<u>News from the Auburn Town Hall</u>

Looking Forward to 2017

As we look forward to the coming year and beyond, the Board of Selectmen was able to take some time in December and participate in a facilitated workshop meeting intent on identifying goals the Board of Selectmen had for the Town during the coming year.

During the workshop meeting, the Board was challenged in a positive way to identify what they felt was working well in Auburn, and then focus on areas they felt needed improvements.

In the not too distant future, the Board will have a formal document detailing their thoughts and discussions from this goal setting which will be shared with department heads, boards and committees, and the public as a whole.

But in advance, we are pleased to indicate in general what the four main goals our Board identified for our collective efforts in 2017.

- Focus on potential economic development efforts to bring either water and/or sewer service to areas on By-Pass 28 and/or the Wellington Business Park off Rockingham Road.
- Infrastructure improvements including potential garage & storage building on the Safety Complex property and improved storage capacity for salt storage at the Highway Department.
- Focus on the implementation of recommendations from the Operational Reviews and Risk Analysis of the Fire and Police Departments, and to have a similar review conducted of general Town Hall operations. The Town Hall review will include a focus on overall staffing and a look at Town building and property maintenance functions and responsibilities.
- Review all property owned by the Town to enable the Board to consider the Town's property holdings and make decisions as to whether continued ownership of the individual properties made sense for the Town.

As we head towards 2017, we are optimistic that these are goals that can be worked on an achieved or at least moved forward during the next 12 months.



Redesign of Town Hall Entrance

Last fall, we had to make some quick, temporary repairs to the front stairs of the Town Hall as time and age had taken its toll on the railings and stairs, which had become unsafe for the public.

As we looked at the front of the building, we developed a sense that we should be looking at a little bit more of an improvement that would get the entirety of the front steps under cover and out of the elements – particularly for the winter months and the slippery weather.

The Board worked with a building design firm in Manchester to develop a plan of improvement that addresses the safety and structural needs for the main entrance of the building, while also keeping a look and style that fits in with the building.

The rendering below is the end result of these efforts. The Town has a larger color poster size display of this rendering available for viewing at the Town Hall, in addition to having it posted on the Town website (<u>www.auburnnh.us</u>).

We welcome your input and comments on this effort. The Board intends to secure cost estimates for this work and potentially moving forward with it in the summer or fall.

Save the Dates

As we look ahead, the annual Deliberative Session of Town Meeting will be held on Saturday, February 4th at 9 AM at the Auburn Village School, with a snow date of Saturday, February 11th.

The annual School District and Town Election Day will be held on Tuesday, March 14th from 7 AM to 7 PM at the Auburn Village School.

Massabesic Seniors News



1911 – Deerneck **Bridge Tragedy**

Winter brings ice but ice on a reservoir can be dangerous. The Manchester Water Works pumps water out of Lake Massabesic's back pond (West of Londonderry Turnpike) to supply water to the City of Manchester. The water flows from the front pond, under Deerneck bridge to the pumping station. In the winter, this flowing current creates thin ice, the surface appears to be safe but it can be dangerous!

Partial article recounting the tragedy - Manchester Library (no headline or date)

".....able to grasp the bundle and there horror was complete at finding it to be the body of a man frozen fast to the ice. By great effort they tore him loose and dragged him to safety, and reviving him, carried him to the home of William McPherson, where he was warmed and given dry clothing. When able to talk he gave the particulars of the accident and word was immediately sent to the authorities, who at once began a search for the bodies of the two missing men."

"Faust could tell nothing of the cause of the accident...but he did tell of his struggles in the water, his attempt to grasp one of his companions, and his battle for life amid the breaking ice. When he pulled himself to safety he was completely exhausted and numbed by the cold. His wet clothing was frozen fast to the ice and had his rescuers not reached him when they did, it is probable that HE WOULD HAVE FROZEN TO DEATH as he was too far gone to be able to move ...

This spot is one of the most treacherous in the lake – in addition to being one of the deepest, being about 30 feet deep, it is the last to freeze over. When other portions of the lake are perfectly safe this stretch has to be negotiated with extreme caution.


The Other Two Companions – the current sweeps toward the back pond and unless the progress of the other two bodies is stopped by some obstacle, they have probably been swept along with the current and the chances for recovery before spring is very slight. It would be almost impossible to find them under the ice, although the Auburn authorities will use every means in their power to locate them...." The reporter informed Mrs. Hatch, mother of a two year old, of her loss - her husband, Arthur E. Hatch, age 26, and her brother, William H. Whidden, age 29, both had drowned in Lake Massabesic.
