Last month we offered congratulations to Ed Picard upon his retirement as Chief of Police and for his 39 years of service to the Town of Auburn.

We are equally pleased this month to offer congratulations to Ray Pelton for his well-deserved promotion as Police Chief. A member of the Auburn Police Department since December 2000, Ray has been promoted through the ranks of the department as a Patrol Officer, Master Patrolman, Patrol Sergeant and Lieutenant. Chief Pelton was the unanimous choice of the Auburn Police Commission for this promotion. Chief Pelton is the third full-time Chief of the Auburn Police Department. Chief Picard served as Police Chief for 28 years, replacing former Chief Lloyd Wood in 1990.

Town Boards and Positions

During the past month, a number of Auburn residents and officials have been appointed by the Board of Selectmen to various town boards, committees and positions.

Reappointed to the Parks & Recreation Committee for a two year term was Zach Eaton, while Joan Noga was appointed as an Inspector of the Election for the March Town and School District voting. Sharon Bluhm and Brenda Beer were re-appointed to one-year terms as Library Trustee Alternates, while Deputy Fire Chief Robert Selinga, Captain David Walters, and Lieutenants Christopher Szatynski and Matthew Barsaleau were all recommended by Fire Chief Mike Williams to be appointed as Deputy Fire Wardens. Moving into April, positions on the Conservation Commission, Highway Safety Committee, Parks & Recreation Commission and Zoning Board of Adjustment will be filled by Board of Selectmen appointments, while positions on the Budget Committee will be filled by the Town Moderator.


Save the Dates – Shred Day in May and E-Waste Day in September




The Town of Auburn will again be sponsoring a paper shredding event and an E-waste collection day for any resident who has documents they wish


April Showers Bring...



AUBURN FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

SMOKE ALARMS ARE A KEY PART of a home fire escape plan. When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. Working smoke alarms give you early warning so you can get outside quickly.

SAFETY TIPS

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom. They should also be outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement.
- Large homes may need extra smoke alarms.
- It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- Test all smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.
- Current alarms on the market employ different types of technology including multi-sensing, which could include smoke and carbon monoxide combined.
- Today's smoke alarms will be more technologically advanced to respond to a multitude of fire conditions, yet mitigate false alarms.
- A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall. Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen to reduce false alarms. They should be at least 10 feet (3 meters) from the stove.
- People who are hard-of-hearing or deaf can use special alarms. These alarms have strobe lights and bed shakers.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

FACTS

- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- Smoke alarms should be installed inside every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level. Smoke alarms should be connected so when one sounds, they all sound. Most homes do not have this level of protection.
- Roughly 3 out of 5 fire deaths happen in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

Hello Auburn Residents,

Join us in welcoming Charles "Ray" Pelton as Auburn's new Chief of Police. Last month we wrote about Chief Picard upcoming retirement, which was effect on February 14, 2019. On February 15th our own Lieutenant Ray Pelton was sworn in. He has over 19-year of law enforcement service and is longtime Auburn resident. Chief Pelton plans to continue to hold the Department to the high level of standards that it has always maintained.

With winter is behind us, and good weather coming, we are all adjusting to the clock change and day-light - saving. Looking ahead to Spring cleaning and yard clean ups, the Department had a couple of house cleaning items we wanted to put out to the residents:

Mark your calendars: <u>NATIONAL DRUG TAKE BACK DAY SATURDAY APRIL 27th 10AM to 2PM</u> This is a great chance to get rid of expired, old, unused medications, both prescription and over the counter.

In addition, please remember to check that your house number remains clearly marked in case of emergencies. It saves time in an emergency when Police and Fire personnel can either see a number on the mailbox if your house if a distance from the road or its clearly marked on the house.

We are also asking for people to update their information with the police department in case of an emergency. Residents are not required to register home alarm systems, but we can enter the information into our computer system in case of an emergency. If you do not have a home alarm but would like us to have contact information in case of an emergency, you can also fill out the Alarm Information Form. The form can be found at www.Auburnnh.us under the police tab.

The Department knows when it's Tax Season because we begin to receive a lot more complaints of phone scams, typically someone posing as a debt collector for the IRS. These callers may demand money or may say you have a refund due and try to trick you into sharing private information. These con artists can sound convincing when they call. They may know a lot about you, and they usually alter the caller ID to make it look like the IRS is call-ing. They use fake names and bogus IRS identification badge numbers. If you don't answer, they often leave an "urgent" callback request.

Here are five things the scammers often do but the IRS will not do. Any one of these five things are a tell-tale sign of a scam. The IRS will never:

Call to demand immediate payment, nor will they call about taxes owed without first having mailed you a bill.

Demand that you pay taxes without giving you the opportunity to question or appeal the amount they say you owe.

Require you to use a specific payment method for your taxes, such as a prepaid debit card.

Ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone.

AVS School Renovation

Happy Spring everyone! And welcome to mud season. For those who came out to vote last month, you were able to get a good look at the work going on at the Auburn Village School. Things are really starting to take shape and the contour of the back of the building, including the new rear entrance, is coming into sharper focus. Like every month, we want to give you an update of recent construction activity and give you a sense of what's coming up in the next few weeks.

- New Wing & Cafeteria Renovation With structural steel, concrete flooring, roofing, and stairs in place, the construction team is focusing on the inner elements of the new wing and expanded cafeteria. Plumbing, mechanical, electrical and sprinkler systems are being installed, as well as duct work, lighting, and door frames. Drywall is also going up and with that, the spaces will transform from steel skeletons to the learning spaces they are meant to be. The Building Committee members toured the new wing in mid-March and the walkthrough allowed our education leaders the opportunity to see how the rooms would be oriented and organized to optimize instruction. For example, every room has been designed around a teaching wall which is the longest wall in the classroom. And the opposite wall has been designed to be a secondary instruction area. The idea is to provide our educators with maximum flexibility to educate all types of student learners, including the physical/kinetic ones!
- Renovation of Existing Spaces With the end of the school year only a few months away, there's a lot of work happening by a lot of people to get ready for the renovations that will happen over the summer. First, our construction team is scheduling work crews, ordering materials like windows, doors, and locks, and assembling a schedule that weaves together the sequence of work to optimize the short summer timeframe. Second, our educators at AVS are beginning to prepare for moves, thinning out supplies and materials and starting whatever packing they can. Once the last bus pulls out of the parking lot in June, we will be relocating several spaces and classrooms slated for renovation to parts of the building that won't be renovated. Altogether, there will be over 45 different moves of classrooms and spaces over a several month span. Principal Lori Collins and Maintenance Director Scott Dube have been doing a fantastic job planning this out, keeping the school team informed, and minimizing the impact to day to day learning and instruction.

Before we get too far ahead of ourselves though, there is April vacation to consider. Like many Auburn residents, our construction team is gearing up for the vacation week. But instead of vacationing, they will be working in the new electrical room to get power to the new addition and going through the school to confirm door openings and



windows. The plumber will be in the kitchen confirming waste lines location, elevations and condition. As we've reported in past updates, the times in which the school is student- and teacher-free don't come around very often, but when they do, they're great opportunities for the team to push the project forward and get us closer to completion.

The Building Committee comprised of AVS and SAU 15 leadership, town officials, construction management and architecture companies, and School Board members continues to meet each week to discuss the progress of the project, review designs and vendor bids, and address any day-to-day needs of the school.


A Night at the Museum - Nature's Mysteries and Much, Much More
