manchester), and possibly another individual designated to assist with this effort.

The information gained through the focus groups would then shape the questions for the online survey to solicit feedback from the general public. All of the information gathers from both the online survey and the individual focus groups would be compiled and reported out at a larger facilitated meeting of invited participants similar to last year's meeting of "Where Do We Go From Here" on the school addition project.

The end result of this information gathering and community discussion is to provide the Board of Selectmen with good information and community reaction as they work to determine what the future direction of Auburn Parks and Recreation should be.

We believe this process will enable all stakeholders to have direct input into the conversation, as well as members of the general public.

This overall process has been used successfully in other communities, and we have no reason to believe this would not be the case in Auburn.

With the Board's approval, we would take the steps necessary to get the focus group discussions structured by end of March / early April. Then the online survey up and running by early-to-mid April with it being available through the month of April. Ideally, the larger community facilitated meeting would be held in mid-to-the-end of May.

Re: Potential of Water to Portion of By-Pass 28

One of the goals the Board established in the 2018 Goal Setting process was to examine the potential of extending the water line that in recent years was brought to the town line with Londonderry in the area of Brook Hollow. The Board was interested in seeing what might be possible for commercial land available for development along a portion of By-Pass 28.

Last week I initiated a conversation with Londonderry Town Manager Kevin Smith to inquiry about this possibility. Kevin indicated the water line is actually owned and operated by Pennichuck Water Works and we would need to have that conversation with them. Pennichuck is one of the larger wholesale water customers of Manchester Water Works, so the water supply for this water system would be MWW water sold to Pennichuck.

On March 16th, I asked Stantec Consulting Services to make contact with appropriate individuals at Pennichuck to determine what the potential is for Auburn to extend this service into the Town of Auburn; what the process is to move in that direction should it be decided that is a direction Auburn wants to move in, and roughly what sort of costs would be involved in such an activity.

Through the Goal Setting process, the Board established July 1st as a target date to have this type of information from the Town engineers. I have asked Stantec to provide the information by June 1st.

At this point, there is no action for the Board to take. We are providing this as information for the Board.

Re: Article 5 – Hooksett Road Property

With the voters' approval of Article #5 for the purchase of the 1.9-acre parcel of land on Hooksett Road from the Friends of Auburn, we have been provided with the attached warranty deed from the Friends to make this transaction a realty. This deed was prepared through the McLane Law Firm.

I have shared the deed with Town Counsel for their review and requested, if possible, to have their input back in time for the Board's March 19th meeting.

As you will see, the deed is identical to the warranty deed the Friends of Auburn received in October 2017 from the original owners of the property (also attached), at which time a full title search and all appropriate legal reviews were conducted.

Unless the Board has any objections, it would be our intention to move the deeding forward based on input from Town Counsel, and to complete the transaction in as timely a manner as possible

Once the property is formally transferred and recorded in the name of the Town, we would propose the Board then complete a Voluntary Merger of the existing library property (approximately one-half acre) with this lot of 1.9-acres to establish one lot of 2.4-acres owned by the Town of Auburn.

Re: EMS and Dispatch Contracts with Town of Derry

Late last year, the Town of Auburn renewed its EMS Contract with the Town of Derry for the provision of ambulance services for the time period of July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2025. Auburn's current contract for fire dispatch service is a five year agreement with runs from July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2020.

You may have recently seen the attached news article that the Town of Chester recently renegotiated their contracts from EMS and Dispatch Services with the Town of Derry for 10 year periods at slightly different terms than Auburn's current EMS contract but the same annual adjustment as the Auburn EMS contract.

The Town of Derry did not want Auburn to feel they were being differently than the Town of Chester as a result, and are willing to offer similar contracts for similar terms as just approved for the Town of Chester.

In terms of finances, the annual adjustments from FY18 base contracts which Chester and Derry agreed to are as follows:



Derry updates contract for ambulance transport, dispatch services

DERRY — The Derry Town Council voted last week to sign an updated intermunicipal agreement with Chester to continue offering ambulance transport and fire/emergency medical dispatch services for the next decade.

Fire Chief Michael J. Gagnon said Derry receives revenue from the approved annual subsidy as a result of the ongoing partnership between the two communities without costing taxpayers.

"The subsidies cover our expenses for providing the service, and we also, in the ambulance contracts, are able to receive third-party billing invoices for patients we transport, so there is additional revenue to this contract," Gagnon said.

The council supported the measure 5-0.

This new contract supersedes any remaining time on the existing deals and extends it through June 2028. In the first year of the ambulance transport services, Derry will receive \$83,896 and it will receive \$33,434 for the fire/EMS dispatch services agreement.

With the negotiated annual subsidy, Derry will see a 2 to 3 percent increase for the life of the contract. The ambulance and dispatch contracts by the final year will jump to \$107,614 and \$43,200 respectively.

The fire department has worked to renegotiate contracts with neighboring Auburn and Chester for several weeks, having recently completed one and now finalizing ambulance and dispatch services with the other. Chester requested the possibility of bundling the two into a long-term agreement before the current ambulance service transport deal expired in June.

"They will still stay two separate contracts, but they are going to have the same term," the chief said.

Derry has provided fire and ambulance services since 1972. During the term of this contract, the two communities will celebrate 50 years of service.

Re: Update of Search for Finance Assistant Position

In follow-up to our last report to the Board concerning the posting of the position of Finance Assistant, we wanted to provide the following update.

As of this writing, we have received a total of 10 applications for the position. Although one individual has been back in contact with us to report they have accepted another position since applying, so we have a total of nine applications in hand at the present time.

We have set the week of March 19th as the time frame to begin reviewing resumes and determining how many individuals should be invited in for interviews. The position as advertised is listed as being "open until filled" to provide the Town with some flexibility in moving forward.

I would recommend the Board consider allowing the Finance Director and the Town Administrator to initially review the resumes and recommend between three and five candidates to be invited in for interviews.

The Board should give consideration for who should serve on an interview panel. An initial thought had been perhaps the Finance Director, the Town Administrator and Dale Phillips serve as an initial interview panel, with their top two candidates then being afforded a final interview with the Board of Selectmen.

Appointments with the Board

Fire Chief Gannon and Road Agent Dross - Pingree Hill Road Closure

Fire Chief Gannon spoke to the matter of the temporary road closure on Pingree Hill Road caused by a live power line that came down in the storm. While Eversource reported the closure was for several hours the road was closed for 49 minutes. The Road Agent found out about the closure second hand and needed to be added to the notification system. The Selectmen can also be added to the system. Mr. Eaton agreed and will provide their phone numbers. Fire Chief Gannon added that the only complaint about the notification system had been the voice which was hard to understand. He has changed that so that you will hear his voice or Melissa's at the police station.

Alan Villeneuve – Potential Access for School Construction Project

Mr. Villeneuve presented a proposal for an access road during the school construction which will be purely an entrance for construction, using the ball fields as a staging area. This will also allow emergency response to access the fields and will be permanent.

Mr. Herman will be working with Melissa on a project to have the town ordinances and policies accessible in one place.

EMS Fast Response Vehicle

Fire Chief Gannon would like to use the former Ford Explorer police cruiser which is being used

as a command vehicle while the new one is in service, as an EMS Fast Response Vehicle. Fire Chief Gannon suggested that it could be used by the inspector during the day and at night be a primary EMS vehicle kept in service when the new command vehicle comes in. Mrs. Phillips asked if it could be used for transports. Chief Gannon advised that only a licensed registered ambulance could do transports. Chief Gannon offered that its already paid for and the mechanical service costs are less. Mr. Eaton agreed that it made sense and could get into a lot of places. Chief Gannon will have the vehicle marked. Mr. Eaton asked if it were insured. Chief Gannon advised that Mrs. Frisella had already taken care of that.

Maple Farm Road – Hazardous Mitigation Grant Program

Road Agent Michael Dross spoke to the condition of Maple Farm Road which will require the road to be raised 6" to a foot and 3-4 culverts installed. Mr. Herman presented the accompanying application for Hazard Mitigation Grant Program funding. Mr. Eaton asked about the other end. Mr. Dross advised that the road was heaving, unless you redo the whole road its going to be a problem.

Old Business

Update of Finance Assistant Job Posting

Mr. Herman reported that the advertisement for the Finance Assistant job had been posted in the paper and the Municipal Association web page, the town web page, Town Hall and Post Office and he has received six applicants as of today. The position will run "open until filled." March 19th is the target date to begin interviews.

Update on Multi-Use Trail Project

Mr. Herman advised that he did not hear from Dan, he has the data and will be meeting with all parties within the next two weeks.
