Selectmen and School Board to Meet Quarterly

In an effort to enhance communications between the Board of Selectmen and the School Board, particularly in the area of large projects and expenditures, the two boards have agreed to meet together a minimum of four times per year.

The first meeting between the two boards is scheduled for Monday, November 20th at 7 PM at the Town Hall, while the second meeting is planned for Tuesday February 13th at 6 PM at the Auburn Village School.

Topics for discussion at these first two meetings are anticipated to be largely focused on the budget efforts of both boards for the ensuing year, the potential of a school building project and other larger expense items the Town or School District may be dealing with that would go before voters in March 2018.

Other meetings are planned for May and August 2018, but specific dates have not yet been scheduled.


NHDES Seeks Additional Groundwater Testing

In the August edition of the Auburn Village Crier, we reported the NH Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) had sought to have the annual water sampling testing performed at the Town's closed landfill property expanded to include testing for PFCs. This had not been part of the state requirement in the past.

Auburn complied when water samples were pulled in April, and the results indicated PFCs were present in small traces in all of the site wells. Based on these results, NHDES requested the Town perform additional tests on two groundwater sample points and the dug well on the landfill property, in addition to two residential wells located within 500-feet of the monitoring wells.

These additional tests were done in June, and the results showed similar elevated results for the groundwater and well on the landfill property, the residential wells had results that were below acceptable levels.

NHDES has reviewed the June data and has requested the Town perform an additional monitoring round for full parameters in November 2017. Moving forward, it appears the Town will be required to continue monitoring for PFAs testing of the two offsite residential wells, and to install one or more additional monitoring wells on the landfill property to monitor the PFAs plume.

Auction of Tax Deeded Properties

On August 26th, the Town sold three parcels of land it had been holding for years in the Sun Valley area. The parcels were taken by Tax Collector deeds between 1978 and 2013 and ranged from a lot of six-tenths of an acre to a three+ acres parcel.

The Town sold the property through a public auction which resulted in a total of \$311,000 being raised from the sales. The successful bidders each posted a non-refundable \$2,500 deposit the day of the auction, and must close on the properties by October 10th.

The annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection event for Auburn residents has been scheduled for Saturday, October 7th from 9 AM to 1 PM at the Raymond landfill property. The Town of Auburn teams up with the Towns of Nottingham and Raymond for this annual activity.

NEW HAMPSHIRE DIVISION OF MOTOR VEHICLES TO CLOSE OFFICES FOR TWO-DAYS DURING SOFTWARE UPGRADE

CONCORD, NH – The NH Department of Safety, Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) will implement a new driver licensing system in October to replace the current system originally implemented in the 1980s. Implementation of the new system will require the closure of all DMV offices on Monday, October 9th and Tuesday, October 10th and will temporarily limit some services.

"Although temporarily closing DMV offices is required during this transition time, we are aware of how the closure will impact our customers," said DMV Director Elizabeth Bielecki. "Hopefully, by providing advanced notice, we will minimize the inconvenience this closure will cause."

During the transition:

- Town/City Municipal clerks will not be able to process the state portion of vehicle registrations from Friday, October 6, through Tuesday, October 10.
- Online services, including Online Driver License Renewal and Online Ticket Pay, will not be available from Wednesday, October 4, through Wednesday, October 11.
- Ticket pay by phone will not be available on Monday, October 9, and Tuesday, October 10. To pay a ticket by phone on another day during normal business hours, please call 1-800-272-0036.

Customers are encouraged to complete DMV transactions regarding driver licenses and registrations in advance of expiration dates if they expire during the transition period. In the days following implementation of the new system, customers may experience longer than usual wait times and are asked to plan their visit accordingly.

Auburn Historical Association - October Program

New Hampshire Roads Taken or Not October 5, 2017 7:00 pm Auburn Safety Complex



Following World War II, New Hampshire embarked on an extensive program of constructing new highways and improving existing roads to accommodate explosive growth. Hundreds of millions of tax dollars would be expended over the second half of the 20th century. Decisions about highway projects were often driven by political considerations and these decisions would come to have profound impacts upon communities of the state.

In this program, **Steve Taylor** reviews some of New Hampshire's most significant highway choices in the 20th century, followed by discussion of the economic, social, and cultural changes that followed decisions to build or not to build.

Steve Taylor is an independent scholar, farmer, journalist, and longtime public official. With his sons, Taylor operates a dairy, maple syrup, and cheese making enterprise in Meriden Village. He has been a newspaper reporter and editor, and served for 25 years as New Hampshire's commissioner of agriculture. Taylor was the founding executive director of the New Hampshire Humanities Council and is a lifelong student of the state's rural culture.

Auburn's Good Shepherds Foundation organized the 5k Duckling Dash and more than 50 runners participated in this fun and scenic road race. 100% of proceeds from the race go to the Blessings in a Backpack program, which helps feed school children from across the United States.

Auburn's youth were spotlighted under the Auburn Village School tent, led by AVS teacher Wendy Smith, where the school kids sold duck race balloons, blowup ducks and more. Near the AVS tent were the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Cub Scouts. We're especially grateful for Boy Scout Troop #127 who helped clean up trash for the entire event.

A special thank you to Jim Thompson who drove the Duck Shuttle allowing passages to hop onboard and get a ride from parking areas to the main event. Steve Davis and Dave Rogers who counted ducks all day long.

The third annual Salmon Falls Apple Pie Contest was as popular as ever and Auburn's selectmen acted as official tasting judges. ment for the entire family.



Auburn Fire Department News



Over the last two years the town has hired an independent agency to investigate and report on the effectiveness of your communities Emergency Services Units EMS -FIRE/POLICE. One recommendation made to both the Police and Fire Departments was to develop a plan for mass notification of emergencies and updates for ongoing emergencies occurring in town. Our current method is slow and requires responders to enter messages into multiple social medial accounts or emails accounts. The state offers a system that took forty-two minutes, one phone call and three emails to get an emergency notification to a small section of town.

Primarily I am your Fire Chief my other hat is that of Emergency Management Director. Since receiving our report, I have been working with Melissa at the Police Department and reviewed several mass notification systems that would work for all

Emergency Services. To date we have found one system that is fast and can be operated by Laptop, tablets, and smart phones. Giving this tool to responders in the street will allow immediate notification to our citizens. Delays and multiple systems would be a thing of the past. Here is a list of the features of the program

Emergency Messages can be simultaneously sent using the following methods, Text Message, Email, Phone Call's to land or cell phones.

Updates are also immediately posted to Facebook, Twitter, Google Alerts, and webpages

Access to (FEMA's) IPAWS Integrated Public Alert and Warning System

Exact geo coded neighborhood alerts or entire town wide notifications based on map selection

Automatic calling to check on the elderly and other at-risk populations with automatic reports of missed call responses. Allowing people that need help to get that help quickly.

The cost of the system first year is \$8,100 and drops to 7,200 each year after that. This price includes setting the program training for systems administrators and 24 /7 / 365 live tech support and updates as the program advances. I will be making this request under the Emergency Management Budget because it is truly a system that can be used by the entire town. Both Melissa from the Police Department and I would be co-system administrators and would serve as backup to each other. 

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
