

News from the Auburn Town Hall

Regional 'Age Friendly Community' Assessment Begins in Auburn

Embarking on an ambitious project to conduct a community assessment and resident survey in each of the 14 communities within its region to determine the age friendly nature of the community, the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission (SNHPC) held the first focus group meeting in Auburn in late February.

This effort is being supported by the Tufts Health Plan Foundation, AARP and Manchester Health Department, and is the first of its kind in the Granite State.

Utilizing a series of surveys and discussion topics developed specifically for the SNHPC region, a facilitated forum will be held in each community and will be assessing issues related to housing and zoning, transportation and accessibility, recreation and engagement, and business and economic development within that community. The SNHPC goal is to involve individuals interested in how our communities, as well as the region, prepare for the aging of our communities. At the same time, they are also encouraging the discussion as to how we might attract Millennials to stay or move back to our area.



Auburn's focus group was actively attended by more than 25 individuals representing a cross section of the community. The participants including individuals involved with the Auburn Historical Association, the Auburn Lions Club, the Massabesic Audubon Center, Parks & Recreation, the Griffin Free Public Library, Red Hat Society, Visiting Angels, the Longmeadow Church, the Auburn Village School, Auburn Board of Selectmen, the Auburn Fire and Police Departments, and other officials and residents in this process.

Information gathered at the Auburn session will be made available to the Planning Board to be considered as part of its current work effort in updating the Town's Master Plan. It will also become part of the total regional report developed by the SNHPC in the first phase of this effort.

Facilitators of the Auburn meeting expressed positive sentiments for the networking and partnering that already takes place in Auburn between local organizations and agencies. They suggested the level of participation in the Auburn program set the bar high for other communities to match.

Change Direction N.H.

Town and school district officials recently had the chance to meet with former NH Chief Justice John Broderick at a Town Hall meeting to learn about a new initiative focused on the awareness of mental health issues in our society and knowing the five signs of emotional suffering.

The former Chief Justice is co-chairing “Change Directions N.H.,” which is part of a national initiative designed to change the culture of mental health in America.

The victim of an unfortunate attack by a family member suffering from an as yet diagnosed mental health issue while serving on the Supreme Court, Justice Broderick brought substance and real life experience to a compelling and timely topic that can affect all of us in some fashion in the work place, in dealing with the public, or with our families.

No different than recognizing the signs of someone suffering a heart attack, knowing the five signs of a potential emotional suffering is equally important.


Auburn Cub Scout Pack 127 Blue and Gold Celebration



April is **Distracted Driver Awareness month**. During the past 4 years, 116 fatal crashes in New Hampshire were caused by distracted driving. The use of electronic devices is becoming the primary reason for distraction. Just a few interesting facts about distracted driving:

While texting a driver is 23 times more likely to crash

Sending and/or receiving a text distracts drivers for almost 5 seconds

At 50 miles per hour, we travel longer than the length of a football field during that 5 seconds.

Even dialing a phone number increases the risk of crashing by 3 times.

With grant funding, the Auburn Police Department received from the State of New Hampshire we will be conducting enhanced patrols throughout the month, specifically targeting Distracted Driving Offenses. Remember, a change in behavior could save a life.
