News from the Auburn Town Hall

Tax Bills to Come with the Season's Change

For municipal government through New Hampshire, the fall is a busy time of year as budgeting for the next year is in full gear, while the setting of tax rates, the mailing of property tax bills and the preparation to close out financial records for the current year are also underway.

With property tax bills in the mail by the first week of November, it is no longer news to property owners that rates have decreased for the second year in a row.

The 2016 tax rate was set at \$20.25 per thousand by the NH Department of Revenue Administration – a reduction of 46-cents. The tax rate includes four components -- \$4.43 for the town; \$12.26 for the local education; \$2.47 for the state education, and \$1.09 for the county. For comparison purposes, the 2015 total rate of \$20.71 per thousand, was inclusive of \$4.25 for the town; \$12.87 for local education; \$2.49 for state education and \$1.10 for the county.


Various budgets and warrant articles approved by local voters last March established total appropriations of \$16,868,927 for the town and school district combined. And the Town's share of the Rockingham County budget adds another \$711,798. Of that total amount, \$13,230,561 needs to be raised by taxes.

In general terms, due to the reduction in the tax rate, the second issue property tax bill was less than the first bill that came out in June. And it will also generally lead to a lower bill next June than the first issue bill of this year.

All Attention Turns to Budget

As the seasons have changed, the leaves have turned color and are falling, and the temperatures are on a downward slide. Town officials have begun work in earnest on the development of the proposed budget for 2017.

Department heads and elected officials have begun presenting their budget proposals to the Board of Selectmen, and the process will continue through November. The Selestmen have requested departments work to level fund or



slightly reduce their budget proposals for the coming year. But that can't always be the case for all functions.

The Budget Committee began its work at the end of October to meet with town officials, review department requests and Selectmen recommendations, and ultimately, present budget recommendations to the voters.

All activity is focused towards the Budget Committee presenting a recommended Town budget at a public hearing to likely be held on Thursday, January 12, 2017, and ultimately at the Deliberative Session of Town Meeting to be held on Saturday, January 28, 2017.

Earlier this year, Town Moderator Jim Tillery had re- appointed Paula Marzloff and Peter Miles to their second terms on the eight-member Budget Committee.

Another Successful E-Waste Collection Event





Hello Auburn Residents,

Fall is upon us, and with it.... Hunting season. You will most likely see in influx of vehicles not familiar to you. You will also probably hear gun shots, when the leaves drop off the trees, gun shots can sound a lot closer than they are. NH Fish and Game advised us that at the moment this is the height of the hunting season, and will continue till about the first of the year.

Currently the hunting season dates are as follows:

9/15 Archery deer season opens

10/1 Small game season opens

10/4 Duck season opens

10/4 Rifle season, bear season opens

10/19 Baiting deer begins (a lot of people will be refreshing their baits)

10/29 muzzle loader season opens

11/9 general fire arms season opens

1/1 Nighttime Coyote season opens

While on the topic of suspicious vehicles, we at APD want to stress that calling about suspicious vehicles is welcome, we believe in the phrase "better safe than sorry," and we want our residents to be safe.

Never approach a vehicle you do not know, this is taught to our young children, but it is important for our adults to remember too. If there is a vehicle parked in your neighborhood, at the playground, at a park, that you feel is suspicious, call us. If you can safely, from a distance, see a license plate, it is a big help to us, if you cannot then a vehicle description is the next best thing for us.

We have a 24/7 dispatch through Rockingham Sheriff's Office, the number is (603)483-2922. We realize it is easy to read the dispatch number right now, but it may not always be easy to commit to memory. In the moment, trying to find the number may not be an option. As children we are taught that dialing 911 is only in an "emergency." Is a suspicious vehicle really an emergency if they aren't doing anything wrong? **YES IT IS!** New Hampshire E911 considers suspicious activity an emergency reason to dial 911.

What happens when you dial 911? An operator will answer the phone, they will ask your location and the type of emergency. From those two questions they determine who you need to talk to. You will stay on the phone with the E-911 operator who will be connecting the call to one of our dispatchers at Rockingham. Don't hang up! The E-911 operator will tell you to stay on the line while they connect you to the appropriate agency. You will hear the Rockingham dispatcher answer and the E-911 operator give your location and the reason you are calling. E-911 then releases the call to the dispatcher, and he or she will get more detailed information from you at that time. The goal of the E-911 operator is to get just enough information to get you the help you need. Do not be surprised if they cut you off from trying to give more information at that time. When speaking with the Rockingham Dispatcher they will ask more information, this is the time in which you will give more details. We hope this helps you.

We hope everyone has safe and happy holiday season.
